Subject: The 37 CIA documents

The CIA will not appeal the Board's decisions on the 37 documents. There were three errors in the Federal Register announcement on the 37 CIA records. (Two records listed as open are in fact closed. One record listed as "open in full" also was recorded as having 19 postponements.) As soon as I determined that there were errors, I tried to stop the printing at the FR, but it was too late. The (incorrect) notice was printed yesterday, August 22. As soon as we had the page number for the FR printing yesterday, we submitted a notice of correction. The corrections should be printed on Friday, August 25. When I drafted the letter for the research community explaining the Board's decisions on the 37 documents, I used the FR version to explain the Board's decision. That letter, therefore, includes the same errors as in the FR version. (By the way, the version of the letter you signed was a draft. The final version of the letter was sent out over Jack's signature and it was distributed to the entire mailing list.) Tom based his press announcement on information that he received from the CIA team (rather than the FR notice). Although the press announcement was less detailed than yours (and Jack's) letter, the numbers he used were accurate. Thus the public will have two inconsistent documents explaining what the Board did. Although the errors ultimately are not significant, they will look bad to anyone who scrutinizes the differences. We have put into place a system that should prevent this kind of error from occurring in the future.
