





EVALUATION STUDY

At this camp were some forty young people, 16 - 21 years of age. These young people had all attended at camp when they were eleven years old. That is, as eleven year old children, they had participated in a month long camp where they met, played and lived with other children of different nationalities. This camp was essentially a reunion camp where alumni of previous camps could come and renew old friendships. As such, the reunion group represented an unique collection of young people; a group of youths all of whom had had the experience of intimate international co-living while at the impressionable age of eleven.

This camp then, presented a particularly good opportunity to study

the effects of such experiences and to investigate factors important in such

things as international dynamics, attitude development, and world mindedness.

Therefore, sponsored at this camp a research program designed to

investigate the effects of an international co-living experience as eleven year

olds on the interests, attitudes and motives of 16 - 21 year old youths. To do

this, the research program was specifically aimed at answering these

questions:

- 1. Does this experience stimulate a definite interest in international problems?
- 2. Does this experience stimulate a desire to understand viewpoints other than ones own?

- Does this experience foster friendships between youths of $\frac{1}{3}$ -2 different nations?
- Does this experience stimulate motivation to work for peace?
- Does this experience enhance the communication skills and 5. social skills of the youth?
- Does this experience provide, to the youth, information about different peoples?

To answer these questions, the youths at the reunion camp were given several different tests and questionnaires. These same tests and questionnaires were also given to a different group of youths essentially similar in background and nationality to the reunion group, but who had not attended a camp. The effects of the experience may then be judged by a comparison between the and non youth.

All data collection, with the exception of 10 American non youth, has been completed. This includes: All questionnaires and tests from 43 youths at the camp; 4 non youths from 11 from 7 from and 10 from This is the current status of the research program. The next step will be to translate those questionnaires written in languages other than English into English. Then the tests and questionnaires must be scored and these scores treated statistically. Finally, the conclusions will be drawn from the data and a final report written and distributed.

Included on the next page is a breakdown of the estimated time and cost requirements needed to complete the project.

COMMUNICATION IN 11 YEAR OLD CHILDREN

WITHOUT A COMMON LANGUAGE

Even as it has been found useful in the last few years to view mental health and mental illness in terms of "communication" (Ruesch and Bateson, 1951), so in a series of special studies conducted by with 11-year-old boys and girls of different countries per stedt, Ake, 1958 A, 1958 B), it has been found fruitful to view international relations in terms of "communication". The concept of "communication" is one which offers the possibility of analyzing relationships among any number and kind of individuals or groups from a common base.

"Communication" in a Camp for 11-year-olds of about 10 nationalities and from five to eight different languages has many aspects. These 11-year-olds who are typically at an action age make close friendships without a common language. From this we know that attitudes, sentiments, and feelings are communicated without verbal transmission.

A pertinent question is whether they transmit facts about each other.

This was tested in July, 1959, at the

The camp children were divided into boy pairs and girl pairs who did not understand one another's native language. They were seated across from each other at small tables, one pair at each. The experiment was conducted twice with an interval of six days. The task was the same for both interviews. The directions given at the second interviewing follow:

"Some days ago we used an hour for interviewing each other and we think you did it very well and that perhaps you would like to do it once more.

I am sure you will, but this time you will get a new partner, and again one who does not speak your language.

"As the first time, half of you will get a piece of paper where your names are written on the top of the page.

"The interviewing goes on for thirty minutes, and you may use anything you want to illustrate what you are asking for and you don't need to sit in your places -- but you may not ask for any help in translations from a third person.

"Try to find out as much as possible about the other person.

"After the thirty minutes we shall collect the papers and then the other half of you will get a piece of paper where your names are written at the top. You too will be allowed thirty minutes to interview your partner."

Each interviewer recorded the answers that he obtained from his partner.

Protocols in other languages were translated into English by the adult delegates

who chaperoned the respective delegations to the

Treatment of Data

The data will be analyzed to answer the following questions:

- 1. How many information units (IU) regarding the interviewee are collected by 11-year-old interviewers from partners of the same sex who do not speak the interviewer's language?
- 2. What is the content of 11-year-old interviewees' responses to

 11-year-old interviewers who do not speak the same language?
- 3. How do number and content of information units of the first session compare with those of the second interviewing session held six days later?

A coding guide has been prepared for the identification of information units. Work directions have been formulated for the identification of information units, and for categorizing, coding and tabulating these on multigraphed summary sheets -- one sheet per individual interviewer per interviewing session.

Control Sample

A control group matched for age, sex, education, and for outstanding qualities in interpersonal relations will be composed of United States boys and girls -- who thus will speak the same language. This is not as ideal control group, since it is composed of only one nationality. A composite control group composed of children from many nationalities can be obtained for later studies when funds are available for this more ambitious undertaking.


