



A check of page 6 of the Daily Worker for August 18, 1933, reflects a meeting of 200 homeless women which formed the League of Homeless Women and elected Margaret Meade as secretary. No information therein indicating Meade is a Communist. Recheck Make Mills files for complete information therein indicating Meade to be a Communist and recheck for original source of this information, surepimmediately.

Submitted herewith are seven copies of amended page six of report of Special Agent ROBERT H. PAUL dated January 17, 1949, reflecting information concerning citizenship of employee's husband as contained in the files of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The Bureau is advised that information obtained from the records of the Intelligence Division of the Army as set forth on page six of WFO letter dated December 28, 1948, was not set forth in the above mentioned WFO report because the name "Dr. MARGARET MEAD" contained no further identifying information as to the identity of this person nor did the records reflect the source from which this information was obtained.

Captain JOSEPH HART, IDA, Department of the Army, was contacted and advised that the information concerning "Dr. MARGARET MEAD assisted with organization of the League for Mutual Aid" was originally obtained from the FBI in 1942.

Because the "Dr. MARGARET MEAD" mentioned in IDA records cannot be identified with the employee and further because indices of the Washington Field Office contain no reference to this information, it is assumed that this information was furnished to IDA by the Bureau and therefore not included in the FFO report in this matter.

Reference is made to information on page five of WFO letter dated December 28 in captioned matter concerning information from the HCUA.

obtained from the HCUA. A subsequent check of the records of the HCUA failed to reflect all of the information which the records of the Civil Service Commission attributed to the records of the HCUA.

Miss ANN TURNER, Librarian, HCUA, was contacted regarding information which appeared in the records of the CSC as having been originally obtained from the HCUA but which information was not reflected in a check of the HCUA records. She advised that many of the files and records received by the HCUA from the old Dies Committee had not been indexed and as a result the files were maintained in a storage room and were not available for review. She stated that since the names had not been indexed, it would be virtually impossible to use the information contained in the files. She also stated that prior to 1945 these files had been available to other Governmental agencies who had obtained information from the files although the names in the files had not been indexed. She also stated that CSC representatives in New York had obtained much oral information from the New York Regional Office of the HCUA, which information was never reduced to writing. Miss TURNER added that because of the above facts, it would be possible that some Government agencies would have information in their files which was feceived from the HCUA but which the indices of the HCUA would fail to reflect.

A check of the HCUA records reflects the following information:

(1) "MARGARET MEAD, Sponsor of the National Wartime Conference of the Professions, the Sciences, the Arts, the White Collar Fields, held on May 8 and 9, 1943 at the Hotel Commodore and the Hotel Biltmore, New York, New York."

The source of this information is appendix IX of the Public Hearings of the HCUA which were conducted September 27, 28, 29, and October 3, 4, and 5, 1944.

(2) "MARGARET LAMEAD, YWCA, American Council on Soviet Relations, sent greetings to Soviet women."

The source of this information is listed as "page 29 of Soviet Women to Women of the World".

An effort was made to locate this publication at the Library of Congress in an effort to further indentify this person. The records fail to reflect a publication under this title.

(3) "MARGARET MEAD, Instructor for the New School for Social Research".

This person is not further identified but the source for this information is listed as page 67 of the New York Post dated September 18, 1941.

(4) "MARGARET MEADE, Communist, 1933 Secretary of the League of Homeless Women".

The source for this information is reflected as page six, column seven of the August 18, 1933 issue of the Daily Worker.

Miss TURNER of the HCUA advised that this information was originally obtained from the files of Lieutenant MAKE MILLS of the Chicago Police Department.

Records of the HCUA contain no record of the employee's husband, GREGORY BATESON.

The above information concerning a person having a name similar to the employee's name was not set forth in WFO report dated January 17, 1949 since the person mentioned in the HCUA record could not be identified with the employee and further because the organization affiliations of the person listed in the HCUA records have not been cited by the HCUA nor by the Attorney General.

Other information which was set forth on page five of WFO letter to the Director dated December 28, concerning information from the HCUA but not reflected in a check of the HCUA records was not set forth in WFO report but was submitted as possible leads for the New York Office. Although the HCUA records did not contain all of the information which the CSC had obtained from the HCUA, it was felt that the CSC had obtained the information from the New York Office of the HCUA and as in the manner previously explained by Miss TURNER had not been indexed and was not available for review.

Miss TURNER of the HCUA was re-contacted and advised that the records of the HCUA contain no additional information concerning MARGARET MEAD or MARGARET MEADE, other than the four enumerated references set forth above.

Because the MARGARET MEAD listed in the HCUA records cannot be identified with the employee, information obtained from the HCUA was not set forth in WFO report but as indicated was furnished to the New York Office by WFO letter to Director dated December 28 as possible leads.

In an effort to obtain the original source for the information which the files of the CSC reveals as having been obtained from the HCUA, inquiry was made at the Library of Congress. There was located a pamphlet entitled "A Plan for the National Morale Service". This pamphlet was published by the Committee for National Morale, 51 East 42nd Street, New York, New York on February 21, 1941. Page 1 of this pamphlet lists "Members of the Committee for National Morale". Under the heading "Executive Committee" is listed the name "GREGORY BATESON - Anthropologist". Also listed as a "member" is the name "MARGARET MEAD - Anthropologist, American Museum of Natural History.

At the Library of Congress there was also located a pamphlet entitled "White Book of United States Foreign Policy, 1932 - 1942". This publication was printed in 1942 for the Committee for National Morale. On the inside cover of the pamphlet there appears the name "GREGORY BATESON - Secretary" under the title "Committee for National Morale, 8 West 40th Street, New York, New York". On the inside back cover of this pamphlet "GREGORY BATESON" and "MARGARET MEAD" are listed as members of the "Sub-committee for Social Science and the Youth and Child Care Development".

These persons are apparently identical with the employee and her husband, however, this information is not being included in WFO report since the "Committee for National Morale" has not been cited by the HCUA nor by the Attorney General.

The Library of Congress did not have any publications or pamphlets of the "New School for Social Research" other than the 1948

school catalogue for this institution. It is therefore impossible to ascertain if the GREGORY BATESON and the MARGARET MEAD who were listed as instructors of this school in 1947 and 1941 respectively were identical with the employee and her husband.

A copy of this letter is being designated for the New York Office for information purposes. The New York Office is requested to utilize the information in WFO letter to the Director dated December 28 which is attributed to the HCUA and conduct appropriate investigation to ascertain if the persons mentioned therein are identical with the employee and her husband.

#### III. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

#### AT ALBANY, NEW YORK:

Dr. CARL E. GUTHE, Director, New York State Museum, Education Building, advised he has been acquainted with MARGARET IMAD since about the middle Twenties or for approximately 25 years. He knows her professionally, both being Anthropologists, and as a close personal friend, and stated he would recommend her without any qualification whatever for employment with the Government of this country. He knows her to be a woman of marked ability in her work, of excellent character and reputation, and a truly loyal American.

Dr. GUTHE stated that during the war, for a period of some three years subsequent to 1942, he was associated with Dr. MARGARET MEAD on the National Research Council of Washington, D. C. Dr. GUTHE was Chairman of a Committee of Food Habits under this Council and MARGARET MEAD was Executive Secretary of this same Committee.

Dr. GUTHE stated that Dr. LEAD did much of the work of this particular Committee composed for the most part of prominent scientists, and he stated that Employee handled this work in her usual highly satisfactory manner. Dr. GUTHE added that he, as well as all of his associates of the National Research Council, had been cleared by Government Investigative Agencies for "secret" work.

Dr. GUTHE further related that, as all Anthropologists should be, Employee was interested in the cultures of other countries and had spent considerable time in studying social and economic aspects of civilization throughout many parts of the world and in numerous countries. Dr. GUTHE volunteered that in the course of such study, Dr. IMAD had undoubtedly studied the cultures of the Russian people, as well as those of most other European countries and, he stated, undoubtedly had contacts in line with this type of study in most European countries.

However, he continued, Employee's interest in Russia or any other European country would have been motivated solely by her interest in learning about the way people live in various countries.

Dr. GUTHE pointed out that a year or so ago MARGARLT MEAD had traveled to Europe, along with other scientists, under some Federal auspices for the purpose of scientific study. He described Dr. MARGARLT MEAD as one of the outstanding scientists in the profession of Anthropology in this country. He concluded by saying that any remarks he might possibly make concerning Employee would be wholly laudatory in character.

#### RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Mr. WILLIAM FIELDING OGBURN, Professor of Sociology, Room 420, 1126 East 59th Street, Chicago, Illinois, advised he has known employee for about twenty-eight years. He stated he met her at the Barnard College in about 1921 and that after she received her A.M. degree in about 1923 he employed her as an assistant in his office at Barnard College.

He stated she was a most efficient worker and in his opinion was an outstanding student. He stated he knew of no organizations to which she belonged during this period of time. He further stated he has had very limited contact with her for the past twenty-five years.

Professor OGBURN stated he had no information whatsoever that would reflect on employee's character or loyalty. He stated that in his opinion she was a loyal American.

Professor OGBURN stated employee had published a book in 1942 under her maiden name, MARGARET MEAD, entitled "Keep Your Pallet Dry", which Professor OGBURN stated in his opinion clearly expressed her pro-American views. Postder

#### RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Miss NORMA SULOWSKI, Registrar's Office, DePauw University, Greencastle, Indiana, presented MARGARET MEAD's school record, which reflected that MEAD started at the school in September of 1919, and left in June of 1920, during which time she received above average grades. The records further showed that MEAD was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, December 16, 1901, but disclosed no further information. Miss SULOWSKI advised that none of the present faculty was connected with the school in 1919 or 1920, and added that she knew of no one who might know MEAD.

On August 2, 1943, ROBERT E. CROUCH, Alumni Fund Secretary, DePauw University, stated that he was not personally acquainted with Mrs. BATESON, but that he knew her to be one of the outstanding persons who attended DePauw and that he had some of her more outstanding events on record. The records in this office reflected that Mrs. BATESON is the daughter of Dr. EDWARD SHERWOOD MEAD, Professor of Finance at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, residence 4107 Pine Street, Philadelphia. It was also shown that at one time Mrs. BATESON was married to Red F. FORTUNE, but did not give any dates, either for the marriage or divorce, or death of Mr. FORTUNE.

It was reflected that she married GREGORY BATESON, Cambridge, March, 1936. It was indicated in this record that Mrs. BATESON was described as a "brilliant lady scientist" in the March 24, 1934, issue of Liberty magazine.

Mr. CROUCH called attention to an article written by a student, BrTTY MULLINS, for the 1943 Commencement issue of the DePauw Alumnus, which is quoted as follows:

"'Keep Your Powder Dry' by MARGARET MEAD, ex-'23. This is the second book by anthropologist MARGARET MEAD. Her first book was 'Growing up in New Guinea, Sex and Temperament.' In her latest work,

Miss MEAD has attempted an analysis of the future of America. She believes that before we can turn to any major problem of war and peace, we must learn what we are outselves. Without this insight, we will be unable to judge our aptitudes for any type of reconstruction.

"Miss MEAD discusses the attitudes of the third-generation Americans, into which category most of us fall, towards the second and the seconds' toward the first. Each generation, she believes, wishes to outstrip its predecessor. Thus begins the typical American standard of a man's value is success and is rooted deeply in the Puritan belief that toil and struggle are the proper works of man and that competition is the basis for the struggle.

"Miss MEAD suggests that this national character can be best called upon in this present war and the reconstruction to follow by recognizing that Americans trust themselves more than their parents, and themselves more than their generals and officials. This means 'that we can only move forward as a whole people.' She believes that Washington must not lay down hard and fast rules. 'Our strength comes out when we feel that we are grown up and in control, but ebbs away from us when we feel a parent hand.' And Miss MEAD further says that suppression of bad news for the sake of morale is fatal. When this mistake is made, the American looks at his leaders with a 'strong suspicion' that our "morale" is just another name for your skins.'

"Miss MEAD is connected with the American Museum of Natural History in New York City where she serves as Associate Curator, Department of Anthropology, and has done considerable exploration work for that institution. She is also a widely-known contributor to popular and scientific periodicals and as co-author with her husband, GREGORY BATESON, Cambridge University, England. On June 15, 1943, Miss MEAD spoke before the state convention of the American Association of University Women at the Columbia Club, Indianapolis, on 'Stylizing the Role of the College Graduate in the Community.'"

Chief R. COLEMAN, Greencastle, Indiana, Police Department, advised the department's records were negative regarding MEAD.

Miss HELEN BLACK, Putnam County Credit Bureau, stated the files of her office contain nothing on MEAD.

#### RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Mrs. SEBASTIAN CABOT, 664 Salem Avenue, Elizabeth, New Jersey, stated she could not comment on the employee's loyalty during the last ten years. However, she advised she knew the employee well from the time she (MEAD) was 12 years old, and that she has never had any reason whatsoever to doubt the employee's loyalty. Mrs. CABOT related that the employee and her family lived in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania during the period of their close acquaintance, and that the employee never resided in New Jersey. Mrs. CABOT said that to her knowledge, she has read all of the books written by MARGARET MEAD and none of them show any tendency on the part of the employee toward disloyalty. Mrs. CABOT stated that MEAD's books deal with the subject of anthropology, which books are four in number, the titles of which she cannot recall except for the most recent, "Keep Your Powder Dry".

Miss ALICE ARONOFF, Assistant Dean, New Jersey College for Women, Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, produced a copy of the citation to MARGARET MEAD dated June 4, 1941, which read as follows:

"Distinguished ethnologist; author; courageous explorer, allowing neither danger or hardship to frustrate your researches into the way of life of primitive peoples. You have enlarged our knowledge in the field of anthropology. You have interested yourself in many movements, other than those which are purely professional, which have to do with human welfare. In recognition of your achievements in these fields, in anticipation of the fulfilment of the promise of yet richer attainments in the future, we confer upon you—at the direction of the Trustees of Rutgers University—the honorary degree of Dr. of Laws."

Hiss ARONOFF stated the employee received the aforementioned citation and the honorary degree was conferred upon her when she came here to speak during the morning commencement exercises of the University the same date. She said the title of the speech given by MEAD was "Spontaneity as a Condition of Democratic Life", the text of which contained nothing of a disloyal nature. Miss ARONOFF related that the employee arrived in New Brunswick the morning of the stated exercises and left the same day, and further, that various members of the faculty met MEAD but she believed that no one here is well acquainted with MEAD personally. Miss ARONOFF stated she has read three or four books written by the employee, the titles of which she cannot recall, and that she knows nothing of a disloyal nature concerning the employee or her writings.

Mrs. FLIZABETH R. BOYD, Curator of Rutgersensia, Library, Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, stated she met the employee once during the occasion of her visit here during 1941, but knows nothing concerning her loyalty. She says she has read only one book written by the employee entitled "Keep Your Powder Dry", the text of which she felt contained nothing of a disloyal nature.

Mrs. AMNA G. CONLON, Secretary to President, Dr. R. C. CLOTHIER, Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, stated she met the employee, as did Dr. CLOTHIER, but that she knows nothing regarding the employee's loyalty. She stated further that Dr. CLOTHIER met the employee only on the one occasion of her visit here and would know nothing concerning her loyalty. She states she cannot recall reading any books written by the employee.

### III. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Mrs. BARBARA TORMLEY, Information Bureau, Wellesley College, Wellesley, Massachusetts, checked her records and advised that Dr. MARGARET MEAD instructed at a School of Community Affairs, which was held at Wellesley for two summers between the dates June 26 and August 10, 1944, and July 8 and August 16, 1946.

Dr. LELAND H. JENKS, Holyoke Building, Harvard University, Gambridge, Massachusetts, advised that his permanent position was at Wellesley College but that he was on leave this year. He stated that the School of Community Affairs was conducted under his supervision and that he had known Dr. MEAD for a number of years. He stated that he would be very surprised to learn anything which would indicate disloyalty on the part of Dr. MEAD, and that to the contrary her writings indicate an intense devotion and levalty to the United States Government. Dr. JENKS stated that he knew of nothing which would indicate disloyalty on her part.

Mrs. CLYDE KLUCKHOHN, Social Relations Department, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts, advised that she has known Dr. MEAD for about fifteen years. She advised that this association is of a social as well as academic nature and she stated that her husband is also well acquainted with Dr. MEAD. Mrs. KLUCKHOHN stated that there is absolutely no question about the integrity and loyalty of Dr. MEAD. She stated that this conclusion is drawn both by her association with Dr. MEAD and by familiarity with her writings and her work. Mrs. KLUCKHOHN stated that she knew of no fact which would throw any question on Dr. MEAD's loyalty to the United States Government.

Confidential Informant Boston T-1, of known reliability, advised that he has known Dr. MEAD for a number of years, and although he knows nothing which would indicate disloyalty on her part, he would not be surprised to learn that she was associated with "left wing groups." He advised that

he reached this opinion through familiarity with her writings and with her work; however, he was unable to furnish any specific, factual information which had led him to form this opinion.

Miss CATHERINE CAROLAN, clerical employee, Massachusetts Board of Probation, Boston, Massachusetts, central repository for arrest records in the Common-wealth of Massachusetts, checked her files and advised that there was no record of Dr. MEAD.

Miss MILDRED KING, clerical employee, Credit Bureau of Greater Boston, 52 Chauncy Street, Boston, Massachusetts, checked her files and advised that there was no record which could be identified with Dr. MEAD.

#### REFERENCE

ISABEL CARTER, Professor of Social Research, University of Pennsylvania School of Social Work, 2410 Pine Street, Philadelphia, stated that she has been acquainted with MARGARET MEAD since approximately 1922, when they were fellow students at Columbia University in New York. Miss CARTER advised that during the years she has been acquainted with the employee she has never heard MEAD express any opinions of a disloyal nature or indicate in any way that she was in sympathy with a foreign-type government. Miss CARTER further stated that she considers the employee to be a loyal, patriotic American citizen.

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#### MISCELLANEOUS

Employee listed her parents as EDWARD SHERWOOD MEAD, Professor, University of Pennsylvania, born in Chicago, Illinois, and indicated their address as being 4107 Pine Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

JOHN F. STEINHAUER, Voters Registration Commission, Room 1425, City Hall Annex, Philadelphia, Pa., made available the registration records, which reflected that EDWARD SHERWOOD MEAD, occupation teacher, was born January 25, 1875 in Ohio, and EMILY FOGG MEAD, born August 28, 1871 in Illinois, are presently registered from the address 214 S. McAlpin Street, Philadelphia, Pa. The registration card reflects that both the above-named individuals formerly resided at 4107 Pine Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

Mr. STEINHAUER advised that there is no other individual by the name EMILY FOGG MEAD listed in the files of his office.

A search of the Philadelphia and suburban telephone directories failed to reflect a listing for the name EMILY FOGG MEAD.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-1, a reliable informant who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, advised that during July 1943 the name EMILY FCGG MEAD was listed as a Philadelphia sponsor of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee on the letterhead of the stationery of that organization.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-2, a reliable informant who declined to furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, advised in September 1944 that an invitation announcing a testimonial dinner to be held in honor of Dr. M. V. LEOF at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel, Philadelphia, on October 17, 1944, listed the name EMILY FOGG MEAD as one of the sponsors of the event.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, stated that the above testimonial dinner in honor of Dr. M. V. IEOF was held as a benefit for Russian War Relief, Inc., and that approximately \$10,000.00 was raised through contributions from persons in attendance.

The informant further advised that Dr. M. V. LEOF, while not known to be a member of the Communist Party, was active in the Philadelphia Council of American-Soviet Friendship, the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee, and the Philadelphia School of Social Science and Art.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-4, a reliable informant who will not appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board or furnish a signed statement, advised that the Philadelphia Chapter of the Russian War Relief, Inc. had among its members some individuals whom the informant believed to be members of the Communist Party or Communist sympathizers during its existence in Philadelphia 1941 to 1946.

Fhiladelphia Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, advised in October 1947 that the name Mrs. E. S. MEAD, 214 S. McAlpin Street, Philadelphia 4, Pa., appeared on what he believed to be a mailing list of the Philadelphia Council of American-Soviet Friendship.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-5 advised that in the Fall of 1947 the name Mrs. ModARD S. MEAD, 214 S. McAlpin Street, Philadelphia, appeared on what he believed to be the mailing list of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Council for a Democratic Greece.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-6, a reliable informant who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, advised during January 1948 that the name Mrs. E. S. FEAD, 214 S. McAlpin Street, Philadelphia, Pa., appeared on what he believed constituted a mailing list of the Spanish Refugee Appeal of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, who declined to furnish a signed statement or appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board, advised in December 1947 that the name Mrs. EDWARD SHARWOOD INAD, 214 S. McAlpin Street, Philadelphia, appeared on a list which the informant believed to be a mailing list of the Forum of the Philadelphia School of Social Science and Art.

The Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee, the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Philadelphia School of Social Science and Art, and the American Council for a Democratic Greece have all been declared by Attorney General TOIC. CLARK as coming within the purview of Part III, Section 3, of Executive Order #9835.

Married REO FRANKLIN FORTUNE, October 8, 1928, at Auckland, New Zealand; divorced him September 26, 1935, at Hermosillo, Senora, Mexico, on the grounds of desertion.

Married GREGORY BATESON, March 13, 1936, at Singapore, China.

Employment: October 1, 1946, to present time, part-time as Consultant in Mental Health (Anthropology), United States Public Health Service, New York City.

September 1, 1926, to date, Associate Curator, American Museum of National History, New York City.

January, 1942 to July, 1945, National Research Council, Washington, D. C.

#### II. BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION

In 1942, Confidential Informant New York City T-1, of known reliability, advised that one MARGARET MEAD was a member of the National Committee for People's Rights, and that her name was listed as being eligible for election to the Executive Committee.

The National Committee for People's Rights was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities on March 29, 1944 and June 25, 1942. The Attorney General, the Honorable FRANCIS BIDDLE, stated in the Congressional Record on September 24, 1924, that this organization was formerly the National Committee for Defense of Political Prisoners. The latter organization was declared by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

#### III. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Confidential Informant New York City T-1 was recontacted and he advised he could furnish no further information concerning the MARGARET MEAD who was a member of the National Committee for People's Rights in 1942. He declined to furnish a signed statement and said he would not appear as a witness before a Loyalty Hearing Board.

Confidential Informant New York City T-2, of known reliability and who is conversantwith Communist activity in the New York Area, stated in

1941, that the National Committee for People's Rights was controlled by the Communist Party, and that this organization was formerly known as the National Committee for Defense of Political Prisoners.

confidential Informant New York City T-3, a municipal agency conducting security investigations, advised their records reflect that one MARGARET MEAD was a member of the National Committee for People's Rights in 1940. An afficial 7 this agency advised that this information was seemed by a presently unknown employee of T-3 and the

The employee, in her Application for Federal Employment in 1944, indicated affiliation with the following organizations:

East and West Association, Foster Parents' Plan for War Children, United China Relief.

In October, 1948, Confidential Informant New York City T-4, a government agency conducting security and intelligence investigations, advised that the "East and West Association," conscientiously followed the Communist Party line.

This informant was recontacted and stated he had no further information concerning this organization. He said that his records merely reflected a report on this organization in which the information was obtained from a former employee of the East and West Association. According to the report, this employee stated "that the organization is in favor of the theories of the Soviet Union, but they much prefer the program of world-wide revolution of the Fourth International; that is, the Trotskyite Party. At present their activities support the withdrawal of United States Troops and missions from the Orient; apologize for and explain the views of the Communist in China, the Rebels in Indonesia, and the Soviets established North Korean Government."

Confidential Informant New York City T-4 said the records did not disclose the identity of the employee and that nothing is known of his reliability.

The Communist Party has been declared by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

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Concerning "Foster Parents! Plan for War Children," it is to be noted that in the reports of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 78th Congress, Second Session, page 745 of Appendix IX, this organisation is referred to as being a Communist front.

Confidential Informant New York City T-5, a government agency conducting security and intelligence investigation, advised in June of 1947, that the "United Service to China, Incorporated," formerly "United China Relief, Incorporated," had been infiltrated by the Communists

This informant was recontacted and he stated that this information was obtained from three prominent persons intimately familiar with the internal affairs of this organization. He said these persons reported "that two of the coordinating agencies within the framework of the above organizations have been identified as Communist dominated organizations."

This informant advised that these persons requested their identity not be disclosed. He stated, however, that all are prominent persons and are of known reliability.

The "Daily Worker," an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, issue of December 16, 1940, reflects that Dr. MARGARET MEAD of the American Museum of Natural History was a visitor at the "Conferences of Young Women," on December 14, 1940, at which time she was called upon to speak. Wing This article is attached as Wight A.

Confidential Informant New York City T-6, of known reliability, advised that the above organization was of a transient temporary nature and is apparently no longer in existence. He stated that the purposes of the meeting in 1940, was to bring together young women who were officials and members of reported Communist front organizations. He said that officials and members of both the Communist Party and the Young Communist Leagues were present at this conference and asserted strong influence in discussions.

The records of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, Washington, D. C., reflect that one MARGARET MEAD was a sponsor of the 'National Wartime Conferences of the Professions, the Sciences, the Arts and the White Collar Fields,' held on May 8 and 9, 1943, at the Hotel Commodore and the Hotel Biltmore, New York, New York.

