



LETTER FROM LORD HILL-NORTON ON UFOS

References:

- A. MO 9/18 dated 23 May 94
- B. D/Sec(AS)12/3 dated 10 May 94

1. At Reference you asked for advice on the letter from Lord Hill-Norton concerning UFO sightings over Belgium, together with a draft reply.

2. Lord Hill-Norton is raising concerns put to him by Mr **Section 40**, a UFO researcher who is very well known to this section. **Section 40** first approached us in January 1993, and my staff have now written ten letters to **Section 40**. I have attached copies of this correspondence, together with copies of the three Parliamentary Enquiries that have been generated by Mr **Section 40**'s approaches to Sir Keith Speed MP. I think it is clear that although we have done our best to answer all **Section 40**'s questions, the correspondence had reached the point where nothing could usefully be added.

3. A detailed summary of the case is set out in D/MIN(AF)/94/94 dated 14 March 1994 (attached); essentially, a wave of UFO sightings was reported over Belgium on 30/31 March 1990. As well as visual sightings, some radar returns were noted, and as a result it was decided to launch two aircraft to investigate. These aircraft did attain some brief radar lock-ons, but as with the returns recorded by ground based radar, this does not mean that any structured craft was present; the point has frequently been made in this correspondence that spurious radar returns can be caused by a number of factors.

4. The key point in all this is that the MOD's only role as far as UFOs are concerned is to ascertain whether there is evidence of any threat to the defence of the UK. Given that these sightings occurred outside the UK Air Defence Region, and given that the Belgians found no evidence of a threat and did not inform any UK authorities of these sightings, the whole question goes beyond our remit.

5. Lord Hill-Norton has a long-standing interest in UFOs, and has approached the Department on this subject before, in 1985, when he wrote to the then S of S about a well-known UFO sighting. He was a member of the (now defunct) House of Lords UFO Study Group, and has written forewords for two books on the subject. He has also given at least two television interviews on the subject.

6. **Section 40** is understood to be writing a book on these Belgian UFO sightings, and is doubtless keen to build up a large file of correspondence to be used as part of this enterprise.

7. Notwithstanding Lord Hill-Norton's comments about a public uproar, we do not anticipate any difficulties. The Belgian UFO sightings are well-known among UFO researchers, and while they are likely to be mentioned in any documentary on UFOs, they are, effectively, old news. Lord Hill-Norton also mentioned the demonstration against perceived government secrecy about UFOs, held outside Main Building and Parliament on 23 May (notified to Ministers at Reference B). This was a low key affair; there appeared to be only around a dozen protesters, and there was little media coverage of the event. Each MP was given a document, which among other points mentioned the Belgian sightings; we have yet to receive a single Parliamentary Enquiry as a result of this lobbying.

8. The attached draft reply is self-explanatory, and has been cleared with D Air Def's staff. Given Lord Hill-Norton's familiarity with our policy on UFOs and with the specifics of this particular exchange of correspondence, I have kept the draft reply short, and avoided going into detail over points which have already been explained in previous letters.

DRAFT REPLY TO ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET THE LORD HILL-NORTON GCB

Thank you for your letter dated 17 May concerning the UFO sightings that occurred over Belgium in March 1990.

These UFO sightings, while clearly very interesting, are not a matter of concern to the Ministry of Defence. You will know that our only reason for examining reports of UFO sightings at all is check whether or not there is evidence of any threat, to the United Kingdom. The Belgian authorities have confirmed to us that there was no evidence of any threat; given this, and given that the sightings occurred outside the UK Air Defence Region, the Belgians saw no requirement to notify any UK authorities. Our own Air Defence experts have confirmed that they would not be concerned with reports of UFOs in the area in question. I am sure it goes without saying, however, that any unauthorised penetration of the UK Air Defence Region would be detected by our Air Defenders, and dealt with as appropriate.

It is clear to me from the papers I have seen that the position has been explained in great detail to **Section 40**, and I share the view that there is nothing new to be said on the subject.

I hope this has explained the position.

So sorry not to have thanked you earlier for your letter and Blue Book enclosure, dated 20 April.

Hope the Alien Acknowledgement Campaign presentation (scheduled to take place in a few minutes, as I write) was not too difficult for you.

I am extremely pleased to have the Blue Book paper. You are of course familiar with my position on this set-up, but the following essential points need to be emphasized:

Page 1, para. 3/page 4, para. 1: UFO reports affecting national security were never routed to Blue Book, as confirmed by General Carroll Bolender in a USAF document (enclosed), and by Colonel William Coleman (who used to work for Blue Book) to me in a recorded interview. Further, USAF Intelligence has released a number of hitherto highly classified documents relating to sightings (some of them Secret or occasionally Top Secret), and many more remain classified in the interests of national security: none of these involved Blue Book. That is all easily proveable.

What I cannot prove is that some UFOs do indeed "exhibit...unique scientific information or advanced technology which could contribute to scientific or technical research", although I am certain that they do and equally certain that there is a top secret effort to understand that technology.

Brigadier General Arthur Exon, former commander of Wright-Patterson AFB, has confirmed that fragments from the 1947 Corona, N.M. object(s) were secretly flown to WPAFB and that lab chiefs established a special projects unit to study them. As a lieutenant-colonel at the time, Exon flew over the crash sites and later handled the wreckage. He told authors Kevin Randle and Donald Schmitt that numerous tests were conducted, involving "everything from chemical analysis, stress tests, compression tests, flexing...The metal and material was unknown

to anyone I talked to". Exon has also confirmed that, following Roswell, a top secret group was established which controlled access to the wreckage, bodies, and all information thereon, and, later, to all classified UFO reports.

