There is a review of the two programs in today's Style section of the Post. Both are reviewed favorably, although with minor criticism of both programs. Of the Peter Taylor reported Frontline, (which airs second here) the reviewer got a bit tired of the juxtaposed images of Catholic symbolism and victims of IRA violence. Also, as a history of the Troubles, the Republican position gets well articulated, but the reviewer thought more room should have been made for the Unionist side. Of the NOVA program, which is about the Bomb Squad of the British Army, and their cat and mouse game with the IRA bombers, the main criticism was the lack of a political context to complement the science. I guess that comes in the second program.