Confidential Informant New York City T-7, a reliable informant, stated that the group was a Communist front organization and that many of the participants were well known for their Communist affiliation.

It is noted that the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives stated in 1944 (Appendix IX, pp 1335-8), "The National Wartime Conference of the Professions, the Sciences, the Arts and the White Collar Fields was held in New York City on May 8 and 9, 1943. This program and the committees were "stacked with well known Communists and fellow-travellars." The right power of the information and not be accurate.

The August 11, 1945, issue of the "New York Amsterdam News, a weekly Negro newspaper published in New York City, reflected that Dr. MARGARET MEAD was chairman of the inter-racial relations section of the Downtown Community School.

Records of Abbott and Adams, Incorporated, Real Estate Agents, 13 Astor Place, New York City, reflect that Dr. MARGARET MEAD was listed as one of the trustees of the Downtown Community School in 1945, when that organization purchased from Abbott and Adams, Incorporated, a building located at 235 East 11th Street, New York City.

According to the November, 1948, Manhattan telephone directory, the Downtown Community School is located at 235 East 11th Street.

Confidential Informant New York City T-8, of known reliability, advised in 1947 that Dr. MARGARET MEAD had been one of the lecturers scheduled during the first semester of 1946 at the Downtown Communisty School. This informant is not available for re-interview as his whereabouts are unknown.

Confidential Informant New York City T-9, of unknown reliability, advised in July, 1945, that the Downtown Community School was either directly or indirectly controlled by the Communist Party. This informant was not re-interviewed as he has moved away from New York City and his present address is unknown.

Confidential Informant of known reliability and who is familiar with Communist activities in the New York City Area, advised that the Downtown Community School has been dominated by the Communist Party since its organization in 1944. This informant said he did not know Dr. MARGARET MEAD.

The Communist Party has been declared by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

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#### Employment

United States Public Health Service, 15 Pine Street, New York, New York

Mr. NICHOLAS FRUSTACI, Administrative Clerk, Personnel Office, said that he had no record which reflected employment of Dr. MARGARET MEAD. He stated that he was not personally acquainted with Dr. MEAD, but that he understood she was on the "Consultant List," of the United States Public Health Service in Washington, D. C.

Dr. MURRAY A. DIAMOND, Mental Health Consultant, advised he has known of Dr. MEAD for over ten years. He said he is not personally acquainted with her and knows of no one connected with Public Health Service in New York City, who is acquainted with her.

Dr. DIAMOND, however, attempted to locate someone who knew Dr. MEAD personally, but was unsuccessful.

Miss DOROTHY HORRIGAN, secretary, stated she has never met Dr. MEAD, but knows that Dr. MEAD is considered an expert in the field of anthropology and as such is listed on the "Consultant List" of Public Health Service in Washington, D. C.

Mr. JOSEPH B. O'CONNOR, Regional Director, Federal Security Administration, 11 West 42nd Street, New York, New York, advised that he has met Dr. MEAD on several occasions, but that he knows nothing concerning her loyalty. He said he knows that Dr. MEAD is one of the leading experts on anthropology, and as such may be employed as a Consultant by Public Health Service.

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American Museum of Natural History, Central Park West and 79th Street, New York, New York

Miss EUGENIE JATKOWSKA, clerk, Personnel Department, furnished the personnel record of Dr. MARGARET MEAD which reflected she has been employed by the Museum as Associate Curator from September 1, 1926 to date. The record disclosed that Dr. MEAD has been granted a number of "leaves of absences for professional trips outside the United States and for Federal Employment;" no dates were shown. The record contained no information concerning her loyalty.

Miss JATKOWSKA said she has known Dr. MEAD for three years and believes she is a loyal American.

Mr. ADRIAN WARD, Personnel Officer, stated he has known the employee professionaly for twenty-two years and knows she is loyal to the United States. He advised that he is not socially acquainted with the employee, but understands that most of her evenings are spent lecturing to professional societies and that she seldom entertains at her home. He said that, to the best of his knowledge, Dr. MEAD was not affiliated with any organization other than professional societies.

Dr. HARRY S. SHAPTRO, Chairman of the Department of Anthropology, stated he has known the employee for twenty-three years and "considers her loyalty to this country to be above question." He advised that he has "associated socially with Dr. MEAD and her husband, Dr. GREGORY BATESON, since 1936 and that during this time he has never observed anything that would cause him to question their loyalty and patriotism to the United States."

he said that Dr. MEAD is recognized as an authority in anthropology; that she was employed by the Federal Government during the past war and that she has written several books on anthropology. He stated that he has read most of the books and articles written by Dr. MEAD and that he knows these writings contain nothing that would reflect on her loyalty.

Dr. N. C. NELSON, Curator Emeritus of Prehistoric Archaeology, advised he has known the employee professionally since 1926, but that inasmuch as their interests were in different fields and as the employee has spent considerable time abroad, his comments could only be those he has formed from personal observation of Dr. MEAD. He said that "Dr. MEAD appeared to be completely loyal to this country and that to the best of his knowledge was not a member of any group advocating the overthrow of our government."

Mr. EDWIN C. MEYENBERG, Bursan stated he has known Dr. MEAD since 1926 and believes she is a loyal American. He advised that he has met Dr. BATESON, the employee's husband, on several occasions at the Museum, but that he has had no social contact with either.

Mr. WAYNE FAUNCE, Vice-Director, said he has been acquainted professionally with Dr. MEAD since 1926, and believes she is a loyal American. He stated that she is an outstanding authority in the field of anthropology, having written a number of books on the subject. He advised that he has read many of these books and that nothing that Dr. MEAD has written reflects on her loyalty to the United States.

#### Vassar College Poughkeepsie, New York

Miss VEIMA GOODING, Secretary to the President of Vassar College, said that the school's records reflected that during the years 1939-40, 1940-41 and 1941-42, Dr. MARGARET MEAD was on the faculty as a visiting lecturer. She stated that Dr. MEAD lectured at the college for a two hour period on an average of once or twice a month. She advised that the record also reflected that Dr. MEAD had been associated with the Vassar Summer Institute in 1945. She said the record contained no information concerning the employee's loyalty and that she was not personally acquainted with her.

Mrs. DOROTHY LEE, Associate Professor of Anthropology, stated she has known Dr. MEAD professionally for seven years. She advised that Dr. MEAD had been a visiting lecturer at Vassar College during the period 1939 to 1945 and was an outstanding consultant in her field of anthropology. She said she believed Dr. MEAD to be a loyal and patriotic American and that she had never heard the employee express any comment that would reflect on her loyalty.

Mrs. LEE stated that Dr. MEAD had worked on a project with Dr. RUTH BENEDICT, now deceased, which was for maintaining peace. She said they, Drs. MEAD and BENEDICT, had explained "that one important way to maintain peace was to start from scratch as far as other people were concerned and find out why they acted as they did." She stated that Dr. MEAD'S part in the project was to study Russia. "Last spring," according to Mrs. LEE, "the information gathered on Russia was correlated and Dr. MEAD wrote a critical report on Russia in which she stated that our diplomatic relations with Russia should be carried on with diligence and viligance since Russia was not to be trusted.

in her dealings with strangers." Mrs. IEE advised that as a result of this report she believes that Dr. MEAD, was and is very much opposed to Communism and its teachings and principles.

Miss MARION JEUDERINE, Secretary of the Vassar College Child Study Department, said she has known the employee professionally since July, 1945. She stated that from July to August, 1945, Dr. MEAD was a member of the Vassar Summer Institute Faculty and taught child guidance. She advised that during that period she had not heard the employee discuss any subject other than those relevant to her teaching and consequently she was not in a position to make a statement concerning her loyalty.

Community Service Society, 105 East 22nd Street, New York, New York

Miss ANNA KEMPSHALL, Director of Family Service, stated she has known Dr. MARGARET MEAD professionally for seven years. She advised that Dr. MEAD was never directly employed by the society, but that from February until December, 1941, she was working as a research consultant in cooperation with another anthropologist, and was paid from funds provided by the Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation. She said she believed that Dr. MEAD was entirely loyal to the United States and that, to the best of her knowledge, Dr. MEAD was not a member of any organization other than professional societies.

Miss RUTH GERRISH, Assistant Director of Family Service, stated she had known Dr. MEAD professionally during the year 1941, but that she did not feel qualified to comment on her loyalty.

Mr. STANLEY P. DAVIES, General Director, advised he has known Dr. MARGARET MEAD on a professional basis for over ten years, but that he is not personally acquainted with her and does not desire to comment on her loyalty.

Mrs. H. IDA ESSENWEIN, Receptionist, said she met Dr. MEAD in 1941, when Dr. MEAD was doing a special research project for the society, but that she was not personally acquainted with her and knew nothing concerning her loyalty.

Social Science Research Council 230 Park Avenue, New York, New York

Miss CAROLYN E. ALLEN, Controller, furnished the personnel file on Dr. MARGARET MEAD which reflected the following information:

From July 1, 1928 to June 30, 1929, the employee received a post-doctoral fellowship; during the fiscal year 1934-35, Dr. MEAD did research work on a study entitled "Area of Competitive-Cooperative Habits," and during the fiscal year 1936-37, Dr. MEAD received a \$500.00 grant-in-aid to complete some research work.

Miss ALLEN said the record did not indicate that Dr. MEAD had ever been employed by the Council and that there was no information in the record concerning the employee's loyalty. She stated the Council grants financial assistance to students to enable them to complete a particular piece of research work.

She advised that she has known of Dr. MEAD by reputation for a number of years, but does not know her personally.

Dr. LEONARD S. COTTRELL, Jr., Dean of the Literary College, Cornell University, and a member of the Social Science Research Council, said he knows of Dr. MEAD and has heard her speak at professional societies, but that he does not know her personally and know nothing concerning her loyalty.

Mr. PAUL WEBBINK, Vice-President, stated he does not know Dr. MEAD and that, to the best of his knowledge, she has never been employed by the Council.

### Neighborhood

72 Perry Street, New York, New York

Mrs. LAWRENCE FRANK said she has known Dr. MARGARET MEAD and her husband, Dr. GREGORY BATESON, since September, 1942. She stated that she and her husband, Dr. LAWRENCE FRANK, own this two family building and that Dr. MEAD and her husband have resided in the first floor apartment since September, 1942. She advised that she considered them to be loyal to the United States

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Government and that to the best of her knowledge they were only affiliated with professional societies.

Mrs. FRANK said Dr. MEAD and her husband entertained very little and that she was not acquainted with any of their associates. She stated that Dr. MEAD has traveled a great deal since 1942 and has spent considerable time in foreign countries. She advised that Dr. MEAD is an authority on anthropology and lectured on this subject three or four nights a week as well as being an Associate Curator at the American Museum of Natural History.

Mr. LOUIS MESSOLONGHITES, 74 Perry Street, said he knows Dr. MEAD by sight, but has never met her. He stated that she and her husband have resided at 72 Perry Street since 1942, but that he knows nothing concerning her loyalty or associates.

Mr. WALDO RUESS, 74 Perry Street, advised he knows that Dr. MARGARET MEAD has occupied the first floor apartment in Dr. FRANK'S home, but that he is not personally acquainted with either family. He said he knew nothing concerning their loyalty.

Mrs. ROSWELL WARD, 70 Perry Street, stated she has resided at this address for two years, and is not personally acquainted with any of her neighbors. She advised that she knows Dr. MEAD by sight and that she resides at 72 Perry Street, but that she does not feel qualified to comment on Dr. MEAD'S loyalty.

#### 43 West 93rd Street New York, New York

Mrs. HOWARD FOLIN, apartment 26, a resident for fifteen years; Mrs. MARY T. FRESCHI, apartment 21, a resident for twenty years; and Mrs. SAMUEL PAUL, rental agent, advised they do not recall the employee ever residing in building during the period they have resided there.

Mr. WILLIAM REEKMAN, superintendent, said he has held this position since June, 1948 and that his records do not reflect any former tenant named MEAD or RATESON.

Miss B. KRISS, Bookkeeper, George Meyer and Company, Incorporated, 72nd Street and 3rd Avenue, stated this company had been the rental agent for the property located at 43 West 93rd Street, during the period 1939 to 1942.

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She advised that her records failed to reflect any former tenant named MEAD or BATESON.

It is to be noted that in the "Request for Report on Loyalty Data," executed by the employee, she listed as her address 43 West 93rd Street, from 1940 to 1942. According to the records of the Board of Elections for New York County, MARGARET MEAD registered from 43 West 93rd Street in 1940.