In an interview in Washington for Central TV, Col. J. Fletcher Prouty, a former USAF/CIA liaison officer - one of the five USAF officers who established NORAD - told us that when he was commander of a heavy transport squadron in Tokyo in 1953-4, he received a Top Secret Eyes Only wire from AF HQ informing him that if any of his crewmen were to see UFOs they were to be questioned separately, statements taken, and the details flown to Washington. Six or seven months later, 60 personnel on board a C-54 were accompanied for over half an hour by a huge unknown object. Needless to say, the report (like so many others) was never seen by Blue Book officers.

It is evident that Blue Book was a very low-level and superficial effort to study the subject, and that those involved did not have access to the really important and sensitive information. I am sure that similar restrictions apply to AS2a.

Please feel free to make this letter available to your colleagues. I would welcome any comments.

Finally, I do hope we can get together shortly.

TITLE: Unidentified Flying Objects (UFO) **DATE:** 20 OCT 1969

SUMMARY

For more than twenty years the Air Force has had the responsibility within the Department of Defense for the investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFOs) (Atch 2). As stated in Project Blue Book, this investigative program has two objectives:

- To determine whether UFOs pose a threat to the security of the United States; and
- To determine whether UFOs exhibit any unique scientific information or advanced technology which could contribute to scientific or technical research (Atch 3).

Procedures for Project Blue Book reporting are defined in Air Force Regulation 50-17. This regulation requires the Commander of an Air Force base to provide a UFO investigative capability and for Air Force Systems Command to continue Project Blue Book (Atch 4). In response to this regulation most Commanders have appointed a UFO investigating officer, usually as an additional duty. Project Blue Book has two officers, one NCO, and one civilian assigned on a full-time basis. In addition, W. A. J. Wynck served as a scientific consultant until 1 July 1969.

In 1966 the Air Force Office of Scientific Research contracted to have the University of Colorado conduct an independent scientific investigation of unidentified flying objects. This study, directed by Dr. Edward U. Condon and made available as the "Scientific Study of Unidentified Flying Objects," serves as a basis for evaluating the Air Force investigative effort (Atch 5). After an extensive study of this report as well as the review of the report by a panel of the National Academy of Sciences, past studies, Project Blue Book operations and other inputs, the Office of Aerospace Research concluded, and we agree, that the continuation of Project Blue Book cannot be justified, either on the ground of national security or in the interest of science (Atch 6).

The general conclusion of the Scientific Study of Unidentified Flying Objects is that "nothing has come from the study of UFOs in the past 21 years that has added to scientific knowledge." As to what the federal government should do with the UFO reports it receives from the general public, the authors add that they are "inclined to think that nothing should be done with them in the expectation that they are going to contribute to the advance of science." A panel of the National Academy of Sciences concurred in these views, and the Air Force has found no reason to question this

conclusion. For example, it has been the Air Force experience that although a significant portion of the Air Force's environmental research program is concerned with natural phenomena that could be associated with unidentified flying objects (Atch 7), Project Blue Book reports have not added any useful value to these research efforts (Atch 8). Thus, we concur with the University of Colorado recommendation "that only so much attention to the subject should be given as the Department of Defense deems to be necessary strictly from a defense point of view."

4. As early as 1953, the Robertson Panel concluded "that the evidence presented on Unidentified Flying Objects shows no indication that these phenomena constitute a direct physical threat to national security" (Atch 9). In spite of this finding, the Air Force continued to maintain a special reporting system. There is still, however, no evidence that Project Blue Book reports have served any intelligence function (Atch 8). Moreover, reports of unidentified flying objects which could affect national security are made in accordance with JAWM 146 or Air Force Manual 55-11, and are not part of the Blue Book system (Atch 10). The Air Force experience therefore confirms the impression of the University of Colorado researchers "that the defense function could be performed within the framework established for intelligence and surveillance operations without the continuance of a special unit such as Project Blue Book."

5. The conclusion which follows is that Project Blue Book does not merit future expenditures of resources. Accordingly, we recommend that it be terminated and that the actions which follow from this decision, such as cancelling Air Force Regulation EO-17 and not renewing the consultant contract, be initiated. Termination of Project Blue Book would have no adverse effect on Air Force operations or research programs. It would free manpower for useful purposes, eliminate the need for a scientific consultant and relieve base commanders of a minor responsibility and an administrative burden.

6. Termination of Project Blue Book would leave no official Federal office to receive reports of UFOs. However, as already stated, reports of UFOs which could affect national security would continue to be handled through the standard Air Force procedures designed for this purpose. Presumably, local police departments respond to reports which fall within their responsibilities. Similarly, as to scientific research, the Colorado researchers conclude that, although they do not see "any fruitful lines of advance from the study of UFO reports, we believe that any scientist with adequate training and credentials who does come up with a clearly defined, specific proposal for study should be supported." We see no reason why the normal channels and criteria for the funding of scientific research should not be adequate for UFO-related research.

