	I have reviewed the INS files of Marina and Lee Oswald. The records have not yet been processed, although
	they are under way. There are no documents that we can give to Daly at this time. It appears that his story is
	"half" right. First, I saw no written request from Oswald for a waiver of sanctions. Second, J.W. Holland was the
	District Director of INS in San Antonio. He wrote the original denial of waiver of sanctions for Oswald in 1961.
	His recommendation was approved by a Mr. Shrode, who was the Assistant Commissioner of Examinations at
	the Central Office. Third, Michael Cieplinski, the Acting Administrator of the Bureau of Security and Consular
	Affairs at the State Department thereupon wrote to Robert H. Robinson, Deputy Associate Commissioner for
	Travel Control at INS requesting that the waiver be granted. He argued that State had long been criticizing the
	Soviets for not allowing Russian spouses of Americans to leave the USSR. He said that now that the Soviets had
	agreed in the case of Marina, it would look bad for Americans not to grant the waiver. His argument was not
	premised at all on the particular circumstances of Marina or Lee, but on the long-term interest in facilitating
	emigration from the USSR. Finally, Robinson, for INS, agreed to the waiver of sanctions. The INS Oswald files
	should be processed within the next few months and the documents should be available at that time. I am not