358 West 22nd Street New York, New York

Miss MARIE E. EICHELBERGER, apartment 1, Social Worker, said she has known Dr. MARGARET MEAD since 1922, when they were classmates at Barnard College. She stated that the employee had resided in her apartment at this address from September, 1939 to February, 1940, when she, the employee, had moved to 43 West 93rd Street. She stated that previous to September, 1939, the employee had resided on West 102nd Street, but that she does not recall the exact address. She also stated in 1936 she had resided on West 102nd Street and that Dr. MEAD had resided on the same street, but that she cannot remember the addresses.

Miss EICHELBERGER advised that she "has always found Dr. MEAD to be a loyal American and that to the best of her knowledge, Dr. MEAD was not a member of any organization that advocated the overthrow of the United States Government."

Mrs. SOPHIE VAN S. THEIS, Apartment 2, said she has known Dr. MEAD since 1939. She stated she first met the employee when Dr. MEAD was residing in the apartment of Miss EICHELBERGER. She advised that she is not a close friend of Dr. MEAD, but has met her socially a number of times since 1939 and believes her to be a loyal person.

253 West 102nd Street New York, New York

Mr. JULIUS SCHAUL, apartment 4-B, and Mrs. O. KOHL, apartment 1-A, said they have resided in the building over ten years and do not recall the employee.

# 251 West 102nd Street New York, New York

Dr. HYMAN LEVY, apartment 1-B, stated he has owned the building, which includes the addresses 251 and 253 West 102nd Street, since 1941. He advised that all the old tenant records were destroyed and that he has no record prior to 1941. He said that Mr. M. REICEMAN and Miss JANE REDLICH are the only tenants at 251 West 102nd Street, who were there prior to 1941.

Mr. M. REIEMAN, apartment 1-A and Miss JANE REDLICK, apartment 3-A, stated they have resided at this address ten and eight years respectively, and that they do not recall any former tenant named MEAD or BATESON.

Loyalty Data, listed as her address 253 West 102nd Street, from March, 1939 to September, 1939. In her Application for Federal Employment, she listed as her address 251 West 102nd Street in 1936.

# 419 West 119th Street New York, New York

Miss L. COUTURE, Apartment Office Secretary for nine years, and Mrs. M. FANELLI, apartment office clerk for twenty-one years, said they do not recall the employee residing at this address. They stated that there are no tenant records maintained for the years prior to 1940 and that none of the present tenants have resided there over ten years.

The personnel records of Columbia University reflected that in 1923 MARGARET MEAD was residing at 419 West 119th Street. The exact dates of residence were not shown. The records of the Board of Elections for New York County reflect that in 1924, MARGARET CRESSMAN registered from 419 West 119th Street.

Barnard College 119th Street and Broadway New York, New York

Mrs. MARY B. FLYNN, Assistant Placement Director, furnished the record of MARGARET MEAD which reflected the following information:

She was born December 16, 1901, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; attended Doylestown High School, Doyleston, Pennsylvania and Holmquist School, New Hope, Pennsylvania, graduating from the latter in 1919. She attended De Pauw University, Green Castle, Indiana, from 1919 to 1920 and Barnard College, New York City, from 1920 to 1923, receiving a Eachelor of Arts Degree in 1923. The record contained no information concerning her loyalty.

Mrs. FLYNN said she has known Dr. MEAD since 1920 and that the employee is one of the outstanding graduates of the college. She stated that she was formerly on the staff of the Physical Education Department at Barnard College and that MAPGARET MEAD had been one of her students. She advised that she did not know Dr. MEAD socially, but has known her professionally for twenty-eight years and has always considered her to be a loyal American.

Mrs. FLYNN said that to the best of her knowledge she is the only person at the college who was acquainted with the employee during her student days.

Columbia University, 116th Street and Broadway New York, New York

Miss JOAN KENNEDY, Registrar's Office, furnished the personnel record of the employee which reflected the employee had attended graduate school from September, 1923 to June, 1925, receiving a Master of Arts Degree, June h, 192h, and her Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Anthropology, November 23, 1928. The period from 1925 to 1928 was utilized by the employee in writing her thesis which was titled, "An Inquiry into the Cuestion of Cultural Stability in Polynesia." The record did not contain any information concerning the employee's loyalty.

If iss KENNEDY said she did not know Dr. MEAD. She stated, however, that the schedule of courses reflect that Dr. MEAD will teach a course in Education at the University during the coming spring term, 1949.

Dr. W. D. STRONG, Head of the Department of Anthropology, advised that he has known the employee professionally since 1928, and that he worked with Dr. MEAD on the Food Habits Committee of the National Research Council in Washington, P. C. from 1942 to 1944. He said that he believes her to be a loyal and patriotic American.

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Dr. ALFRED L. KROFFER, Professor of Anthropology, stated he has known Dr. MEAD socially and professionally since 1925. He advised that Dr. GRIGORY RATESON, husband of the employee, taught at the University in 1947, and that he, Dr. KROFFER, "is absolutely confident that both are loyal to the United States Covernment.

He said the employee has written many books and articles on anthropology and that she is recognized as one of the leading experts in that field. He stated that he has read many of her writings and none of them reflect in any manner on her loyalty.

# References and Associates

The following individuals were listed by the employee as references and/or associates in her application for Federal employment:

Mr. David VORHAUS, attorney, 521 Fifth Avenue, New York City, said he has known Dr. MMAD socially and professionally for twenty years. He stated that he "knows the employee is one hundred per cent loyal to the United States and is not a member of any Un-American organization." He advised that Dr. MEAD is very much opposed to Communism and ardently believes in the American form of government.

Miss VIRGINIA C. GILDFRSLEEVE, apartment 11-S, 35 Claremont Avenue, New York City, advised that she was formerly Dean of Barnard College, until she retired in 1946. She said she has known Dr. MEAD professionally for many years and had traveled to England with her during the past war when Dr. MEAD was employed by the Office of War Information. Miss GILDWESLEEVE advised that she did not know Dr. MEAD socially except for infrequent meetings at Barnard alumnae dinners and such occasions. In her opinion, Miss GILDERSLEEVE stated, she considers Dr. MEAD to be avery capable and distinguished anthropologistal and a loyal American citizen.

Miss CLARE HOWARD, apartment 4-S, 29 Claremont Avenue, New York City, advised that she is now retired, but was formerly professor of English at Barnard College. Miss HOWARD stated that Dr. MEAD was a member of one of her English classes many years ago. Miss HOWARD further advised that she has casually known Dr. MEAD socially for a number of years and has heard her speak several times at reunion dinners for Barnard alumnae. Miss HOWARD stated that she considers Dr. MEAD to be a very intelligent woman, one who uses sound judgement and common sense, and that to the best of her knowledge she is a loyal American citizen.

Mrs. RITA D. RAPHAEL, 20 East 11th Street, New York City, advised that she has known Dr. MEAD casually for a number of years and has only met her infrequently at social teas and alumnae dinners at Barnard College. However, to the best of her knowledge, Mrs. RAPHAEL stated, Dr. MEAD has never indicated that she is other than a loyal American citizen.

Mr. JESSE S. RAPHAEL, 20 East llthStreet, New York City, hmsband of Mrs. RITA RAPHAEL, advised that he has known of Dr. MEAD, through Mrs. RAPHAEL'S acquaintance with her, for a number of years. He advised that Dr. MEAD is considered to be an eminent anthropologist, and to the best of his knowledge, she is a loyal American citizen.

Mrs. BOUGHTON COBB, Social Worker, 25 East End Avenue, New York City, advised that she has known Dr. MEAD and her husband, Dr. BATESON, professionally and socially for many years. Mrs. COBB stated that she is positive that both Dr. MEAD and Dr. BATESON are loyal Americans and ware not members of any organization which advocates the overthrow of the United States Government.

# Miscellaneous

The records of the Board of Elections for New York County reflect the following information:

In 1924, MARGARET MEAD, 419 West 119th Street, New York City, registered for one of the two major political parties; in 1940, MARGARET BATESON, 43 West 93rd Street, New York City, registered for one of the two major political parties and in 1944, 1945 and 1946, MARGARET BATESON, 72 Perry Street, New York City, registered for one of the two major political parties. The records failed to disclose any registration for the years 1925 to 1939 inclusive and 1941 to 1943 inclusive.

The records of Confidential Informant New York City T-10, a government agency conducting personnel investigations, advised they had no record of the employee.

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York contained no information concerning the employee's loyalty.

The records of the New York City Police Department did not contain any arrest record for the employee or her husband, Dr. GREGORY BATESON.

Employment at the American Museum of Natural History and neighbor-hoods at 43 West 93rd Street, 253 West 102nd Street and 358 West 22nd Street. Also interviewed Miss VTRGINIA GILDERSLEEVE, Mr. DAVID VORHAUS, Miss CLARE HOWARD, and Mrs. RTTA RAPHAFL.

SE CLINTON POLLOCK checked Election Records.

SE RALPH MURDY checked Credit Records.

SA ARTHUR J. TROWER, Jr., checked Bureau of Special Services and Investigation.

SA WILLIAM POWELL checked G-2 Records.

SA JOHN J. McKFNNA checked ONI Records.

SA WILLIAM McCUF checked CSC records and reported no record for employee.

Regarding Washington Field Office letter of December 28, 1948. The following references and/er associates of the employee were unavailable for interview and their present whereabouts are unknewn:

LAWRENCE K. FRANK, Dr. CLARK WISSLER, Dr. H. B. RICHARDSON, Mrs. N. HARRIS, ARTHUR M. LOFB, ELEANOP M. PHILLIPS, MARY MANDELBAUM and Dr. RALPH LINTON.

Some of the information set out in reference letter covering records of the House Committee on Un-American Activities is not being included in this report because of lack of identifying data.

The records of the New York Police Department failed to disclese any member of the force named MAKE (or MIKE) MILLS. Also, no report could be located concerning one MARGARET MEADE.

Most of the organizations listed in the above mentioned letter are not in the indices of the New York Office. Also, those in the indices fail to reflect any information pertinent to this program.

The information furnished by Confidential Informant New York City T-3 was obtained by an employee of Confidential Informant New York City T-3 and is noted on 3 X 5 card. Original brochure is not available.

Confidential Informant New York City T-6 is no longer employed by the Hotel Riverside Plaza and his present whereabouts are unknown.

Confidential Informant New York City T-7 is not in New York City at the present time and no lead is being set out to interview him, inasmuch as the information furnished by him related to persons in the Actors Equity Association and to organizations with which they were affiliated.

In the report of SA THOMAS M. CORBETT, New York City, August 5, 1943, entitled "RUDOLPH HOST, was., Denaturalization Proceedings - G" it is stated that Dr. MARGARET MEAD'S name appears on the mailing list of the "Daily Worker." The indices of the New York Office fail to reflect any information concerning this list and there is no reference to the original source of this information in the above report. In view of this, the above information is not being included in instant report.

It is to be noted that in the report of SA J. WRIGHT BROWN, New York City, August 28, 1943, entitled "MARGARET BATESON, nee MEAD, Employee Investigation, Office for Emergency Management," inquiry in the neighborhood of 432 East 16th Street, New York City, failed to disclose any information concerning a Neighborhood Center or a League of Homeless Women. This neighborhood is now part of a housing development and inquiry has failed to develop any information concerning a League of Homeless Women.

Records of the House Committees on Un-American Activities, Washington D. C. reflect that in a report of Lieutenant MAKE MILLS, Chicago Police Department, one MARGARET MFADE, New York City, is reported as being a Communist in 1933 and as being Secretary of the League of Homeless Women. This information was obtained according to this record from the August 18, 1933, issue of the "Daily Worker," page six, column seven. The article was entitled "Lower Manhattan Jobless March to Relief Bureau Today." The article reflects that an organization committee of twenty-five was elected and temporary headquarters were established at the Neighborhood Center, 132 East 16th Street, New York, New York.

"The Daily Worker," is an East Coast Communist Newspaper.

The records of the Bureau of Special Services and Investigation.
New York City Police Department, and the records of
an agency maintaining business organization information,
failed to reveal any information concerning either the Neighborhood Center
at 432 East 16th Street or the League of Homeless Women.

A search of the Manhattan telephone directories for the years 1932 to 1948 inclusive, failed to reveal any listing for either the Neighborhood Center or the League of Homeless Women.

The address 432 East 16th Street is now part of the "Stuyvesant Town" Housing Development and no investigation was conducted in that area.

The files of the New York Office fail to disclose any information concerning the League of Homeless Women.

The files disclose information concerning one MARGARET MEADE, born in Oklahoma, who is not identical to the appointee. However, it is to be noted there is no information pertaining to any Communist activity on MARGARET MEADE'S part.

