We'd like to thank Paul Bruemmer and Brian Stainsfor bringing this scam to our attention - both will receive Internet ScamBusters! tee shirts. This scam has also been identified by the National Fraud Information Center and is costing victims a lot of money. There are lots of different permutations of this scam, but here ishow it works: Permutation #1: Internet Based Phone Scam Via Email You receive an email, typically with a subject line of "*ALERT*" or "Unpaidaccount." The message, which is being spammed across the net, says: -----I am writing to give you a final 24hrs to settle your outstanding account. If I have not received the settlement in full, I will commence legal proceedings without further delay. If you would liketo discuss this matter to avoid court action, call Mike Murray at GlobalCommunications on +1 809 496 2700.----- Permutation #2: Phone Or Pager Scam You receive a message on your answering machine or your pager which asks you to call a number beginning with area code 809. The reason to you're asked to call varies: it can be to receive information about a family member whohas been ill, to tell you someone has been arrested, died, to let youknow you have won a wonderful prize, etc. In each case, you're told tocall the 809 number right away. Since there are so many new area codes these days, people unknowinglyreturn these calls. If you call from the US, you will apparently be charged \$25 per-minute! Sometimes the person who answers the phone will speak broken English and pretend not to understand you. Other times, you'll just get a long recorded message. The point is, they will try to keep you on the phone as long as possible to increase thecharges. Unfortunately, when you get your phone bill, you'll oftenbe charged more than \$100.00. Here's why it works: The 809 area code is located in the British Virgin Islands (the Bahamas). The 809 area code can be used as a "pay-per-call" number, similar to 900 numbers in the US. Since 809is not in the US, it is not covered by US regulations of 900 numbers, which require that you be notified and warned of charges and rates involved when you call a "pay-per-call" number. There is also no requirement that the company provide a time period during which youmay terminate the call without being charged. Further, whereas many US phones have 900 number blocking (to
