Yes, I have a copy. That cite is to the FOIA. However, (b)(3) itself is terse and unhelpful, in that it says only that information may be exempt from release based on the terms of another statute. What you really need to know is what statutes they are relying on to invoke (b)(3). For example, CIA relies on a variety of statutes to withhold information, like the CIA Information Act of 1984, which allows CIA not to process operational files for release under FOIA. If you request operational files from CIA, they cite 5 USC 552(b)(3) as the reason for