7. Some feel that a central reporting center should be established, and a proposal has been made to establish a Rare Atmospheric Phenomena Reporting Center (Atch 11 and 12). Because the problem affects a number of agencies, this center might be under the auspices of the Federal Council on Science and Technology. However, in light of the University of Colorado recommendation

that the federal government should not set up a major new agency for the scientific study of UFOs, we do not favor this suggestion and feel that UFO reports should be left to normal scientific and defense channels. If such a center is established, it should not perform an investigative function and should be initiated only on a trial basis for a specified lifetime.

8. Project Blue Book has accumulated records on over 13,000 sighting cases. During his study, Dr. Condon expressed concern about the possible loss of these records and their relative inaccessibility at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. He was assured by Secretary Brown that we would look into the feasibility and desirability of relocating the files in the Washington area and that no action would be taken until the Colcrado report was released (Atch 13). [If Project Blue Book is terminated, the records should be transferred to an appropriate archive and preserved for their historical value and to prevent charges that the Air Force is concealing facts.]

9. [In response to the request and cooperation essential to the successful investigation of UFOs, the Air Force adopted a practice of confidentiality; with some exceptions these records would not be used without their approval. This policy, based on these records and the implications of their release, was established, reviewed, and approved.]

SAFOI feels that an Air Force controlled archive away from the Washington, D.C. area is the most appropriate storage facility. Considering the existence of local, privately sponsored UFO investigative organizations, the ready availability of these records in the Washington area would result in an inordinate workload in clearing investigators, providing documentation, and reviewing and clearing manuscripts. Therefore, the Air University was queried about the possibility of storing these documents at the Air Force Archives (Atch 15). Air Force Air University will accept these records providing:]

a. SAFOI will answer all requests about Blue Book, and not require AU research to answer such queries.

b. SAFOI will rigidly limit the right of access to recognized, legitimate researchers, and

c. SAFOI will screen researcher's notes to insure that "confidentiality" is maintained (Atch 16).

10. Project Blue Book should be terminated, and Blue Book records should be transferred to the USAF Archives at Air University. The attached memorandum would initiate these actions.

RECOMMENDATION

11. That the memorandum be signed.

Sometimes they had what we call lock-ons, which gave a parameters varying from speeds between 150 knots to 990 knots, an acceleration which occurred in a few seconds. The speeds would be impossible to tolerate for a human being, that's the first point. The second point is, the visual observations always describe a system, a machine, which hangs and hovers above the surface at quite a low altitude without making any noise. Now with the current technology that would be impossible"

And in the European Parliament document 'Report of the Committee on Energy, Research and Technology - On the proposal to set up a European centre for sightings of unidentified flying objects' (DOC EN/RR/241,241196) Rapporteur Mr Tullio Regge had this to say in his paragraph titled 'Military Secrets' (Page 5)

"However, the Belgium Air Force says that the Stealth Bomber was not involved in the

On page 7 he also had this to say:

"It is not the job of Parliament to pass judgement on UFOs. on the other hand. Parliament must take prompt steps to ensure that the information imparted to the public is correct"

That in Mexico City on July 11th 1991. during the total eclipse of the sun, tens of thousands of witnesses observed a UFO, and 17 independently operated camcorders, at varying locations, recorded the event for a total of 25 minutes, Upon enhancement each camcorder had recorded the same silver disc-shaped object. At a time when all eyes would be focused on the sky, this was undoubtedly an attempt to raise human awareness to the reality of the UFO.

That there are over 200 primary and secondary witnesses to the retrieval of a craft evidently of non-human origin, from the New Mexico desert, near Roswell, in 1947. Many of these witnesses gave testimony to having seen alien bodies recovered from the crash site. Because many new witnesses are coming forward, the General Accounting Office has recently launched a full investigation, GAO spokeswoman, Laura Kopleson said Congress Investigator Rep. Steven Schiff has asked the GAO

"to see if there is any evidence that information regarding UFOs had been suppressed," following the Roswell incident.

That documentation exists on a world wide phenomenon commonly known as 'animal mutilations' involving the surgical removal of genetically relevant tissues. Veterinary surgeons *have confirmed that the procedures, carried out in the fields, are un-reproducible by any known technology.* Farmers and ranchers have testified to the existence of UFOs over fields where such incidents have occurred. In the USA it is known that investigations into these on-going UFO/animal interactions have been conducted by the FBI and the Governor of Colorado has spoken publicly and officially on the matter.

These six points constitute only a small fraction of the currently available evidence, which wholly suggests the presence of alien beings.

The public have a right to know the truth about the UFO/Alien reality.
The public now have a right to be made aware of this truth through their representatives.

It is now time to act.

Dear Secretary of State,

I have been approached by a Section 40 of Cranbrook, Kent, who has asked me to help him to obtain a satisfactory response from your Ministry to an enquiry he initiated a year or more ago. I enclose a copy of his letter to me dated 16 March 1994, which sets out his request and his complaint. This is a small part of a quite lengthy correspondence.

He had earlier approached his Member, Sir Keith Speed, and I have seen several letters which have been exchanged between Sir Keith and Mr Hanley and also your officials. These letters do not answer Section 40's enquiries, and he finds them unsatisfactory. I am bound to say that I share that view, in the light of all the circumstances.

There is no need for me to rehearse all that has already been written in these exchanges. In short, detections were made by three NADGE radars in Germany and Belgium in March 1990, air defence aircraft of the Belgian Air Force were scrambled to intercept but although the objects were detected and held on the radar of these aircraft as well, no identification, or visual contact was made. There is no dispute about these facts, which have been confirmed by the Belgian Minister of Defence in public statements, repeated in writing to Section 40. I have advised Section 40 that, unless the procedure has been changed since I was Chairman of the NATO Military Committee, it is inconceivable that the UK would not be informed (probably automatically) of a possibly hostile, certain unidentified, detection by NADGE radars.

