As of December, 1964, the only money then due for revalties to any one in the United States for articles published in "Problems of Peace and Socialism" was \$163.09 for Daniel Rubin for an article which had been published in the last issue of the ragazine. It was noted that while future articles by the following individuals are scheduled for publication in the magazine, "Problems of Peace and Socialism" does not pay revalties for such articles in advance. The individuals in the United States who will be having articles published are as follows:

> Josoph Forer, a Machington, D. C., attorney, who will have an article in the January, 1905 issue;

Earry KohlsaathWells, a writer on psychiatry and psychology, who will <u>bave</u> have an article in the February, 1005 issue.

In view of the fact there was an amount of \$163.00 due in royalties from the publication to Daniel Lubin, this sum was therefore turned over to a representative of the Communist Party, USA;

In connection with the foregoing \$163.00 in royalties, this money was turned over to Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA, on January 3, 1965. Upon receiving this money, Hall noted that he would see to it that it got to Lubin.

It was further learned through discussions with representatives of "Problems of Peace and Socialism" that they still desire the selection and conding of a correspondent to Prague from the United Stated to work with the magazine. They feel that such an individual could be paid \$200 per month for coordinating and editing material received from the United States and could even earn additional money as royalties for his own material which appears in the publication. They felt that the \$200 plus possible royalties that such a correspondent would receive would more than enable that person to live quite well in Prague.

When the foregoing matter of a correspondent being sent to "Problems of Peace and Socialism" from the United States was discussed with Hall on January 3, 1935, Hall noted that he night recommend that the job be taken on by Will Weinstone. He noted that Weinstone, with the \$200 monthly salary plus his own Social Security and possible royalties, could live quite well and have his needs taken care of.

HARRY EISMAN

Harry/Eisman, a former American who was deported from the <u>United States</u> when he was about 12 years old, is now living in the USSR where he was married to a Russian woman and has a Russian daughter. According to Eisman, during the regime of Stalin he was arrested as an imperialist agent and had been imprisoned in a Soviet labor camp for a period of five years. At the time he was arrested, he had in his home approximately 400 pictures which were confiscated by the Soviet police.

After the death of Stalin, Eisman was released from the labor camp and some of his possessions were returned to him. However, Eisman stated, the pictures were not returned to him and he was told by the Soviet authorities that the pictures had been burned. Only one picture from the collection of approximately 400 was returned to him. This picture shows Eisman with some Soviet Army men and some American communists in Moscow. Eisman stated that he never has shown this picture around because he is afraid the Soviet authorities would disapprove of this since they burned all the other photos.

Heis presently working on a duck farm and is a specialist in ______ would like to be able to leave the Soviet Union in order to visit his family in the United States which is supposed to include a brother who is a Minister in Chicago, Illinois.

During December, 1964, a number of Americans, who were part of a Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) delegation to the USSE and guests of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), were in contact with and visited his home. at that time indicated to these Americans that he would like them to intervene on his behalf in order that the desired trip might be arranged. Several members of this CP, USA delegation who visited with were of the opinion that something should be done on his behalf with the CP of the Soviet Union.

In discussing the foregoing during late December, b6 1964, representatives of the North and South American Section b7C International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, expressed some displeasure over the intervention of the American Party members in this matter regarding which they felt was strictly an internal affair of the CPSU.

During convorsations hold in the latter part of Decembor, 1964, with Hans Birch, the individual in charge of American affairs and relations with the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) in the International Department, Central Conmittee, Socialist Unity Party of Germany (SUPG), the following was learned:

There currently resides in the German Democratic Republic (GDR) one Leonard Voldstein and his wife who are from Somerset, Massachusetts. They came to the GDR in 1962 and Leonard Goldstein now teaches literature in a German school and his wife is an architect. He is about 42 years of age. They claim they had to leave the United States and that they had informed Herbert Aptheker of this and that he was the only person who knew that they left the country. Goldstein also claims that he belonged to the Pavley Branch of the Party at the University of Wisconsin in 1946, had worked at the University of Wisconsin in 1946, had worked at the University, He supposedly is well off with an estimated \$30,000 in United States bank accounts.

According to Birch, the Goldsteins and other people similar to them come to the GDR and ask to stay for a few menths. Experience has shown that these people later settle down and some even get married and them refuce to leave the country.

Birch requested that the CP, USA check into the Goldsteins and provide the SUPS with whatever information can be found out concerning them.

GENERAL REMARKS OF VLADIMIR ROUCKY, MEMBER OF SECRETARIAT, CENTRAL COMMITTEE, COMMUNIST PARTY OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA, DECEMBER, 1964

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in early January, 1965, advised as follows:

In late December, 1964, Vladimir Koucky, a leading member of the Secretariat, Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CPCZ), in speaking of the removal of Nikita S. Khrushchev from the leadership of the CP of the Soviet Union in October, 1964, remarked that they in the Czech CP were very surprised and had no advance warning. He noted that "Maybe the time has come when the Soviet comrades will give some thought to the fact that their decisions always have international implications and they cannot make such decisions based solely on domestic needs and leave other countries in the lurch."

When asked if the CPCZ was perhaps not following a more independent line, since it did not follow the precedent of the CP of the Soviet Union by separating and placing in different individuals the leadership of high offices in the Party and the Government, Koucky remarked, "Yes, we did that."

Koucky next went on and indicated that when they, a delegation of the leadership of the CPCZ, visited with the leadership of the CP of the Soviet Union in Moscow, USSR, after Khrushchev's removal, they got most of what they went after, but not all. They, the leadership of the CPCZ, did, however, retain the right to disagree and do things in their own way, particularly as it regarded any reorganization in industry. In this reorganization of industry, the CPCZ

will not go into it like the Russians but will investigate this matter thoroughly and weigh each move carefully.