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

# RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Mr. FRED R. EGGAN, Associate Professor of Anthropology, University of Chicago, residence at 1222 East 52nd Street, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has been acquainted with MARGARET MEAD since about 1935. Mr. EGGAN advised that he does not consider himself an intimate friend of Employee, stating that he became acquainted with Employee primarily because of their mutual interest in the field of anthropology. He stated that he has seen Employee only periodically, usually on social occasions, during his entire acquaintance with her. Mr. EGGAN stated that his most frequent contact with MARGARET MEAD occurred from about 1942 or 1943 until 1945 or 1946 when MARCARET MEAD was employed by either the Joint Medical Committee of the Food Habits Committee or the National Research Council of the Food Habits Committee in Washington, D. C. Mr. EGGAN stated that he was also interested in food habits and was in Washington, D. C., during most of this period of time. However, he stated that he and MARCARET MEAD were not employed by the same agency, but had considerable contact because of the mutual interest in food habits.

Mr. EGGAN stated that he had met Employee's husband. GREGORY BATESON. a British citizen, but was not well acquainted with him.

Mr. EGGAN stated that he had never questioned Employee's loyalty and could think of nothing that had ever occurred during his acquaintance with her

that might reflect on her loyalty. He stated that likewise he had no information reflecting upon the loyalty of Employee's husband, GREGORY BATESON. Mr. EGGAN stated that he knew of no organizations of which Employee or her husband was a member.

By letter of September 27 Senator Mansfield forwarded several copies of correspondence relating to the appearance of Bennett Cerf and Margaret Meade before the State Convention of the Montana Education Association (MEA). Our relations with Mansfield have been cordial.

over the appearance of these two because of distribution of literature from the Cinema Educational Guild, Inc. (CEG) which lists both Cerf and Meade as communist and/or "fellow travelers." Bufiles contain nothing derogatory regarding Mr. Cerf whose name appears on the Special Correspondents' List on a first-name basis. We have never investigated Mr. Cerf. Bufiles indicate that in 1951 we conducted an investigation concerning Dr. Meade (Mrs. Gregory Bateson) pursuant to Executive Order 98 35. Information in the Chicago Office indicated that she was a member of the "League of Homeless Women" which has been cited. Our investigation did not develop any information which would question her loyalty to the country. The Civil Service Commission (CSC) made a determination that both she and her husband could continue in their positions with the Department of Public Health on the basis of loyalty.

The CEG and its national director, Myron C. Fagan, are well known to the Bureau. This is anirresponsible organization which circulates numerous tracts alleging "exposure" of communists and fellow travelers in the entertainment industry. Some of its material contains the statement that information contained in its pamphlets can be documented in the files of government investigating agencies. This group has been responsible for the distribution of anti-Negro and anti-Semitic pamphlets also. Fagan has, in the past, attempted to use the Director's name in the furtherance of his programs, and it has been necessary on several occasions to contact him and request that he refrain from mentioning the FBI in any manner.

It is felt that someone in your office should contact Senator Mansfield's Administrative Assistant and advise him on a confidential basis

Margaret Mead, anthropologist and. apostle of single cussedness, was in town recently to take another whack at marriage, the curse of the race.

Like a wedding ring, this closes a circle of some kind. Miss Mead. decades ago, began the continuing criticism of American marriage with her reports on how much better the South Sea Islanders manage these things. Shortly thereafter Philip Wylie, a writer who has made a very good thing out of the Collapse of Western Civilization, discovered Momism as a malady. We learned that the only real trouble with our troublesome children is that they all have these frightful Moms.

Rejoining the chorus she had started, Miss Mead a couple of years ago accused American women, in a particularly well-chosen phrase, of a "retreat" into fecundity." Apparently too many promising young anthropologettes were marrying and bearing children instead: of administering questionnaires to other people's kids.

Our own Dorothy Goldberg, in gentler tones, has been evangelizing women to stop crocheting those anti-macassars; they should get out and do abstract

painting instead.

Finally, the President's Commission on the Status of Women has reported that the fair sex in this country is a repressed majority that infuriatingly accepts its own repression in many areas. Though women outnumber men by almost 4 million, they cheerfully accept lower status in politics, law, labor and big business.

We don't disagree with all this; we merely would add a footnote or two: As amateur students of fecundity and even as occasional contributors to it, it has never struck us as a retreat, exactly. More of an ambush. If we were a woman, surrounded by either wall-to-wall babyfood or raucous teen-agers, our idea of a retreat would be something quieter. Like anthropology.

- Then too, the status-seeking commission struck us as notably deficient in actual, workaday, non-public-lifetype wives and mothers. There is just a possibility that the average American

wife and mother doesn't take more interest in politics and the rest because she has more important things to do.

She already has a job.

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### RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

#### EMPLOYMENT

On October 15, 1963 the personnel file for Dr. MARGARET MEAD was reviewed at the Department of State. This file showed she was given an excepted appointment as a consultant in the Human Resources and Development Office of the Bureau of International Organization Affairs, effective July 25, 1963. She will serve as a member of a panel on social development through the United Nations (UN) and related organizations on social issues confronting the UN system of organization. The personnel file indicated she will occupy a non-sensitive position and shall not have access to classified defense information or to restricted areas of the Department of State.

Mr. HENRY J. SABATINI, Bureau of International Organization Affairs, advised on October 15, 1963 he has never met the employee, but stated she will work on an advisory committee in Washington, D.C. under his indirect supervision.

#### REFERENCE

Dr. ISABEL CARTER, 2039 New Hampshire Avenue, N.W. advised on October 21, 1963 she has known the employee since 1922. Dr. CARTER said at that time the employee was attending Barnard College and Dr. CARTER was taking graduate work at Columbia University. Dr. CARTER subsequently moved to Philadelphia and resided with the employee's parents there and did know the employee's parents socially. Dr. CARTER advised that the employee has one daughter, CATHERINE BATESON KASSARJIAN, who is a professor of languages at Harvard University.

Dr. CARTER advised that the employee is a well-known anthropologist as is her former husband Dr. GREGORY BATESON. She said she knows the employee has been affiliated with many organizations throughout the world but she had no knowledge that any of her affiliations were with organizations whose aims and

purposes would be against the best interests of the United States. Dr. CARTER stated she would be very surprised if the employee had ever associated herself with any subversive organizations or groups. She commented that during the many years she has known the employee, there has never been any reason for her to doubt her loyalty, patriotism, or moral character.

Dr. H. E. PAGE, Director, Office of Institutional Programs, National Science Foundation, 1424 K Street, N.W. advised on October 22, 1963 that he has known the employee professionally since 1950. He became associated with her in the Office of Naval Research when she was a member of an Advisory Committee. He has seen her very infrequently since that time and could not furnish any information as to her employments or associates. He considers the employee as one of the most brilliant persons he has met and said he would highly recommend her for a position in the government as he has no reason to question her patriotism, and does not believe she would be a security risk if employed in a position where she has access to classified information.

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Mrs. FRANCES CHADWICK RINTZ advised she is employed as a Senior Research Analyst by the Foreign Areas Study Division of the American University Iocated at 5010 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W. Mrs. RINTZ said that she was socially and professionally acquainted with the employee during the World War II area. said that the employee never expressed any sympathy for communism or facism and to her knowledge never engaged in any subversive activities. 

On 9/20/62, Mr. JEROME T. GASPARD, Consul General of the United States at Montreal, Canada, advised that an International Conference of Women was held in Montreal, Canada, from 9/10/62 to 9/16/62. This conference was held under the auspices of the Canadian Voice of Women (VOW). The source stated that, from its beginning, the conference represented a "troika-like" forum with representatives present from the Western nations, the Communist bloc and the newly independent neutralist states. Mr. GASPARD's memorandum noted that, on balance, the conference manifested a predilection, 10 critize the west more than the east as a possible threat to the peace of the world. It was noted that the absence of a strong-pro-western voice tended to create a propaganda opening which was readily filled by the Communist and internationally minded pacifists. Mr. GASPARD stated that Dr. MARGARET MEAD, the well known Anthropologist, delivered the conferences main address and became an honorary member of VOW. The source advised that Dr. MEAD's address failed to counter critizism of the west which had prevailed at this conference. Dr. MEAD praised VOW for its "peace efforts" and expressed her conviction that lasting peace should not be considered impossible.

This letter was signed by the VOW Executive Committee, KATHERINE K. MARSHALL, Chairman.

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Review of NY files discloses no association, affiliation or interest of the employee in The Mattachine Foundation, Inc., or any of its affiliated groups or publications. Inasmuch as the only reference between the employee and this organization was the excerpt from the employee's book, "Coming of Age in Samoa", which deals with the homosexual and heterosexual relations of Samoans, no significance was noted. This is not deemed pertinent and is not being included. A review of this book of the employee is incorporated into this report. It is further noted that "Coming of Age in Samoa" was published in 1928 and the Mattachine movement had its inception in 1950.

Information is contained herein that HADASSAH SIMHA contacted the subscriber to telephone number CH 3-8236, Mrs. MARGARET MEAD BATESON.

The following is noted concerning SIMHA:

A former informant, who was formerly under development as a double agent of this Bureau, had been approached on two separate occasions by Israeli intelligence agents, both in the US and in Israel, to furnish official US Government information to the Israelis. On both occasions that this informant had been contacted by the Israelis, the name and address of HADASSAH SIMHA was given to him as the individual to whom the material requested should be furnished.

(conceal) advised on October 1, 1959, HADASSAH SIMHA, on that date, who had been reassigned to Israel from her position as Secretary to the Consul General at the Israeli Consulate, 11 East 70th Street, New York, New York, indicated to him that she would not be able to depart on October 9, as she had originally planned, but that she planned to leave on October 13, 1959. SIMHA advised this source that she had made her plane reservations for October 13, 1959.

The above source advised on October 13, 1959, that on that date, HADASSAH SIMHA extended her departing greetings to her associates and departed for Israel.

NY 100-91470-306, report of SA EDWARD F. MG CARTHY, NY, dated 5/26/51, captioned "JANE FOSTER ZLATOVSKI, was, ESP-R, IS ACT OF 1950" reflects that an anonymous source advised that GREGORY BATESON and MARGARET MEAD were apparently known to JANE FOSTER.

This report further indicates that the bill of JANE FOSTER at the Hotel Langdon, NYC, was charged for a call on 12/23/46, to a telephone number which could have been either that of the Grove Hand Laundry, 53 Grove Street, NYC, or to GREGORY BATESON, 72 Perry Street, NYC.

The above is not being included as the information is not specific and the association of JANE FOSTER and employee is shown through other sources.

Referenced Bureau letter refers to a leaflet advertising a mass meeting held under the auspices of the West Side Citizens Committee to Advance Free Public Education. A copy of this leaflet was enclosed with referenced Bulet. Bulet states that this leaflet was described by NY as "This was a Communist front organization". Review of NY files discloses no reference to the West Side Citizens Committee to Advance Free Public Education, and no communication was located describing this leaflet as a Communist front organization.

On October 24, 1963, BENJAMIN GITLOW was recontacted by SA ROBERT L. STEVENSON, JR., at which time he stated that he could furnish no information concerning this organization. In view of the above, this information is not being included in the NY report.



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## SCIENTISTS OF 30 NATIONS,. Daily Worker Reporter TO MEET

Daily Worker Reporter
SOME of the world's top scientists will discuss problems of disarmament and world security when they meet in London for the tenth Pugwash Conference.

There will be scientists from more than 30 nations, including 50 from the U.S. and 25 from the Soviet Union, when the five-day conference, named after the Canadian village where the first one took place, opens on September 3.

The programme will also inclide discussions on automation, the anticipated increase in world population, international collaboration among scientists, and how science can aid developing nations,

#### Soriet atom men

The scientists may decide to create a permanent organisation for the continuation of the Pugwash conferences in future.

British scientists taking part include Sir John Cockcroft, Sir Howard Florey, president of the Royal Society, Sir Julian Huxley, Lord Russell, Sir Charles Snow, and Sir George Thomson.

It is hoped that Academician Blagonravov, head of the Soviet programme of space research, Prof. Emelyanov, head of the department responsible for atomic research and Soviet delegate to the International Atomic Energy Agency, in Vienna, will also he present.

Other Soviet scientists may include I. V. Federov, socretary

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of the Soviet Academy of Sciences and former leader of the Soviet delegation to the testban-talks at Geneva, Academicians Semenov and Tamm. Nobel Prize winners in chemistry and physics, and Academician A. V. Topchiev, executive vice-president of the U.S.S.R. Academy of Sciences.

#### U.S. participants

Another Nobel Prize winner will be Dr. Linus Pauling, among the American participants.

They will include Dr. D. G. Brennan, an adviser to the U.S. Government on defence. Dr. J. Oppenheimer, former head of the Los Alamos laboratory of the Atomic Energy Commission, and Dr. Victor Weisskopf, director of the European Centre for Nuclear Research at Geneva.