Section 40 has been brushed off with the standard MOD response to all reports (of which I have seen a great many) of UFO activity, which briefly put amount to "..... no threat was perceived to the UK so no notice was taken or record made of the incident". In this instance this has, in separate letters, been complicated by written statements by your Ministry that no report of the Belgian detections was ever received in the UK.

Section 40 asks, reasonably enough, "If, as Ministers assert, they had no knowledge of the Belgian events how could their Air Defence experts possibly conclude that the phenomenon did not constitute a threat, as they had no knowledge of it?"

I fear that Section 40 may well make a damaging public uproar about all this. He has already had a petition to the European Parliament upheld, and his dossier has been formally remitted to the relevant Euro Committee. A public demarche, so he tells me, is planned for the MOD, the House of Commons, and simultaneously at the Pentagon on 23 May. At least two television programmes in this country will carry his story within the next few months, and this may well not be the end of it.

I strongly recommend that you should take a personal interest in having the whole matter re-examined, so that a more satisfactory and convincing reply may be given to Section 40's question, before the matter gets out of hand.

Dear Admiral Lord Hill-Norton

I have been informed of the following facts in a letter dated 26th May 1993 from Leo Delcroix the Belgian Minister of Defence.

That on the 15th and 16th December 1989, radar detections were made by Semmerzeke (Belgium) and Vedem (Germany) of flying objects over Eupen in Eastern Belgium.

On the night of 30/31st March 1990, detections were made by Semmerzeke and Glons CRC (NADGE) radars of the Belgian Air Force, and Vedem in Germany, of an apparent airborne intruder in the vicinity of Brussels in Belgium. Aircraft of QRA J Wing of the Belgian Air Force were involved. These detections followed visual observations by many thousands of witnesses, of whom 75 were members of the Belgian Gendarmerie.

A report was received dated 15th August 1993. It was made by Major Lambrechts VS/3 Ctl-Met 1 of the Belgian Air Force. It states that the Belgian Air Force scrambled two F-16 interceptors (Nos AL 17 and AL 23) from the base at Bevekom.

These fighters were vectored to their targets by Glons CRC NADGE radar. This incident caused a major security alert. It lasted for over 1 hour. At 22h 39m an interception occurred during which radar 'lock-on' was achieved by both aircraft. This lasted for 45.9 secs.

At this time the target was travelling on a Westerly heading towards UK airspace at speeds in excess of 1000 knots.

The Belgian Minister of Defence at that time Guy Coeme, stated in the Belgian Parliament on the 21st December 1989 that; - 'All hypotheses can be excluded, the Minister could not tell what these flying objects were.'

A report has been submitted to the European Parliament for an enquiry into these incidents. It is No 990/93. It has been accepted for consideration by the Petitions Committee.

NATO and the Belgian agencies have provided conclusive proof of these detections. How is it that I was informed by Section 40 of the Ministry of Defence in a Letter D/Sec (AS) 12/3 of 13th October 1993, that there is no record in the UK of this incident and, despite the track having come to within six minutes of Kent, it could not therefore have been considered a threat to the security of the UK?



Dear Secretary,

After receiving a telephone call last Thursday (10-4-94) from a member of the public down in Coventry, it seemed the appropriate thing to write to you to inquire whether there has been any military or civil aviation operations or activity happening above the town in the last 4 or 5 days at about 21:00-22:00.

What was seen did not fit any description of any conventional aircraft. I can only use the acronym U.F.O to abbreviate it. A light was seen to have motionless in the night sky, then start to move across at speed, disappearing for a few seconds then reappearing brighter than before, then abruptly vanishing from sight either ascending away or towards the horizon.

My first impression of the object seen was that it was either flying on the planet's surface or it has been seen to move horizontally as well as vertically. They can be ruled out, laser displays, lighted rotary carroussels or air strikes, by the orbit of a terrestrial satellite could be possible. As I am very disappointed and national coverage these things, I would like confirmation that they are excluded and not extra-terrestrial.

I know the MOD takes these sightings seriously and that your task is to look for evidence of any threat to the UK, but what is going on seems very strange indeed.

If you would kindly inform me of any other activity above the town, I can put the witness at 22:00. Otherwise it will be another non-existent object appearing or add to the others that have occurred over the years.

Thank you for your time and to take to hear from you soon.

Regarding information on the process of declassification of the UFO archives by the Spanish Air Force, please find enclosed the following documents:

1. My paper "Spanish Air Force UFO Files: The Secret's End", a lecture I delivered in a symposium in the United States last summer. It shows the history behind the decision, steps given and methodology.
2. A summary article entitled "The Spanish Air Force UFO Files".
3. A very recent interview to Lt General Section 40, Commander-in-Chief of MOA (Aerial Operative Command, organism which is the responsible of UFO matters now), where he replies one question on the UFO declassification process.
4. File 741124, Canary Islands. Copy of one example of declassified UFO file from the official archives.

Up to now, 37 files have been fully declassified, covering the period August 1962 to August 1975, with over 500 pages of material disclosed.

There is a lot of additional details to say about this process, one to which I am specially linked. Do not hesitate to ask, in the future. Eventually, if there is enough interest, I might fly to London to brief you in detail.



