

As we reported in August, we have received final compliance statements from a number of agencies. Since then, we have received final compliance statements from the Civil Division of the Department of Justice and the White House Communications Agency. A number of other agencies have sought additional time to prepare and submit their final compliance statements. Thus, we anticipate receiving by this Fall final compliance statements from the Department of State, the Office for the Secretary of Defense, the Navy, the Air Force, the Defense Intelligence Agency, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Leadership Offices for the Department of Justice, the Department of Treasury, and the Social Security Administration. We are continuing to evaluate the final compliance statements that we have received. In addition, we have recently requested the Library of Congress to submit a compliance statement [Tom -- we probably will be requesting compliance statements from the National Security Council and the IRS].

In connection with Congressional records, we are currently working with various Congressional committees and the National Archives to assure that all relevant committee records are identified and placed in the JFK Collection. For example, the Review Board has identified additional FBI and CIA officials whose Church Committee testimony relating to the Kennedy assassination should be released under the JFK Act. The Review Board is currently working with the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence to process and release these transcripts. We also are currently assessing what additional records should be released from the other Congressional committees, including the House Un-American Activities Committee, which we understand has some materials on Lee Harvey Oswald; the House Government Operation's Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights, which has 1975-76 records relating to the handling and classification of Warren Commission materials; and the House Judiciary's Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights, which has records relating to its 1975-76 inquiry with respect to the FBI's handling of Oswald as an internal security matter prior to the assassination.