As to the future, in connection with the United States, Koucky noted as follows:

In regard to negotiations between the United States and Czechoslovakia on the matter of debts and desire for trade, they do not expect miracles. Particularly in connection with trade, they do not expect any favored nation clause and realize there are forces in the United States who willooppose such trade.

On the question of China, Koucky noted that it is apparent that the United States is also wooing her. He then interjected the question, "Don't you think that the Pacific Coast people favor trade with China?".

WILLIAM ALDERTSON

William Albertson, a former member of the National Executive Committee, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), was expelled from the CP, USA during the summer of 1964. This action was initiated as a recult of the discovery of a "report" which appeared to have been prepared by Albertsonin his own handwriting for the Federal Dureau of Investigation. After a thorough investigation, including the utilization of a number of handwriting experts, it was concluded by the CP, USA leadership that Albertson was a spy and he was expelled. However, in order to verify the conclusions reached by handwriting experts in the United States, by instruction of Gus Hall, General Secretary of the CP, USA, the original document in this matter together with some known samples of Albertson's handwriting obtained from one of his notebooks which was in the Headquarters of the CP, USA, plus a lotter which Albertson had propared for the investigating committee during the course of his investigation, were forwarded to the CP of the Soviet Union (CPSU) in order that the full facilities of the USSR might be concentrated on a study of the original document to determine beyond a shadow of a doubt whether the document was genuing or a forgery,

During October, 1984, a proliminary report was furnished to a representative of the CP, USA, then in Moscow, to the effect that the document was a forgery. Subsequently a written report was forwarded to the CP, USA contradicting the proliminary report and stating that it was the conclusion of the Soviet experts that the document had in fact been prepared by Albertson.

During December, 1964, a representative of the CP, USA was in Moscow, USSR, and asked for an explanation of these contradictory reports. A member of the Security Branch of the Central Committee, CPSU, Vladimir (Last Name Unknown), case to the Central Committee hotel to see the CP, USA representative and to furnish a complete report on this matter. He stated that the reason the proliminary report had been in error was that this report had been

furnished before the examination was completed. Two experts had examined the document and had noted several discrepancies but did not consult with one another on these differences. When the first report was furnished neither had a third expert yet been called in to resolve the differences between the other two experts. As a result, after the consultation among the three experts, the differences had been resolved and they had arrived at the conclusion later furnished to the CP, USA that the document had in fact been written by Albertson.

Vladimir then gave the following explanation of the results of the Soviet examination of the Albertson documents. The original document was written easily and naturally. The second original (i.e. the letter prepared by Albertson for the investigating committee) looks as if it was forced but the original document and the notes from Albertson's notebook compare as one. If the second original was written by Albertson under the strain of trying to prove his innocence, psychologically the handwriting could not be written in the same manner as his normal natural handwriting.

Vladimir explained that according to the Soviet experts some people can at one sitting write two different ways, but at some time or another during the preparation of different samples, the handwriting will correspond. Some of the handwriting characteristics may be due to early training in handwriting. At some time during the preparation of a handwritten document, the writer may rovert to characteristics from his early training or may deviate from his normal handwriting characteristics which are fashioned by his early training.

Continuing, Vladimir stated that the Soviet experts concluded that there is no difference between the handwriting in the original and in the known camples of Albertson's handwriting. The spacing between letters and words is the same. The paragraphs are the same and are habitually short. In both cases, he never finishes a line to the edge of the page. On each line, the handwriting begins with an upward curve and ends on a downward curve. The handwriting goes up and down in nearly all lines. The periods at the ends of sentences are uniformly a certain distance from the last words.



Graphically, the lotters and connections are the same, The "S" is open and large. The "C's" are all large and identical in their stroke. The "B's" are all large and similar. The "N" always has a characteristic twist, The "I" is dotted at the same distance from the letter itself. In the letter combination "TH", the "T" is either connected or not in the same manner. The "I" is written two ways by the author in both cases. The "E" and "R" are always written with large strokes. The "A" is also characteristic and the following letter is smaller. The "F" is also similar. The "P" is characteristically larger than the other letters. The "K" has a similar loop and connection. The way and habit of connecting letters is similar.

The experts concluded that they cannot prove that the original document was prepared by another person; therefore, it was written by the same person. There were too many common elements and shapes contained in the handwriting for it to have been prepared by anyone but the same person.

Vindimir indicated that the Soviet experts had explained that they nover say it is "proved" 100% to be genuine. They nover use the word "proof"; however, with that understanding the word may be used with certain qualifications. They will say that they cannot prove it is a forgery and will say that they are 80 to 00% sure that it is not a forgery. One might say that they have proved that it is not a forgery but they will never say so 100%. Whe conclusion would have to be that the handwriting is the same and that there are no signs of forgery. But keep in mind that they never say 100%. Lastly, they stated that if this is not genuine then it is a "darm good job."

Following the above explanation, Vladinir returned all the documents to the CP, USA representative to be returned to Gus Hall.

Lall noted that Dob Thompson, a member of the CP, USA Secretariat, has suggested that the Albertson documents be turned over to some handwriting experts in England; however, Lall noted that in addition to the examination performed by the Coviet experts, this document has already been examined by experts in New York City, Chicago, Philadolphia and Los Angeles. The opinions of all the experts have been the same and Lall sees little point in any further examination. So far as Hall is concerned, the matter is finished.
