She said she was. She said "DK" was the old office code in 1959-1960 for what is now called the Personnel Management Support Branch (Code MMSB) at Marine Corps Headquarters in Quantico, i.e., the office that maintains the Headquarters personnel files for all Marines. In the way of context, Code MMSB at Quantico is the office which relinquished Oswald's original Enlisted Personnel File and Medical Record to the ARRB (via the Archivist of the Marine Corps), and is the same office which provided Unit Diary Entries directly to the ARRB, at our request. For these reasons, her answer seems "right on the mark" to me, and furthermore, the appearance of this code on documents related to disciplinary action (i.e., court martial
