

During the two-day visit at the writer wasable to introduce for discussion rany subjects of interest to MRTICHOKE and other programs of interest to us. These discussions, while mostly general in nature, were at times sufficiently pointed to obtain some specific answers or opinions. Cut out below are statements in substance concerning various items discussed:

LSD

perhaps with study the most valuable for our uso. He, himself, is doing experimental work with it but stated at the present time the control of the chemical for our use has not yet been worked out. He agrees the chemical has a very high potential and much experimentation is needed. He has not used it in psychlatric case-work.

WIDERGIE (An ergot derivative -- and possible automotist of LSD)

RAUGOLFIA

not believe it would be valuable by itself for our use but feel that it would be extremely interesting worked in combination with other chemicals.

BULEOCVERE

this chemical and he thought the psychogenic effects might be interesting although he had not worked with it.

TEILATRAN

It was suggested that Frenquil (the gamma isomer of Heratran), product, would perhaps be more effective and interesting than Feratran.

DOLLTRONE

useful for its analyssic effect. He stated that obviously there was a psychogenic effect in use of the chemical but because of the nature of his work (anesthesiology) he had not worked with it experimentally along & these lines. He slow indicated he felt that judging by the several hundred cases he had worked with, it might have an armosic effect and both stated that it was important and should receive much consideration.

Stated this example: A group of his doctor-associates were roughhousing in



one of the locker rooms of a nearby country club and one doctor twisted his back and neck in such a way that he could not straighten up, every movement being very painful. brought him back to the 10 cc. of Dolitrone intramuscularly in the buttock and within minutes this doctor was able to straighten up, move about, even swing a golf club and felt no pain. Faid he did not check out how long the condition lasted but he knew it lasted at least several hours and he stated it was the first time Dolitrone had been used intramuscularly. felt that for people who had to jump from parachutes and in line of duty be subject to pain, broken legs, sprains, etc. and who had to perform an assignment in a given period of time, this might be an important discovery. The writer suggested that this could be worked out using an automatic injector device and said in his opinion it definitely could. He stated he would work on the problem and give it thought since he clearly recognized its value to us. reed that they would do some work in the future on the psychogenic and amnesic effects of Dolitrone.

MESCALINE

dvised using Mescaline in combination with other chemicals. (
He stated it should be tried with Rauwolfia and ISD. He said he had done
no experiments along these lines but thought it might be important.

XENON (a gas)

Both knew of this rare gas and knew that it had been studied in the U.S.S.R. admitted that it was a powerful anesthetic gas but felt its expense and way of administration might preclude our use of it.

TERTLARY ANYL ALCOHOL

The writer asked and if they were familiar with it and said he didn't think it was worth snything and was quite familiar with it.

He stated a compound known as "HY2" put out by Parke-Davis was far superior.

(The writer may have misunderstood the term "HY2" but since it is contemplated further work with these men this matter will be taken up at that time.)

PIFRADROL

Term mentioned but no comments made. Apparently this compound may be experimental and hence not yet used clinically.

SERATORIN

Both doctors were familiar with Seratonin and particularly described it as very interesting but he had not done any work with the material.

stated that he would examine what he had on Seratonin and that at C some future date the matter should be taken up with him again. He stated obviously it was of great interest but he did not feel at the present time it was worthwhile for him to comment upon its applications and results.

CLUTATIC ACLO AND RELATED SUBSTANCES

VTCOHOP

whisky, wine, etc. was highly important to any operations of an Agency of our type. They suggested that practically everything mentioned should be worked in combination with Alcohol and that they would themselves try combinations with it and would examine possible chemicals that would work as potentiators for the effects of alcohol.

Both and commented that these peculiar compounds often had interesting psychogenic effects. They stated that they had not studied it but doubted it would have much use for us. This was apparently based on the unusual side effects which probably would not be useful and might definitely be dangerous.

in his use had never been successful. However, he did not preclude work with it but did not like the substance.

and both stated this was no good.

ANTIHISTALLIC DRUGS

Both doctors recognized that these drugs would produce psychogenic effects but offered no comment.

FUNGUS TOXINS -- MUSIMOONS

One conference had hardly started before asked the writer if he were interested in poisonous mushrooms. The writer informed wo were studying them now. The writer informed study be made of this and also of the literature as it appeared that toxic mushrooms were used as intoxicants in the Soviet Union. He felt it was something that had not be exploited and suggested study as to the effects produced by these arents.



ASPIRIN

Both doctors agreed that the aspirin tablet was a simple way of administration and possibly aspirin combined with other chemicals might produce interesting results. They had done no work along these lines but admitted that pills could be rade to resemble aspirin tablets and this was indeed a very common pill.

Interesting but did not appear to be good from our point of view.