I also held a PPL (Tiger Moths mostly) back in the 1960's, and hope to get it current again this summer at Compton Abbas, Dorset. The CAA say I do not have to do the full 43 hours again, just the necessary tests, which is a blessing.

At about 2240 BST this evening my wife Alison and I were in bed reading at the above address, which is at about 56 21.5N, 5 52.5 W. She suddenly got out of bed and ran into the bathroom next door, then called to me to come and join her.

I ran into the bathroom and she showed me through the window an irregular flashing light in the sky to the SSE at about 8 deg. elevation. At first I thought it was an aircraft strobe, but the colour was an intense blue-white and the rhythm was irregular. There would be two flashes close together, then a pause, the cycle being repeated about once every second. Also the light appeared to be skittering about its mean position, a sort of Brownian motion, while moving steadily to my left and downwards in elevation.

I ran downstairs to the front door, followed by Section 40 to get a view unhampered by the glass of the bathroom window. The house faces SE, and stands a short distance from the north shore of Loch Buie, an inlet in the south coast of Mull. It was a cold, clear night, almost cloudless, no moon, but stars visible and still enough daylight to make out the skyline of the Laggan peninsula which forms the SE shore of Loch Buie, about 3 miles away and rising to about 1000 feet.

This is an important detail, because it enabled me to establish that the 'Brownian' motion, or skittering about, was NOT an optical illusion. We both watched as the object moved across the sky until it was on a bearing of 130 True, which is the centreline of the house, and just above the skyline of the Laggan peninsula. For several seconds, the light danced about the horizon, disappearing below it and then reappearing, before its final disappearance.

During the few minutes that we watched it before its disappearance at 2248, I moved further from the house and my eyes adapted more to the dark. I could then see that after the two main flashes, there were a succession of faster, dimmer ones, before the cycle repeated.

The angular velocity of the object was about the same as a passenger jet at high altitude, and we are familiar enough with these being under one of the main flight paths from London and Europe to N. America for both civilian and military air traffic. (If the Lockerbie flight had taken off on time, the bomb would have gone off over us).

Section 40 told me that her attention had been attracted by a noise which she could not describe, and it was this that had caused her to run to the bathroom window. I did not hear anything, but am slightly deaf so could well have missed it. At no point did I hear any sound that might have been attributable to the object. It was a quiet night with calm sea and light northerly wind.

I wrote this down immediately after the event, returning to check for any reappearance at intervals but saw none. There was some cirrus cloud to the south, but otherwise the sky clear and Milky Way visible in a band almost directly overhead.

Section 4 said she had seen a cluster of lights behaving similarly when working on her own at a house near here on a winter evening, 2 - 3 years ago.

She also said that the noise she had heard might have been a car on the shore road below the house, about 150 yards away, and she had got up to look because there shouldn't be anyone driving along there at that time of night. We have in the past been bothered by hippies, religious nuts and other undesirables camping down there and that was why she investigated. There was no vehicle.

NOTES ADDED SAT. 8 APR. 1994

My wife reminded me of this episode last night, causing me to have second thoughts about it. At the time, I had decided that it was a close formation of military aircraft, with blue strobe lights flashing at slightly different rates and intensities.

Then I thought: what known aircraft have intense blue-white strobes?
Amber is the usual colour, for better visibility; blue is bad for this.

and: what pilots are going to fly long distances at night in close formation? (I fly light aircraft myself).

Reconstructing the line taken in the sky by the object(s) and assuming an altitude of 35,000', I obtained a rough heading of NW -> SE, speed 400 mph, and a formation size of less than 1000'. I had estimated the diameter of the light-cluster at 1/4 degree, half the full moon. This is a very close formation indeed. Is this what it was, or was it a single object with a large number of flashing lights on it? Decided to write to ATC at Prestwick.

FLYING objects spotted hovering over Earl Shilton last week remain unidentified by Leicestershire UFO Study Group.

The disc-like objects, spotted on March 26, were seen by seven witnesses who said they "jerked around the sky" at fast speeds, hovering at times and producing a high-pitched noise which changed in frequency.

Witness George Hemmings said: "One object seemed to dance around the other one. I've never seen anything like this before - they definitely were not normal aircraft."

Looking up

A Mrs Heath of Hinckley also spotted the UFOs at around 4pm: "A lot of people were looking up into the sky. We were just coming back from shopping when we saw two saucer-like objects low in the sky."


"They were silver and making a high-pitched sound - we don't know quite what to make of it all," she said.

The objects finally headed towards Leicester at around 4.10pm, according to the study group who would like to hear from anyone else who can provide sighting information about the event.

Identified: The heaven-sent hoax

Why they never cottoned on to the Thing

IT was the photograph that launched a thousand spaceships.

The blurred image of a flying saucer turned the Wiltshire town of Warminster into a mecca for UFO spotters, and claims of other sightings came thick and fast.

But yesterday, almost 30 years later, the picture was exposed as a hoax - by one of the two men who hatched the plot in their local pub.

The Thing, as it was christened, was nothing more than a milk bottle top, a cotton reel and a button.

Retired print worker Roger Hooton, who now lives in Adelaide, owned up after reading in UK Mail, the Daily Mail's international edition, that another famous photo - supposedly of the Loch Ness Monster - was of a model mounted on a toy submarine.

Alien

"I decided it was time to come clean, although I don't know why no one ever spotted it in the first place," said Mr Hooton. "It always seemed obvious to me because it looked so stupid."

