Actually, the answer to the question that you asked is NO (sorry, Kevin) because of your use of the term "postponement" in the question. Since the JFK Act requires the FBI to submit all of its postponements to the Review Board for approval -- the answer to your question, as asked, is no. In other words -- nothing is officially "postponed" under the terms of the JFK Act unless the Review Board has reviewed and approved the postponement. BUT! I know that there are documents that the Review Board has not yet voted on from the core files (because they contain pending issues like foreign government information, grand jury information, or IRS referrals), that are CURRENTLY not available. Here is the question I think you really meant to ask: Q: Are there any documents that the FBI withheld in full, when it initially processed the document (in '92, '93, or '94), AND the Review Board has not yet reviewed and/or voted on the document (because somewhere in the document is a foreign issue or a grand jury issue or whatever.) And the answer to that question is: A: Yes. (See Kevin's e-mail.) And, as we work to clear out the core files, we will see the document, resolve the pending issue(s), present the document to the Review Board for a vote, and transmit it to the Archives.
