Dear Mr. Greenewald:

In the course of processing your 30 March 2016 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the National Security Agency (NSA) for records pertaining to a copy of the Intellipedia entry (from all three Wikis that make up the Intellipedia) for the following entry(s): TRAILBLAZER and/or THINTHREAD, NSA located one CIA document and referred it to us on 8 August 2016 for review and direct response to you.

We reviewed the one document and determined that it can be released in segregable form with deletions made on the basis of FOIA exemptions (b)(1) and (b)(3). A copy of the document and explanation of exemptions are enclosed. Exemption (b)(3) pertains to information exempt from disclosure by statute. The relevant statutes are Section 6 of the Central Intelligence Agency Act of 1949, as amended, and Section 102A(i)(1) of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended. As the CIA Information and Privacy Coordinator, I am the CIA official responsible for this determination. You have the right to appeal this response to the Agency Release Panel, in my care, within 90 days from the date of this letter. Please include the basis of your appeal.

Explanation of Exemptions

Freedom of Information Act:

- (b)(1) exempts from disclosure information currently and properly classified, pursuant to an Executive Order;
- (b)(2) exempts from disclosure information which pertains solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of the Agency;
- (b)(3) exempts from disclosure information that another federal statute protects, provided that the other federal statute either requires that the matters be withheld, or establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld. The (b)(3) statutes upon which the CIA relies include, but are not limited to, the CIA Act of 1949;
- (b)(4) exempts from disclosure trade secrets and commercial or financial information that is obtained from a person and that is privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) exempts from disclosure inter-and intra-agency memoranda or letters that would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) exempts from disclosure information from personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of privacy;
- (b)(7) exempts from disclosure information compiled for law enforcement purposes to the extent that the production of the information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings; (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication; (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy; (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of a confidential source or, in the case of information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source ; (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law; or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger any individual's life or physical safety;
- (b)(8) exempts from disclosure information contained in reports or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, or on behalf of, or for use of an agency responsible for regulating or supervising financial institutions; and
- (b)(9) exempts from disclosure geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

1997 Trailblazer Awards

The CIA 50 Trailblazers, proposed by the CIA50 Steering Committee, was a way to recognize 50 officers, from the earliest days to 1997, who took the Agency in important new directions and helped shape our history through example, innovations or initiative.

Three hundred nominations were submitted by CIA staff employees, contractors, and retirees. A panel of retired officers from each of the four directorates, the CIA History Staff, OEEO, OGC, and OPS reviewed the list and selected the top 100 candidates.

The list of 100 was reviewed by a Selection Committee, who made the final difficult choice of the 50, who were honored in a ceremony on 18 September 1997.

The criteria for eligibility was that the individual:

- Distinguished themselves as leaders in any field, at any grade level, and at any time,
- Made a significant difference or had a strong impact in furthering the Agency's mission,
- Set an example, or standards for others,
- Cleared a path for others to follow.

Note that two individuals are not listed as they had to remain under cover. They received their award medallions in private ceremonies. Fourteen awards were posthumous.

As of April 2008, less than half of the Trailblazers are alive; 18 Trailblazers have passed away since 1997: (b)(3) Kiselvalter, Blee, Meyer, Dirks, Stoertz, Page, Helms, Pforzheimer, Critchfield, DeFelice, Parangosky, Lowenhaupt, Howe, White, Lehman, Borel, Coffey, and Craven.

2007 Trailblazer Awards



In observance of it's 60th Anniversary, the CIA recognized individuals or teams who made exceptional contributions to the Agency mission. The awards were to be a continuation of the "Trailblazer" awards presented during CIA's 50th anniversary celebration in 1997. All Agency staff employees and teams were eligible for nomination.^[1]

On 13 September 2007 Gen. Hayden announced the recipients of the 60th anniversary Trailblazer medals. These individuals were recognized on 18 September 2007 at an awards ceremony in the Headquarters Auditorium. The individuals and a representative of each team were presented with the Trailblazer (b)(3)

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medal. Those who contributed to a team success did not receive individual medals but took pride in knowing that they were part of a path-breaking effort that made a crucial difference to America's security.

ADD/CIA Michael Morell led a selection board comprised of senior Agency leaders from all Directorates (b)(3) and the DCIA area, as well as a senior DNI officer who reviewed almost 150 nominations and selected the Trailblazers based on the following criteria:

- Exceptional leadership
- Innovation
- Promotion of collaboration within the Agency and across the IC
- A significant positive and long lasting impact on the national security mission^[1]

Annual Trailblazer Awards