"But it fooled everyone at the time and carried on fooling them. The flying saucer was even accepted as genuine by the British UFO Research Association and is listed in the UFO Encyclopaedia."

Mr Hooton, 52, and his friend Gordon Faulkner, a factory worker, hit on the plan in 1965 after reading about alleged UFO sightings in their local paper.

"We went out to a field and made a flying saucer out of the cotton reel and milk bottle cap with the button on top," said Mr Hooton.

"I was dropping it on to the ground and Gordon was photographing it as it fell. There was nothing to indicate speed or size and the background was

blank. When we got the film back from Boots, there it was - a flying saucer."

After the photo appeared in the Warminster Journal, the Thing took on a life of its own. A national newspaper took up the story and Warminster throbbled with hundreds of people hoping to see an alien. The town even spawned its own UFO Newsletter.

"The joke had got out of hand," said Mr Hooton. "It had sparked a whole new industry in Warminster and it seemed a shame to stop it."

He has now confessed the hoax to John Spencer, vice-chairman of the British UFO Research Association, who included the Thing in two of his books.

Mr Spencer said: "It was the picture that first got me involved in the subject. I was 11 at the time and it got me terribly interested. It had always been regarded as one of those photographs that could be or could not be."

"Mr Hooton felt terribly guilty about it. He wanted to put the record straight."

Despite knowing the truth, Mr Spencer's faith is unshaken. He said: "I don't believe in flying saucers or aliens, but I do believe in UFOs. There are things we don't understand in our skies."

Warminster Journal editor Diana Watkins, whose grandfather published the original photo, said: "I always used to say that when I saw one I would believe it. I still haven't seen one."

MPs to be be given 'evidence' on UFOs

A NORTH Yorkshire man is to lobby Parliament and the Ministry of Defence as part of a transAtlantic campaign to focus attention on unidentified flying objects.

Mr John Holman, of Ripon, will present evidence on UFO sightings to MPs at the same time as activists in the United States speak to the defence headquarters at the Pentagon.

As the organiser of the Alien Acknowledgement Campaign, Mr Holman was contacted by members of the U.S.-run Operation Right To Know. Both groups are trying to publicise the growing number of UFO sightings across the world.

Mr Holman, who also runs a branch of Skynet which meets near York once a month, agreed to turn his campaign into the British branch of Operation Right To Know.

So on May 23 Mr Holman will be giving every MP and MoD official in Whitehall a document entitled Are You Aware..? which gives details of worldwide UFO activity.

He said: "We think that most of the MPs and their equivalents in America are not aware of the extent of the evidence."

That evidence includes more than 3,500 sightings of inexplicable objects in the sky by pilots, as well as many more by people on the ground.

A number of sightings have already been reported this year in North Yorkshire. Several people reported seeing a large, bright object hovering over the village hall at Huttons Ambo, near Malton, in January.

Later a number of witnesses spotted a silent object in the daylight sky at Scarborough.

There have also been patterns of UFO activity on the Humberside coastline, said Mr Holman.

He thinks people are generally too afraid of being ridiculed if they say they have seen a UFO.

UFO probe after 'object' seen in sky

BRITISH UFO Research are investigating a strange sighting reported by a young Welcombe man in the early hours of the morning.

It was between 1am and 1.30am on Wednesday when the man, who does not wish to be named, driving home, saw a large round object "traversing the countryside."

He kept the object in view for about six to seven seconds and thought it might have been a helicopter, until it "disappeared at a very fast rate of knots out to sea."

The man reported his sighting to the police who passed the information to Honiton-based Douglas Cooper, who co-ordinates reports of such sightings on behalf of the national organisation.

"He estimated it to be about 60 feet above the road as it was hovering before it sped off," said Mr Cooper.

"We are particularly interested to know if anyone else saw the light, because there has been quite a lot of activity in the the North Devon area of late.

"It was 12 months to the day since an extensive sighting which, however, was completely different to this one."

LOBBY: Ufologists plan to descend on Parliament with proof of alien landings

Is there anybody out there? (would they please call Earth)

UFOLOGISTS are planning a mass lobby of Parliament in a bid to force the government to accept there is something Out There.

ET enthusiasts claim aliens have landed, had a scout round and even ravaged a few cattle. But the government will not admit it.

Allen experts believe John Major's government has covered up evidence of UFOs and landings for fear of sparking public panic. But now star-gazers are building evidence to prove their case.

Kerry Blower and husband Tom are South Wales representatives of the Alien Acknowledgement Committee (AAC), which is campaigning for Government recognition of extra-terrestrials.

The Blowers, from Croesyceiliog, Cwmbran, Gwent, have been collecting a dossier of sightings after they witnessed strange orange lights making crop circles in Wiltshire in 1990.

The AAC have already won the support of David Icke, who has written a book about ETs. "He is one of the few people prepared to speak out about this, but he is condemned as a nutter," said Mrs Blower, 31.

Mr and Mrs Blower, singers in a duo called The Genetics, were knocked for six by their sightings, which took place four years ago.

"When I saw them it made my mind go whoosh! I decided then I wouldn't rest until I found out what these things are," said Mrs Blower. "There have been so many sightings and videos made of UFOs, there must be something to it."

Mrs Blower and her 42-year-old husband are trying to gather support for a demonstration outside the House of Commons on May 23 at which they will present evidence of sightings to MPs. There are also demonstrations planned across the USA in April and May. The Blowers'

including details of 3,500 sightings by military personnel worldwide.