Anthropologist Prof. Margaret Mead, and Dr. Alfred Sabin, developer of the live-virus vaccine against polio, will also be in the American team.

#### RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

The employee's Standard Form 85, Security Investigation Data For Nonsensitive Position, certified August 16, 1963, contains a Supplemental Sheet captioned "Item 8: Organizations with which affiliated". This supplement, in part, contains the following statement of the employee:

"During the last twenty years, I have been involved in a great many security enquiries as well as having been cleared a good many times myself. I know what kinds of points create expensive and time consuming difficulties for investigators. This form covers 38 years of an active professional life, and many years of work outside the United States. I have organized the materials so as to make clearance as easy as possible.

"My last clearance was dated November 18, 1954, from the International Organizations Employees Loyalty Board of the United States Civil Service, Commission File number IIB:TPF, November 18, 1954, for membership in an Ad Hoc Committee of the World Health Organization. This clearance has been referred to and made further clearances unnecessary, for my attendame at (in Paris) a UNESCO Conference in June, 1955, Calcutta, in 1958, and the UN Conference on Science and Technology for the Benefit of the Underdeveloped Areas, January, 1963....

"Queries that have been raised on previous clearances, including clearances earlier than the clearance of November 18, 1954.

"Questions have been raised about my membership in:

11. American Russian Institute - 1947 58 Park Avenue New York, New York

"As director of Columbia University Research in Contemporary Cultures, under ONR contract No-onr-271 T.O. 3, Account no. 990-0610, I took out a membership in the Institute Library, so that members of my research staff could use materials not otherwise available in New York City, needed for research on the USSR. This was a library subscription, not a membership.

"2. My subscription to USSR Information bulletin.

"This was a one year's subscription, in 1949, in connection with a project, American Museum of Natural History Studies in Soviet Culture, conducted under a contract with the Rand Corporation.

"Used for research purposes.

National Committee for Peoples Rights.

"I was never a member of this committee. attended a dinner given in honor of Professor Franz Boas, to which many of his professional colleagues were invited.

"4. Foster Parents Plan for War Children.

"I was not a member of this organization, but I did make contributions through it for the wartime work in England of Miss Anna Freud, specifically ear marked for this purpose, in 1943 and 1944.

"5. United China Relief

"I accepted an invitation from Pearl Buck, dated April 2, 1941, to be on the Women's Committee for that year. The letterhead of the organization carried the name of Mr. Henry Luce, John D. Rockefeller III, and Mrs. F.D. of Mr. Hen: Roosevelt.

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"6. Conference of Young Women, December 14, 1940, reported in the Daily Worker, December 16, 1940

"I attended this meeting, after having been consulted by a recent Vassar graduate on how to attract a cross-section of young women; I was instrumental in interesting a representative of the Junior League, who was sufficiently impressed by the dangers exposed at this meeting to help organize a Young Republican Group. I attended the meeting because I was worried about the emphasis which I thought might be developed there.

"7. National Wartime Conference of the Professions, the Sciences, the Arts, and the White Collar Workers

"I have no record of any association whatsoever with this association."

The employee also furnished a list of 88 organizations, among these listing organizations about which questions have been raised. She stated that all organizations in this category were covered in notes on her 1954 clearance. This list indicates the following:

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#### APPENDIX

#### CONFERENCE OF YOUNG WOMEN

A source advised in 1942 that the "Conference of Young Women" was of a transient temporary nature and is apparently no longer in existence. This source stated that the purpose of the meeting in 1940 of this organization was to bring together young women who were officials and members of both the Communist Party and the Young Communist League (YCL). This source stated that the officials and members of both of these organizations were present at this conference and asserted strong influence in discussions.

The YCL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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#### APPENDIX

#### DOWNTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL

A source advised in July, 1945 that the Downtown Community School was either directly or indirectly controlled by the Communist Party (CP).

Another source advised in 1949 that the Downtown Community School had been dominated by the CP since its organization in 1944.

#### EAST AND WEST ASSOCIATION

In October, 1948, a representative of another government agency which conducts security and intelligence investigations, advised that the East and West Association conscientiously followed the Communist Party line.

This source was recontacted in 1949 and stated he had no further information concerning this organization. He said that his records merely contained a report on this organization in which the information was obtained from a former employee of the East and West Association. According to the report, this employee stated "that the organization is in favor of the theories of the Soviet Union but they much prefer the program of world-wide revolution of the Fourth International; that is, the Trotskyite Party. At present their activities support the withdrawal of United States troops and missions from the Orient; apologize for and explain the views of the Communist in China, the Rebels in Indonesia, and the Soviets established North Korean Government".

The above source could not furnish the source of this information.

C., contains the following concerning the National Committee for People's Rights.

- "1. The National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners, 'substantially equivalent to International Labor Defense, legal arm of the Communist Party,' changed its name 'in January 1938 to National Committee for People's Rights \* \* \* no substantial change was made in its set-up or functions.'

- "2. Cited as a Communist front which succeeded the National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners. 'The organization under its new name remained entirely under the control of the Communist Party.'

NATIONAL WARTIME CONFERENCE OF THE PROFESSIONS, THE SCIENCES, THE ARTS, AND THE WHITE COLLAR WORKERS

In 1947, a source advised that the captioned organization was a Communist front organization and that many of the participants were well known for their Communist affiliations.

The report of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 1944, Appendix IX, paged 1335-8, states that the above captioned conference was held in New York City on May 8 and 9, 1943. This program and the committees were "stacked with well known Communists and fellow-travelers". The original source of this information could not be ascertained.

#### APPENDIX

#### SOUTH EAST ASIA INSTITUTE

WAYNE FAUNCE, Assistant Director, American Museum of Natural History, New York, New York, advised early in 1950 that the captioned organization was a cultural and scientific organization whose purpose was to collect, study and prepare reports regarding cultural and scientific matters of the people of Asia. He stated that it was sometime in 1946, that this institute moved to 1 East 54th Street, New York City, where it had merged with the Institute of Pacific Relations (IPR).

Information concerning the IPR is contained elsewhere in the Appendix of this report.

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#### APPENDIX

#### UNITED CHINA RELIEF

In June, 1947, a representative of another government agency which conducts security and intelligence investigations, advised that the "United Service to China, Incorporated," formerly known as "United China Relief, Incorporated", had been infiltrated by the Communists.

In 1949, this source was recontacted and advised that the above information was obtained from three prominent persons intimately familiar with the internal affairs of this organization. These persons reported "that two of the coordinating agencies within the framework of the above organizations have been identified as Communist dominated organizations".

This source advised that these persons requested their identity not be disclosed. He said, however, that all are prominent persons and are of known reliability.

## RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

The October 1, 1962, issue of the "National Guardian" contains an article pertaining to the Voice of Momen Conference held September 10, 1962, to September 16, 1962, in Montreal, Canada. Doctor MARGARET MEAD, Anthropologist, was listed in the article as one of the United States women who attended the conference. A photostat of the above article is attached as an enclosure.

A characterization of the Voice of Women will be set forth in the report of another division.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" revised and published December 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., cites the "National Guardian" as follows:

"Established by the American Labor Party in 1947 as a 'progressive' weekly\*\*\*. Although it denies having any affiliation with the Communist Party, it has manifested itself from the beginning as a virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia." (Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, Trial by Treason: The National Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and MORTON SOBELL, August 25, 1956, Page 12).

On October 25, 1963, IC DAVID L. DE WEESE reviewed the file for Doctor MEAD at the Passport Office, Department of State, which listed her birth as December 16, 1901, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This file had been reviewed in August, 1954 during a prior investigation and all pertinent information appearing therein since that date is being reported hereinafter.

All applications for passports in the file are in the name of MARGARET MEAD BATESON known as MARGARET MEAD.

On April 19, 1955, she executed a passport application at the New York Passport Agency for from one to three months' travel, with her daughter, in the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Greece, Switzerland, Turkey, and Eire. In its letter dated May 16, 1955, UNESCO requested the Passport Division to renew her previous passport, as she had been asked by them to attend a meeting on the Improvement of Information about Foreign Countries which was being held in Paris, France. from May 31 to June 3, 1955. To this letter they attached a copy of a letter written by their Mr. ARTHUR GAGLIOTTI to Mr. T. PAUL FAIRBANK, Executive Secretary, International Organizations Employees Loyalty Board, stating that a satisfactory investigation was completed in her case by the International Organizations Employees Loyalty Board on November 19, 1954. In its letter dated May 17, 1955, the Passport Office advised her that her application was being considered under the provisions of Section 51.135 of the Passport Regulations since, according to the information in the Department's files, it had been alleged that she was associated with several Communist Party fronts. If she was of the opinion that her case did not fall within the scope of Section 51.135, she should submit an affidavit concerning her eligibility to obtain passport facilities under the Regulations. the Passport Office her affidavit, executed on May 23, 1955, in which she swore that she had never been a member of the Communist Party nor of any organization of the Attorney General's list. She stated that a satisfactory investigation was completed in her case by the International Organizations Employees Board and that in her belief, her case did not fall within the scope of Section 51.135 of the Regulations. She also stated that at the time she applied for the passport she had not yet received an invitation from UNESCO and since she planned to travel in Europe in any case, she considered it wiser to make a routine application. issued Passport #670130 on May 26, 1955, for her proposed travel.

On April 2, 1957, Passport #670130 was renewed by the New York Passport Agency for three to four weeks' travel to England, Norway, Denmark, France, and Belgium for the purpose of lecturing, consulting, and visiting universities, museums, and clinics.

She was issued Passport #1699062 on July 16, 1959, by the New York Passport Agency for two months' travel to Spain, France, and the United Kingdom, to attend meetings of World Federation for Mental Health, Executive Board and Annual Meeting in Barcelona, Spain, tourism and to visit friends. 

Dear Sir:

On Monday, October 27th, I tuned in on your news broadcast at 6:00 P.M. An anthropologist, Margaret Meade, was giving evidence favoring the use of "pot". How often do your commentators or panelists say that "pot" can cause psychological problems, emotional instability, hallucinations, intexication and loss of depth perception? Are you aware that users of heroin and other dangerous drugs invariably start with pot or that to continually get the "kick" from pot the user must increase his intake and more often than not turns to hashish? Following Margaret Meade's delivery, your commentator, whose name I do not recall, said "Margaret Meade is on the side of youth". This was a real shocker! In short, the presentation in question indirectly condoned the use of "pot" by the youth of this country.

Following Margaret Meade's presentation Channel 4 showed a very flattering background portrait of David Dellinger and the commentator stated that he is a leader in the peace movement and one of the leaders of the coming March on Washington. He failed to state that he is generally known as an outright communist intent on the downfall of our society.

The audio and audio-visual news media, by gearing itself to the ultra-left and presenting editorial matter as news, is abusing its privileges under the constitution and causing a polarisation of thinking that is already leading to extremism right and left and could ultimately lead to revolution.

This form covers 38 years of an active professional life, and many years of work outside the United States. I have organised the materials so as to make clearance as easy as possible.

# Where Do You Get That Way?

MARGARET MEAD in "Coming of Age in Samoa"



These casual homosexual relations between girls never assumed any longtime importance. On the part of growing girls or women who were working together they were regarded as a pleasant and natural diversion, just tinged with the salacious. Where heterosexual relationships were so casual, so shallowly channelled, there was no pattern into which homosexual relationships could fall. Native theory and vocabulary recognised the real pervert who was incapable of normal heterosexual response, and the very small population is probably sufficient explanation for the rarity of these types. I saw only one, Sasi, a boy of twenty who was studying for the ministry. He was slightly but not pronouncedly feminine in appearance, was skilled at women's work and his homosexual drive was strong enough to goad him into making continual advances to other boys. He spent more time casually in the company of girls, maintained a more easy-going friendship with them than any other boy on the island. Sasi had proposed marriage to a girl in a pastor's household in a distant village and been refused, but as there was a rule that divinity students must marry before ordination, this has little significance. I could find no evidence that he had ever had heterosexual relations and the girls' casual attitude towards him was significant. They regarded him as an amusing freak while the men to whom he had made advances looked upon him with mingled annoyance and contempt.

