I recently had the pleasure of attending the roundtable sponsored by the Commission on Protecting and Reducing Government Secrecy and wanted to let you know how stimulating I found the discussion. Of particular interest were your comments concerning your own reaction to the assassination of President Kennedy.

As you may be aware, there are published sources that suggest that you, at the behest of Robert Kennedy, were involved in an informal "investigation" of the Secret Service immediately following the assassination.¹ We would very much like to learn more about this "investigation" and to address the question of whether records may exist that document it.