In October 1989, the official Soviet news agency Tass said scientists had confirmed a spaceship manned by giant aliens, four metres tall and with tiny heads, had landed in a park in the Russian city of Voronezh.

"I think the government are just worried there would be panic if they admit aliens have landed," Mrs Blower said.

"There would be economic chaos, religious wars, breakdown, it could be like War of the Worlds."

Encounters close to home

MRS BLOWER says there have been hundreds of sightings of aliens in Wales, though only a few people are prepared to state on record that they have seen a UFO. Sightings include:

APRIL 1977: Mark Marsden, a 12-year-old Milford Haven schoolboy, who said he was chased home by a gleaming 10ft creature dressed in silver with a black square where its head should have been.

APRIL 19, 1977: Mrs Rose Granville saw an oval shaped object in the sky and then two tall figures clad all in white from head to toe. In October Mrs Granville, of the Horeen Fort Hotel, Marboes, spotted a pulsating glowing saucer-like object drifting above Stock Rock, St Bride's Bay.

AUGUST 27, 1977: Larry driver Francis Lloyd saw 7ft-tall humnoids on Nantycaws Hill, near Carmarthen, Dyfed.

JANUARY 1979: Colin Webber, of Coerphilly, spotted a cigar-shaped object giving off a brilliant white light.

SEPTEMBER 1982: Amateur astronomer Ron Tredry, of Whitchurch, Cardiff, spotted a pulsating white light which changed colour to blue and red as it flew over the Bristol Channel.

JANUARY 27, 1988: A man from Pyle, who insisted on remaining anonymous, told reporters he had spotted a large object in the sky over Meadow Street, North Cornelly. He said it was the size of three moons with three tops of different coloured lights.

OCTOBER 1988: Mechanic Tony Silvestri was driving home with his wife and daughter from Lampeter to Cilfan Aerodrome. When they drove past the theatre at Fain Fach he said the whole car was lit up by a brilliant greenish light that was so bright he couldn't see out of the windscreen.

Hunting for aliens is a life mission

UNEMPLOYED printer Jeremy Cue has a mission.

"To find an answer," says the 47-year-old chairman of Kent's UFO Studies group.

From his Larkfield Avenue, Gillingham, home Jeremy hopes collate information from across the county to convince people there is life outside our world.

"I know I am going to get a lot of crank calls but that's par for the course. You have just got to get through them to get to the real people," he said.

Jeremy, who set up the group with two friends, has been a firm believer in UFOs for most of his life.

Not seen but herd

"THE evidence for UFOs is overwhelming," reports Insight Network magazine. "There are plenty of eyewitness accounts, photographs, and even, it is claimed, parts of spaceships around and an alien base underground in America. Yet mention it to most people, and you may get disbelief, scorn, or a total lack of awareness." Fancy that.

One theory is that, 45 years ago, aliens came to Earth from a planet in the Orion constellation. Unfortunately, "they have no digestive tract so they can't eat Earth food — they are designed to absorb mush through a semi-porous membrane — and have lost the means of reproduction due to a disease of their immune system (like Aids) which has atrophied their genitals. As a result they're slowly dying out. Looking to find a cure for their predicament, they made a deal with various governments of the world to allow them to experiment with the genitals and innards of cattle (explaining the mutilated or disappearing cow stories)."

A bit unlikely: "Er, we're a dying

race of space aliens with no genitals. Lend us a cow."

According to this theory, the government, peeved at handing over all its cows without so much as a phaser blaster in return, attacked the aliens. No casualties have been reported to date.

There is another theory, however. This is the one favoured by Geoff Freed, who lectures to the EC Commission and the Food and Agricultural Organisation of the United Nations (Rome). But don't let that worry you.


There are, in fact, five types of alien. Luckily, they're "benign and have amazing technology. They have taken people for monitoring, but only with the consent of the individual, and they explain exactly what they're up to." Plus, best of all, "they are ecologically sound".

Why haven't they said hello? "They are waiting for us to form a global community. When we can be trusted to use technology responsibly, extra-terrestrials will come forward and invite us to take our place on the galactic council."

Extrasensory deception

The occult? It's a load of crop circles

Once interviewed a man who claimed to have been kidnapped by aliens and taken away in a flying saucer. I don't remember the details, but I think they had performed unspeakable medical experiments on him, then whisked him off to their home planet in the star system Whatnot. A few months later, he says, he was deposited back by his car on the lonely road where the adventure had begun.

This man had subsequently written a book about his ordeal, which, because it purported to be fact rather than fantasy, sold rather well. It was even made into a movie, and at the time he was planning to write a sequel. The aliens, he said, had returned.

He related all this in a deadpan, almost monotone voice. He never smiled, never acknowledged for even an instant that he was play-acting and that you knew he was, and that he knew you knew it, and you knew he knew you knew... The price he paid for his book sales was a few interviews with querulous, cynical journalists, so he played his role and, ultimately, he banked the cheques.

Of course, I know, it *could* have been true. It is possible, I suppose, that he was indeed abducted from his car by aliens, endured extraterrestrial medical experiments, visited the star system Whatnot, and that I've entirely misjudged the man. But somehow I doubt it.

