Subject: "DOJ Leadership" RIFs

There are about 100 RIFs that, on their face, indicate they correspond to records from the files of the AG's office, and a relative handful more (together adding up to about 60) that, on their face, indicate they correspond to records from the Office of Legislative Affairs, the Deputy Attorney General's office or the Office of Public Affairs. I have printed out about 15 RIFs for records from the AG's office that look like they might be worth copying at College Park. (These are in addition to the Civil Division RIFs I gave you earlier this afternoon.) It might make sense for you to copy these records, and eyeball the other DOJ leadership records, with an emphasis on the minority that do not pertain to FOIA litigation, at College Park. Some assorted observations: (1) Doug recently ran into some snags in getting access to other Justice Dept. records at College Park. His experience suggests that it would be advisable to talk to Steve Tilley directly a few days in advance of the planned trip to explain what you want to see, and/or to fax a memo to his attention containing the same information. Ron, you and Doug can confer on how best to lay the groundwork for a productive trip. (2) Judging by the RIFs, no records of the Office of Legal Counsel have been identified as assassination records. Ron, when you review the 135's from Suitland, Maryland, you might want to take particular note of 135's for OLC records. (3) There are fewer records from the AG and DAG offices than I would have expected a comprehensive search to have yielded (even allowing for the possibility that the various Presidential libraries may house papers of certain Attorneys General from the 1960's and 1970's). This suggests to me either or both of the following scenarios:-- not all of the boxes described in 135's from the FRC in Suitland that we would to have searched have been searched;-- the criteria used for deciding what in those boxes is related to the assassination may have been narrower than what we would regard as appropriate.