The general preoccupation with sex, the attitude that minor sex activities, suggestive dancing, stimulating salacious conversation, salacious songs and definitely motivated tussling are all acceptable and attractive diversions, is mainly responsible for the native attitude towards homosexual practices. They are simply play, neither frowned upon nor given much consideration. As heterosexual relations are given significance not by love and a tremendous fixation upon one individual, the only forces which can make a homosexual relationship lasting and important, but by children and the place of marriage in the economic and social structure of the village, it is easy to understand why very prevalent homosexual practices have no more important or striking results. The recognition and use in heterosexual relations of all the secondary variations of sex activity which loom as primary in homosexual relations are instrumental also in minimising their importance. The effects of chance childhood preversions, the fixation of attention on unusual erogenous zones with consequent transfer of sensitivity from the more normal centres, the absence of a definite and accomplished specialisation of erogenous zones-all the accidents of emotional development which in a civilization, recognizing only one . narrow form of sex activity, result in unsatisfactory marriages, casual homosexuality and prostitution, are here rendered harmless.

## Women chart peace drive at conference in Montreal

MONTREAL

of projects that can be carried on by organizations, families, or mere individuals was proposed at the Voice of Women conference Sept. 10-16 in Montreal. Voice of Women (VOW) was launched two years ago by Canadians concerned about atomic danger. The group now has 6,000 Canadian members, has helped establish a Peace Research Institute and raised \$250,000 for it, has membership on the Joint Plannning Commission of the Candian Association for Adult Education, and has branches in the U.S., Britain, New Zealand and Jamaica.

The immediate goal of the Montreal conference, attended by women from 17 nations and all six continents, was to push for UN adoption of the proposal by Afghanistan, India, Ghana and Nepal for an International Cooperation Year, like the recent successful International Geophysical Year, Another goal was to press for cooperative activity during the year by governments and individuals.

To this end the conference set up a Women's Liaison Committee, headed by the outgoing Canadian president of VOW. Mrs. Helen Tucker, with three members each from the West, the East and the non-aligned nations: for the West, Mrs. Linus Pauling; Diana Collins, wife of Canon Collins of England, and Marie Lous-Mohr, past president of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and chairman of the Norwegian Peace Council; for the the East, Olga Chechetkina of Pravda, secretary of the Soviet Peace Committee; Mirka Hrubesova, medical researcher of Czechoslovakia; and Zofia Dembinska, former Polish associate Minister of Education and now delegate to the UN Assembly; for nonaligned nations, Sarojini Aiyar of New Delhi, worker for the Rama Krishna Mission and the Indian Cooperative Union, and Margaret Ekpo, Nigerian Member of Parliament (the two will select the third member).

WIDE ATTENDANCE: The projects suggested to the conference were worked out at meetings during the first four days attended by 24 peace leaders from Canada,

13 from the U.S., four from the Soviet Union, three each from England, Japan and West Germany, two from Holland, and one each from India, New Zealand, Australia, Jamaica, Nigeria, Norway, Poland, Ukraine, Czechoslovakia and Chile.

U.S. women attending included Mrs. Ava Helen Pauling, Mrs. Dorothy Hutchinson, Mrs. Elise Boulding and Dr. Frances Herring of the W.I.L.P.F.; Dr. Margaret Mead, anthropologist; Mrs. Cyrus Eaton of Cleveland, Ohio, a leader of Women Strike for Peace; Mrs. Roy Menninger of Topeka; Mrs. Robert Flaherty,

widow of the film director; Mrs. Katherine Marshall of Cleveland, president of the U.S. VOW; Mrs. Elizabeth Boardman, running for Congress on the PAX program in Massachusetts and Mrs. Mary Clarke of Women Strike for Peace in Los Angeles.

Several hundred VOW members and delegates were welcomed at an official reception by Montreal Mayor Jean Drapeau. Business sessions were held in the auditorium of the University of Montreal. Local newspapers carried stories and pictures daily. La Presse editorially expressed hope that during the present "dialogue of the deaf" between the great powers, the public would give attention to the problem of peace, raised by the VOW.

THE PROPOSALS: Specific actions the women recommended included:

People-to-people exchanges of all kinds between individuals, families, business, cultural and scientific groups; sponsoring of women's travel missions to unfamiliar countries; sending of a joint peace mission of East, West and neutrals around the world to bring women closer together in peace work; exchange of art exhibits, handicrafts, films, TV programs, music, theater and dancing, both among adults and children.

The conference demanded immediate cessation of all nuclear tests and a test-ban agreement based on the neutrals' proposals of March, 1962; the outlawing of all other means of mass destruction, no further spreading of nuclear weapons; and some specific step by each side in 1963 to reduce the threat of surprise attack and to create a better climate for negotiation.

VOW asked women to become more active politically, run for office, query candidates about their attitude to peace and disarmament. Women were also urged to lobby the disarmament conference, and to take some synchronized world-wide action on a certain day, possibly Nov. 1 or 11 this year. The gathering of signatures in all nations on a simple statement of women for peace was proposed.

PRESS BUREAU: Women were urged to try to dispel fear and hostility in their own communities by writing, talking and working with newspapers, radio, TV stations, neighbors and organizations.

Better international communications links were suggested, such as a UN international press bureau which would assemble, verify and distribute information during International Cooperative Year and if possible set up a UN radio network in every region. An international family magazine and a children's magazine in many languages were suggested.

The final session, the annual meeting of the Canadian VOW, approved the general recommendations and added a resolution urging the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. to turn their rivalry into competition in aiding the development of Cuba as an independent nation.

#### Answers to V.

- (a) National Committee for People's Rights. I was not a member of this organization. When this allegation turned up in a loyalty questionnaire which I was filling out as a consultant of the Federal Security Agency in 1949, it was a great deal of trouble to even locate the organization, whose name I did not recongnize. I finally traced the organization as one which had given a dinner in honor of Professor Franz Boas to which all of his anthropological colleagues and associates were invited. I have no record of the date, it was sometime during the war.
- (b) East and West Association. When this organization was formed it was devoted to friendship between East and West. The address I have is 62 W.45th Street, and there was a Washington Branch with which I cooperated on one program during the war. I joined it at the request of Pearl Buck with whom I had had some professional association in connection with Asia Magazine, etc. My role was as a specialist in the Pacific. I was a member of the Advisory Board in 1941, Board of Directors, 1941-43 and back to Advisory Board in 1943, after which I had little contact with the organization. I helped organize an Anglo American Freemiship meeting in Washington, gave a few lectures for them here and therem advised on bibliographies, etc. After the war the association had difficulty raising funds and became relatively inactive. When I received the enquiry about this in 1949, I investigated its then present status. I was told that there had been attacks upon it - because of those its activities connected with China, that it was not on the Attorney eneral's list and had so far been able to defend itself as non-subversive. It was shortly afterwards dissolved.

During my association with members of the Association I saw nothing that aroused any suspiciom of Communist domination. I did feel that the association had a very strong bias against colonialism which could possibly be shaped, under wartime conditions, into Anti-British bias which might be dammaging to the war effort. It was for this reason that I participated actively in the Washington Anglo American program. (One of the areas in which I worked intensively during the war - under governmental auspices - was improving Anglo-Americans relations.)

(c) Foster Parents Plan for War Children. 55 W.42nd Street, New York, N.Y.

I did not know this organization as one in which one could be a member, but only as an agency through which contributions could be made to the work of the distinguished child-analyst, Dr.Anna Freud, who was conducting a special set of studies on the effect of war on children in England. I made a contribution specifically for this English work, and so reported - under contributions - on some form while I filled out during the war. I was on their mailing list to receive Miss Freud's scientific accounts of her work which they distributed in some processed form. I knew nothing about the organization beyond the fact that it collected money for children in war torn countries and that it was a channel for helping Miss Freud. The question of whether it had any relationship to Communism never entered my head. The use of such agencies as cover organizations was not then a matter of common knowledge.

(d) United China Relief Inc. 1790 Broadway, New York. Iaccepted an an invitation from Pearl Buck, dated, April 2, 1941, to be a member

ofathe Woman's Committee of United China Relief. The letterhead on which this request appeared carried the names of Mr. Henry Lucem John D.Rockefeller, 3rd, and Mrs.Franklin Roosevelt. I accepted this request as a wartime duty and had no further association with United China Relief. When queried about this organization, in 1949, I telephoned their office and was informed that all such committees had become quiescent when the general war chest plan went through. I accepted this invitation under the impression that the names on the letter head guarenteed this was what it purported to be - a relief organization which was being given support by the community. My position as a specialist in the Pacific area made my inclusion on lists like this an ordinary procedure in wartime. I had no idea of any connection with Communism. (My specialist competence in the Pacific was related to the primitive cultures of the South Seas and it was much later in the war before I knew anything at all about political conditions in China and the possibilities of a Chinese Relief organization being suspect.)

(e) The 1949 enquiry from the Federal Security Agency stated that the DAILY WORKER of Dec.16, 1940 reported my attendance at a CONFERENCE OF YOUNG WOMEN? held in New York City on December 14,1940. I did attend this Conference under the following circumstances. I had been teaching at Vassar, on a part time basis, A recent Vassar graduate whom I did not know came to ask for advice about organizing this Conference which she said was supposed to bring together a a Cross section of young women. I looked over her list, and although I was still relatively inexperienced in the American organizational field it looked very anti-interventionist, anti-ally, to me. think that at this point I would not have used the word "left" to describe it: I had not learned to think in those terms; my only organizational experience had been since returning to the country in 1939 and beginning to worry about World (Ar II.) At this time I knew practically nothing about either Fascist or Communist organizations or techniques, but I was actively pro-ally. (This confererence was ofcourse before Germany's invasion of Russia.) I suggested to this Vassar Alumnae that she balance her list with associations of other sorts, such as the Junior League, and I personally called the Junior League office. ( New York Office). I went to the Conference and watched it very carefully, especially for the sort of anti-allied arguments which were being used, and space - from the floor - to counter ballance the very conspicuous anti-allied propagnda. These were days when Communist techniques were very little known, and people, newly related to more active organizational work by the war, thought it was worthwhile to go to such meetings and speak against their programs on the spott It was quite obvious at the meeting itself that it was being engineered by the extreme left. It was at this meeting that I first heard a "communist" tone of voice as speakers would bolster their attacks with quotations from the New York Times, with the words, "And I

quote" uttered in a special deadly sort of tone which I had never before heard. (I heard the Eascist tone of voice for the first time in the spring of 1940, when Lawrence Dennis spoke on a forum at which I talso been asked to speak. It also was quite new to me.)

When I got to the Conference and saw how conspicuously proletarian it was, I realised that I had been exceedingly naive in suggesting that organizations like the Junior League be asked to take part. I had no idea this would do any harm - as I say I was ignorant of the techniques by which individuals and organizations were systematically involved and discredited - but I found it hard to think of a Junior League representative being anything except confused and repelled by the whole scene. However I heard afterwards that the Junior League representative was so geneuinely shocked into awareness of what was going on in the country that she was instrumental in organizing a study group to become better oriented in political problems. This study group was said to have been among young republicans. (I did not receive this information from the Junior League, but because the Committee for National Morale was appealed to for lecturers for this group.)

After later contact and greatly increased knowledge of Communist techniques, I am prepared to believe that this may have been a definite attempt to involve me, who had no background of organizational work and a well known scientific and literary name, in a Communist dominated group. On the other hand, it may have been the I later encountered in which individuals on the extreme left think that the world is composed of Stalinites and Trotsyltes, and do not include the possibility of there being Republicans and Democrats in their calaculations, so that anyone with whom they come in contact, will be placed in one of the two positions, according as their is initial conflict or agreement over even the most minor, apparently a-political issue.

(f) National Wartime Conference of the rofessions, the Sciences, the Arts, the White Collar Workers.

I have no record of any association with this organization. If I received requests to participate which did not require a reply I would have destroyed them. I think that I would have known that the title was definitely Communist but am not certain of this.

(g) Downtown Community School, 233 East 11th Street, New York.

until two o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Reece had been the principal of a small exclusive little school in Greenwich and had no experience at all with political manourving.

I was a member of the Board of Trustees, 1945-47, chairman of the education committee 1945-47 and I used to give a lecture or so a year, to the parent body or as a money raising device for the school.

When I finished a two year term as a member of the Board I felt that I had got the school on its feet, and reduced the impact within the parent body of extra-school political fighting. We had a President who was an old friend of Mrs. Reece's and appeared to have no experience or contact with Communist and Leftist movements. I helped, as chairman of a special finance committee to settle the second mortage problem, and put some money into the second mortgage to give me a stake in protecting Mrs. Reece, who insisted on putting her entire savings into it. I felt that on the whole the school could be left to go on as a school, that the early inroads of political factions had been reduced to an unimportant minimum.

I remained in mominal association with the school for two more years while my child was still in the school. A crisis then arose in the choice of a new administrator. I participated in attempts to find a competent administrator, and at the same time removed my child from the school and put her in the Brearley School.