PARBITURATES

Doctors and are, of course, familiar with all types of barbiturates. These used Barbiturates in psychiatry to a great extent. Use of Barbiturates, of course, as an anesthetic is standard and has made tremendous contributions in the field of Barbiturates, (particularly his introduction of sodium pentothal. The writer asked both men if they were familiar with any new chemicals in this field with unusual and strange results. The writer was informed there were no particularly new barbiturates currently being studied and any new information along these lines in the future would be transmitted to the writer. Papered with the writer in the use of certain barbicaturates coupled with certain stimulants in narco-interviews as being effective. He has had considerable experience along this line.



MORFHIME

Again both doctors were well acquainted with Norphine and suggested that further exploration could be made in using Norphine in combination with such elements as scopolamine and others. (No special suggestions made.)

HARMINE, MARMALINE


The doctors were familiar with the name but had not worked with this chemical.

He called attention to an editoral in the ANNALS OF INTERNAL MEDICINE, an article on psychogenic drugs. He suggested it would be of interest.


ADREHOCIEROIE

The writer mentioned Adrenochrome and related substances as possibly psychogenic agents. Agreed that they were possibly C of interest but stated he was not exactly certain how this could be used.

HYPHOSIS

The writer introduced the subject of Hypnosis and explained in general terms our interest in it and our work with it. Of course, was familiar with hypno-analysis but is not using the technique apparently at the present time. He has not tried using any of the new chamicals as a trigger for Hypnosis and to his knowledge no one has tried obtaining hypnosis in the semi-coma period following shock-therapy. He agreed very little was known about the actual ultimate ends that were possibly obtainable through hypnosis. He stated that it certainly deserved intense experimentation and thought experiments could be designed to establish how far an individual could be pushed under hypnosis.





STOUACH TUBES

a tube into the mother's stomach to assist in childbirth. He stated exymen is pumped into the mother's atomach through a tube and instead of having a blue buby at birth, apparently a pink baby results. This has been used successfully. He suggested we give some thought to placing gas into a subject's stomach as a possible way to produce talk. He said different gases could be induced into the stomach through a tube and absorbed from the stomach into the body. He and said C this could be easily accomplished with an unconscious subject.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES, ELECTRONARCOSIS

All persons that were talked to or met at the stated that the the stated that the stated a vast array of electronic equipment of all types. They stated they built their own devices if devices were not available on the market and at the stated have had numerous devices that were entirely unique. Nost of these devices would be too complex, too clumsy or require too much attention to serve a useful purpose in our work. The stated he was quite familiar with electronarcosis and stated it was clumsy and painful and felt it would not be useful to us.

It should be noted that the group talked to stated that they would be glad to design and build apparatus for us if such were required or that they would themselves attempt to develop apparatus or devices that arose from their thinking along lines mentioned heretofore.

UNUSUAL RESULTS

The writer stated we were extremely interested in any unusual



results of new cherucals or strange results that arose from use of new Continue read of chemicals, chemicals, electronic devices, UHF sound, etc.

All individuals talked to stated they were well-aware these things occurred but at the heart hey were usually quickly eliminated since they would not be in the best interests of the patients. They said they would have to think this problem over before appropriate answers could be made.

DIETARY EMPICIPHOLES

The uniter introduced the matter of dietary deficiences as a possible weapon. The writer pointed out a standard Soviet or Communist technique in brainwashing or in prisoner-handling appears to be a barely lifesustaining food ration. The writer asked the individuals he talked to to consider this problem and whether they thought it might be possible to manufacture Tood which to all outward appearances would look and taste normal but would, in fact, be specially prepared (vital elements removed) and would create confusion, anxiety, fear, etc. in a prisoner or perhaps lower montal resistance, increase suggestibility or affect the memory. POTESTIATES CHENICALS, GENERAL

Potentiating chemicals, the writer pointed out are interesting to us. All doctors agreed that this field should be explored. They have nothing to offer of particular interest at the present time and said it would have to be given thought.

WIAHINE SULFATE

They suggest persons in our work under intense pressure and suffering from strain or hangover might find this preparation useful. They stated, however, it was probably well known to us.

For general purposes, the writer introduced the subject of Brainwashing. All individuals talked to expressed great interest in the matter but felt that their thoughts were not solified enough to advance any ideas in this connection. They could suggest no techniques or subtle chemical treatments that might have produced this phenomena but st



they were not informed in the matter except through the public press.

UNWITTING OR UNWILLING CUBJECTS

The writer discussed at length the problem of the unwitting and even the violently unvilling subject and asked for some opinions or suggestions as to how such subjects could be brought into a controlled situation. This problem, according to all interviewed, required considerable thought. Closely related to the above was the problem of what could be done to a person who was asleep without disturbing and without leaving telltale marks on the person or leaving a hangover. answers were again the same but showed the writer a very small sized entirely portable machine for administering gas which had possible use in these cases. This small highly portable device had containgers of various gases in little cylinders similar to those used in the sparklet surgested that this machine seemed extremely valuable ${\sf C}$ soda bottles. 🛣 for our study (see literature attached). As far as is known, this mechine has not yet been marketed and the writer is of the opinion that had the first two machines in his office for study that as a first-ald device or an exygen device when working with

FSYCHOLOGICAL HARRASSMENT

The writer asked various contacts at the they had made B any studies of psychological harrassment of any type. The answer was negative. The writer asked if any work had been done on such things as unusually painted rooms or slightly out-of-proportion rooms, rubber rooms, vibrations, smells, etc. The answer again was negative. LOBOTOHIUS, ETG.

