Our field representatives in coordination with Ambassador Duke have forwarded the following comments apropos of your query of 28 March.

"There is no foreseeable feature in the current political situation in either Madrid or Seville which could prove to be a physical threat to Mrs. Kennedy. She is probably the most popular living American in the eyes of the Spanish public. The Spanish government will be most anxious to surround her visit with favorable publicity. She will in all probability encounter very favorable but perhaps overenthusiastic public receptions and police protections.

"Despite its unofficial nature, this visit may be interpreted by those in opposition to the Spanish regime as a measure of tacit support to the regime and their comments to this effect to foreign newsmen may result in unfavorable wire service dispatches. There is a remote possibility that student or crackpot elements may attempt to use the presence of Mrs. Kennedy to generate anti-American attitudes on Vietnam or on the subject of the lost H-Bomb. Efforts of this type would not be expected to receive mass support."