When I filled out my last Enquiry in detail in 1949, I stated that I did not believe that the school ever hadbeen dominated by Communists. I would still state that it was not dominated by Communists while I was active in the school, nor while I was a member of the school group. However in the spring of 1950, a new crisis arose in an attempt to obtain the resignation of the administrator which brought me back into touch with the school for members of the Board sought my advice. In this connection I conferred with everal people, and attended one parents meeting in March of that year. I have only reports of what happened but there seems very little doubt that that the same kind of struggle which had been successfully quelled in the first days of the school recurred, with accusations of Communists and Fascists flying freely. A new principal administrator was later appointed about whom the same sort of controversy arose. As I had neither the time, the inclination, nor the reason my child was not in the school any longer - to continue what appeared to be a hopeless battle-educationally, because we could not find a good administrator who would be able to cope with the inroads of the subversives , -- I withdrew from all association with the school, When I withdrew - in 1950 - the political climate had managed x and become far clearer and I realised that it was inadvisable to work any longer in a setting in which there were even a few Communists whether it was possible to keep them from dominating or not.

#### (g) Downtown Community School, (cont)

To summarize. When I became a member of the Board I had no idea that Communism would even be an issue. I found myself responsible for the financial situation, the political integratity and the education in the school. I worked hard to keep the battling subversive elements from wrecking the school, and I withdrew from the school entirely when conditions appeared to have arisen within which I had no longer any influence and subversive influences might take control. On April 27, 1950 I wrote the President of the Board of Trustees withdrawing from "all formal connections with the Downtown Community School, as a sponsor and as an educational advisor. "And I said:"I have made it a rule never to continue in any responsible connection with an organization whose leadership I was unable to follow, whose policies I did not sympathize with and in which I was myself not willing or able to take an active part. I find myself in such a position in regard to the school, and the situation is further complicated by what appear to be the re-entry into school politics of world political alignments which I did my best to keep out during my period of board membership. A copy of this letter was sent to each member of the Board.

I have answered this question at considerable length as I realise that the position of the school may effect the future usefulness of many individuals who thought they were merely working for an educational institution with high ideals. I would not today be able to say who was a Communist. Another school of the same type was also being torn by the same kind of domestic quarrels only in that school the people who said they were anti-Stalinist, were on the opposite side of the quarrel. By 1949 I had learned to spot the Party Line, but this was a situation where the Party Line was not involved directly, where all of the parents took a generally tolerant position on such matters as race and religion, so that it was not possible to spot the areas in which one would expect 7. find Communists. The type of association that 1 had with the School is further evidenced that I did not make a single friend there; I knew a few people before the school started, who put children in the school, or helped in other ways. These have left the school also, and I have not even heard the smallest shred of gossip about its present position. Occasionally when the amortization on the last remains of the second mortage is not paid, I telephone the school lawyer and protest. This is my only contact. At the same time, the school may be no more dominated by Communists now than it was in my day. I have no way of knowing.

### (h) National Council of American Soviet Friendship.

In 1944 I was asked to supply a list of books on child care in the United States. I thought it very desirable that members of the Soviet Union should be informed in any way possible about actual conditions in the Soviet Union. This help was interpreted as willingness on my part to be a consultant, so that I felt that in listing my associational record, I should mention it. I was, from my point of view, simply utilizing a channel to the Soviet Union through which some inkling of democratic procedures might go.

Information has been received by this Board to the effect that you have been associated with Mark Lulinsky, an alleged Communist Party member, and that you have attended social and professional gatherings at his home.

You are requested to furnish a complete statement regarding the nature and extent of your association with Mark Lulinsky, including information as to whether or not you were aware of his Communist activities and sympathies and whether or not you ever aided, acquiesced or participated in such activities.

If you have been associated with any other Communists, Communist Party members or Communist sympathizers, furnish full information regarding such association.

Between 1947 and 1953 I directed a series of studies on modern cultures, and a number of these studies were on the nature of Soviet culture and institutions. These researches were conducted under government contracts and an account of them has already been furnished to you. p.6. lines 37-47 of my "Special Note on Clearance Forms, supplementary sheet to In this research we used as informants a large number of people who came from Iron Curtain countries. The atmosphere was necessarily explicitly political. The research was unclassified, the material designed. for publication, but the orientation of the research workers was clearly anti-Soviet. I met Mr. Lulinsky because his wife was a lay member of one of our research groups where she was one of our best informants on old Russia. We sometimes met at her house and she came to my house for research meetings or gathersey. Mr. Lulinsky did not participate in these meetings but would sometimes talk with us socially after a meeting. NEVER AT ANY TIME WAS THERE THE SLIGHTEST SUGGESTION THAT HE WAS A COMMUNIST OR A COMMUNIST SYMPATHIZER. I knew that he was a Russian importer and that for the first years after the war had made business trips to the Soviet Union. His daughter worked for me for a short period doing some photographic enlargement. The nature of our association was such that when the Russian research was concluded, we no longer met, nor are we very likely to meet.

Categorically I had no reason to believe that he was a Communist sympathizer, I was very much astonished by the question. I have reviewed my remembrance of all associations with the Lulinskys - a typical white Russian type household, and I can find nothing in them to which such a suspicion could attach. It is not as if I had met him among naive people. I saw him and his wife only in politically self conscious circles where there was tontinual discussion of everyone's political past, and exact shade of anti-Stalinism.

I have never known anyone whom I knew to be a Communist, as a friend, although I have had slight professional contacts with persons who have been accused of being Communist. Long before I realised that Communism was dangerous I found it tedious and boring and avoided all opportunities of contact.

What has been the nature and extent of your association with Dr. and Mrs. Ronald Wilfred Gurney, Nathan Constantin Leites, and Dr. Gene Weltfish?

Dr. and Mrs. Ronald Wilfred Gurney. I had met Dr. and Mrs. Gurney, certainly once and possibly more, when Mrs. Gurney became a member of the staff of the East Indiess Institute of which I was a Board member. This occurred at some point while I was away. I remember finding her installed when I returned to the Museum. The background of the East Indies Institute is covered in "Special Note on Clearance Forms, p.3 lines 26-47. (As these are matters of record I assume they need not be repeated under oath, so I merely refer to them). When the executive secretary of the Institute resigned, she was succeeded by Mrs. Gurney, with whom I then had periodic contact as one of the founding Board members of the Institute. The Board used to meet in her apartment. Occasionally, Dr. Gurney, who was, I believe away during a good deal of this period, would appear at the end of a meeting, or at some East Indies Institute ( later Southeast Asia Institute) affair. My only social contact which was not a matter of the Institute was a party for children which Mrs. Gurney gave on Navy Day to which I took my young daughter so that she could watch the Fleet on the Hudson River. I was not in sympathy with the way Mrs. Gurney ran in the institute; she not only showed no signs of political attention of any sort but she seemed to be endowing every activity of this small organization with a tiresome weight and pretentiousness. I finally resigned from the Board out of weariness with the length of her reports. But I had never had any reason to question her political soundmess and I was surprised to receive several years (?) later a request from her to be a security witness in a clearing which she said was directed towards Dr. Gurney's employment in some project as a physicist. I refused to do this on the ground that I knew absolutely nothing about her political views or affiliations, and that the fact that I had differed with her on her methods of administering the Institute affairs hardly made me a suitable general witness. Dr. Gurney I hadply knew at all. The information that Mrs. Gurney was seeking witnesses for a clearance was the first intimation that I had that there could be any question of Communist sympathies on either of their parts, and I assumed that her having been born in Russia, although reared in England, probably played a considerable role here. I have not talked with Mrs. Gurney since this incident which she regarded as unfriendly on my part, although I have seen her once or twice in large gatherings.

#### Nathan Constantin Leites.

I met Dr. Leites once in Washington near the end of the war, in the spring of 1945 (I believe), and that symmer Dr. Wolfenstein, the present Mrs. Leites, became my research associate in a project involved with the psychology of young children. I came to know Dr. Leites better during the period of their engagement and after their marriage. He then was away in Unesco, and our real association began in 1947 with the inaugeration of the first of the Russian projects on which he and I have worked together. From 1948 to the present he has been on the staff of Rand, and he and I worked most closely together during the two years, 1948-1950 that I directed a project, "Studies on Soviet Culture" as a sub-contract under a Rand air force contract.

I have known Dr. Leites as consistently, continuingly, actively anti-Soviet, bending all of his brilliance and effort to do research which would strengthen the understanding of the United States that the Soviet Union was very dangerous. His "Relities in the Soviet Union and the Communist Party. I have never seen Dr. Leites for one moment uncommitted to a major task of studying Communismin the Soviet Union and now in Europe - with the aim of combatting them. I

Since the war I have not myself been working with classified materials but I have assumed that Dr. Leites probably carried the highest possible clearance because of the nature of the work he was doing.

#### Dr.Gene Weltfish.

Dr. Weltfish has been associated since her graduate student days, until her severance this last spring, with the Department of Anthropology of Columbia University. I am a Ph.D from that Department and through the years I have given occasional courses under its auspices but I have only, this summer, after Dr. Weltfish's departure, received a regular appointment at Columbia. So, while Dr. Weltfish was the administrative officer in the division in which I have taught these last three years, my contacts with her were over the telephone. I saw her possibly two or three times a year in some professional context. I met her first when I invited a new group of graduate students to my house when I returned from a field trip, and the only other time I can remember her being in my house was during the period I lived on W.93rd street, -1940-1942 - when I remember she came to consult me professionally - I was on leave of absence from the Museum at the time. If I had been asked about her anytime up to late in the war, I would simply have had to say that I didn't know her well, that I found her anthropological work of a sort which I was not enthusiastic about but which was careful and responsible, that she worked very hard and that I understood she had to do most of the dull routine work of the department, with a small comesation incommensurate with the amount of work. During the war I came to associate her with a more active interest in community affairs, and in matters on which strong ethical stands were taken, but I should say it was well towards the end of the war that I began to hear accusations of her Communist sympathies. Even in the furore over Races of Mankind, I do not remember any After the war, she seemed to be identified in ways which allegations of this sort.  $^{
m I}$  would regard as showing definitive  $^{
m Communist}$  sympathies, but even then  $^{
m I}$  was surprised at the newspaper account of her endorsement of germ warfare slanders. This seemed out of character. When she was separated from Columbia, she wrote me saying she wanted to go back to her Indian language work and would I support her request for a grant. I be lieved that this was a field in which was competent, in which her Communist sympathies or involvements, whatever they were, would not matter, and that furthermore, if we wished to keep those who were openly sympathetic to Communist ideas, out of our institutions where they would do harm, one of the best ways to do this is to permit them to earn their living, in inoccuous ways, in the fields/they are trained. This prevents martyrdom, prevents the addition of misguided liberal voices to pleas on their behalf, and reduces the extent to which we have to imitate the Soviet Union because Communist tactics have involved us in counter measures.

Information has been received by this Board to the effect that early in 1950, you were being considered for membership in the American-Russian Institute, an organization on the Attorney General's list, and that in September 1951, you received the "USSR Information Bulletin, a publication of the Soviet Embassy.

What comment do you care to make regarding the above-information?

I took out a membership in the American Russian Institute, in December, 1947, called a "Library Service Group Membership", on behalf of the Columbia University Rsearch in Contemporary Culture Project, (ONR Contract N6-onr-271 ), so that members of the project could use the library. The library of the American Russian Institute had materials not available either at Columbia or at the NY Eublic Library, and the requisition to the Government Contract Division of Columbia University so states. Members of the staff using the library were instructed to sign the project address, then 15 Amsterdam Avenue. We continued to use the library throughout the following two or three years. I have no record in my file as to when we stopped using it. I had no illusions whatsoever about the American Russian Institute. I was doing Research on the S oviet Union under correct auspices, this was a reasonable library fee, and we took what precautions we could. I have no idea what that statement that I was being considered for membership in 1950 would mean, except that possibly a planning committee of the American-Russian Institute was hopeful of getting another year's dues from us. As the second Russian project - Studies in Soviet Culture under RAND was completed in 1950, this would probably have coincided with the period when we no longer needed the library.

I ordered the USSR Information Bulletin, September 30,1949, as Director, Studies in Soviet Culture, 15 W.77th Street. This purchase was made through the American Museum of Natural History accounting office, but I thought it better to have it addressed to me personally, so that I could take responsibility for it. The Museum does not usually handle any affairs of possible political significance; this contract was an exception. We found the Bulletin of the USSR useful in our analysis of Communism, and it was ordered for that purpose, throughout the series of investigations on Soviet problems.

15 West 77th street is the address of the American Museum of Natural History which I use as a shortened form when I do not wish tom involve the Museum as an institution.

I considered it would be unsafe to work on Russian materials except under government auspices, especially if I had to involve younger workers with a less clear record in handling such materials as Communist literature. I devoted almost all of my time and energy to this series of government projects, from I appreciate the need of these clearances completely.