In the discussion concerning lobomomies, it was ascertained that
the neurosurgeons performed lobotomics of various types as a
matter of course. They were not particularly impressed by the use of
lobotomies for our work based primarily on the fact that it was clumsy,
dangerous, required expert surgery with not too predictable results.
They were aware of the term chemical lobotomy but apparently felt that
this was not suitable. They knew of brain surgery performed by UHF sound
but since this required opening the skull they then ht this also was
not feasible. (See

MEDICINAL PLANTS

The writer requested if in the research they had discovered or worked with any "unusual" medicinal plants or had studied the



effect of "unusual" plants upon humans. In this connection, it is interesting to note that again brought up the subject of mushrooms, (particularly the toxic variety. Stated he was studying mushrooms in a general sense and had noticed several articles in the literature describing the use of mushrooms as an intoxicent, particularly among primitive Siberian tribes. He thought this was very important and felt a study should be made. He suggested that perhaps mushrooms which were toxic possibly used at dinner if worked in combine tion with LSD or rescaling might be produce unusual results. Details note developed.

TOTAL ISOLATION


Perhaps the most interesting discussion of the entire trip occurred during one of the conferences. A without any previous reference, asked the writer if he were familiar with the work of Dr. HEBB in Canada. The writer stated he was familiar with WEBB's work. did the writer note the significance of Dr. NEBB's work from an intelligence point of view. The writer replied that the matter was known and we were examining it and studying it as best we could. The writer aske! If he had done any work along these lines and he replied he had not but had read all available literature along these lines and wanted to do some experimentation if he could make some arrantements. 🛴 stated Dr. HE 8's work was quite well known and stated the effect on animals was also fairly well described in the literature. stated that this field should definitely be exploited. He stated it was of extreme importance and that it might be a very important intelligence weapon. He urged that worked be done in this connection and the isolation techniques be used in combination with chemicals such as ISD, mes-



caline, Fau Jolfia, etc. The writer discussed the isolation problem in very general terms with and particularly asked them to give C consideration to ways and means to which the isolation technique could be brought to bear on willing or more important unwilling or even violently-objecting subjects. Stated that the problem appeared C importance to him of tremendous/and he certainly intended to give this matter considerable thought. Surged complete studies of experimentation and C research in this field a number of times during the conversations in the several conferences the writer had with him.

POLYGRAFII

The writer in very general terms discussed the polygraph and some of the uses made of it. Whereas most of the doctors present had heard of the device, none of them had had a chance to see it in actual work Fin connection with CD had worked with the original development of it. In response to exact questions concerning measuring devices which would be of use to the Folygraph Branch, the writer was informed that there were on the staff of the several individuals whose names will be mentioned later who had done very advanced work in the inventing of and development of sensitive measuring devices for blood pressure, skin radiation, ele. One doctor is supposed to have leveleged numerous pleythysmographs and related resouring devices which are capable of adaption to the measurement of decreased or increased blood pressure or blood flow at many points in the body. This discussion was not developed because the specialists referred to were not cleared and it was felt that exploration along this line could wait for



these clearances.

The problem of how to produce a specific illness or pain that would develop several hours after the giving of a chemical was discussed but now invediate ideas were proposed in this connection.

"AUTOMATIC AMESTRETIC MACHINE" (BICKFORD and FAULCOMER)

This topic was introduced for discussion but since the machine was described as extremely complex, cumbersome and utterly useless under our circumstances the matter was not pressed.

ICCOOLSCHARGE DEVICES

In view of the failure of the hypospray to be of particular value to us, the Subject of Micro-Dischatge devices for injection of powerful new anents was introduced. Anted he knew of the pencil injector-type of device but stated as far as he knew no one had built any of these devices on a very small scale. He agreed, however, that with our knowledge of small hypodermic needles and injector mechanisms such a device could be built. Anted this type of device would be effective for lethal purposes. He stated this type of device could be built in small sizes that could definitely penetrate heavy clothin, including leather jackets, etc.

ATTHESIA

The writer went into some discussion about the problem of a controlled ammesia and its value. The writer explained that our experiments indicated that certain chemicals, typnosis and other things produced armosia but these were not contolled, were not contrally total and that under no circumstances would be guarantee armosia in any type of work. The doctors discussed the matter and agreed that centelled armosia or total armosia was not obtainable except possibly through surgery which they ruled out. They also felt that electroshock or chemically-induced shock, while they would cenerally produce armosia for the actual shock operation, would not produce armosia for periods precoding the administration of the shock. They indicated there was some armosia produced for considerable periods following the shock but this certainly, was not controlled and would be apotty.

- d) Diberal, a barbiturate of the Eli Lilly Company is a convulsant.
- d) Magnesium Sulfate intramuscularly will cause convulsions.