For a start, I don't believe in this stuff. I don't believe in UFOs, ley lines, astrology, the paranormal, faith healers, premonition, witches, fortune tellers, the occult, or any explanation of crop circles other than natural phenomena. I tend, in fact, to agree with the

mony can establish a "miracle" unless it is of such a kind that its falsehood would be more astonishing than the fact it is meant to establish. In other words, if someone tells you he's been up in a flying saucer, or insists that he saw a statue of the Virgin Mary moving about, you need only consider one question: is his story more plausible than the possibility he's mistaken? In dealing with the paranormal, or the occult, or flying saucers, the premise is so fantastic that the simpler explanation — that your informant is either misguided, or a lunatic, or, more likely, lying through his teeth — is almost certainly correct.

In the case of my interviewee, the fact that prior to his "kidnapping" he had been a none-too-successful writer of pulp fiction, and that since then he had become a best-selling author, is reason enough to query his story. Which do you find easier to believe: that he had been kidnapped by aliens, or that he had found a simple way to make a fast buck? QED.

Yet a substantial number of people would still choose to believe that he had been abducted by alien beings. The simple fact is that six years short of the second millenium, despite the extraordinary advances of science and technology, we seem to be experiencing a resurgence in superstition — in beliefs that should, logically, have died out centuries ago.

I was recently sent a book from a reputable publisher purporting to provide "authoritative evidence that the 'strange but true' phenomenon is alive and well amid the hi-tech Nineties". Among these exciting manifestations of the paranormal were "premonition, thoughtography, photokinesis... faith healing and other phenomena linked to physical manifestations" as well as cases of people "who can switch on and off street lighting at will". Street lighting? I know that trick. I once had a friend in Paris who lived across the Seine from the Eiffel Tower. At nine at night (or whenever it was) he would gather everyone on his patio, clap his hands dramat-

stupidity (the position of the stars at the moment of your birth have absolutely no effect on your personality — honest), otherwise sensible people persist in crediting it with at least some validity. It has none, and I groan every time I'm asked my star sign (Gemini, as a matter of fact. *Of course*, you knew...) Also, religious mysticism is back in fashion; quasi-Christian occultism (mixed with a little New Age banality) has undergone a quiet renaissance in popular mythology. A new book, called *Angels: True Stories of How They Touch Our Lives*, a collection of people's accounts of being helped by angels, is to be published later this year. Another book, *The Second Coming: a Terrifying True Story*, purports to be "a spine-chilling account of the occult, focusing on the relationship between psychics, ritual landscapes and communication with arcane spirit guardians and earth energies". The author's previous book, apparently, demonstrated that the hurricane of October 1987 (and probably the collapse of the world's stockmarkets too) was an occult plot concocted by someone called the Black Alchemist to pave the way for the Antichrist.

Obviously, there's a market for this stuff — otherwise publishers wouldn't peddle it. Why this should be so in 1994 is another question; it's been suggested that science has become so arcane that ordinary people, like you and me, have been left behind. We console ourselves with the certainties of pseudo-science, like astrology, or the occult, or mysticism. Or perhaps we're frightened by reality, so we look for miracles, manifestations of a wiser beneficence, represented in earlier times by religious wonders and these days by UFOs.

When David Hume was writing, it was during a period when scientific rationalism was vying with (and replacing) popular superstition. Were he somehow to come back now, he would find it odd that many of those things he thought would be swept away into the dustbin of mythology were still

HUDDLED conspiratorially in a quiet corner of The Green Gate pub in Smallbridge, near Rochdale, I feel I am on the receiving end of some highly privileged information as it's being delivered in decidedly hushed tones. As Mike Jones opens his briefcase to bring out a wad of literature supporting his theories, I glance around furtively just in case there's a camera recording our conversation. This may sound rather MI5, but the subject matter is nothing short of outlandish.

For the past 27 years, Mike Jones has been a dedicated "ufologist" although he prefers the term "UFO researcher and investigator." A postman by day, Mike spends every spare moment writing articles, giving talks and co-ordinating the Rochdale UFO Research Bureau. Totally committed to the pursuit of the "truth" whatever that may reveal, his main motivation is to rid the topic of all its connotational connotations.

"Basically, I find myself in a no-win situation. On the one hand we have a government who doesn't want the public to know what's going on. On the other hand, we have the public who say they want to know, but as soon as you tell them, you see this fear curtain drop down. It's what psychiatrists call the "denial factor." People are not only afraid of what UFOs mean but they're afraid of being laughed at."

Mike's fervent enthusiasm for UFO research has earned him a reputation as one of the leading experts in the north west, but still his friends at work call him "The Spaceman." His fascination was first inspired by a schoolboy love of astronomy. It was while skywatching that he had his first UFO sighting.

"A friend of mine had a telescope and we saw what could only have been an unidentified flying object changing direction at right angles. I know it wasn't an aircraft and it was in the days before the first sputnik was launched.

"There was nobody I could turn to. My grandfather patted me on the head and said I had an overactive imagination. I've had sightings since. I always feel tremendously proud when it happens. Sometimes bright lights just zoom up and stop dead as if taunting you. I know the night sky like the back of my hand and if I can't explain it, it's unexplained.

"I never go looking for UFOs. I have a saying, 'If they want you, they know where you are.' There's no point in seeking them out."

Which brings us along to one of Mike's more unsettling theories. On the night that he had a sighting of three revolving red lights on the way to (not from, I hasten to add) the local pub, he believes that a friend of his was kidnapped by aliens near to a motorway service station on the M62. This notion is probably harder to swallow

than an ostrich egg, but Mike strives to make it palatable.

"I deal in facts," he says flatly, "and I know several people who have been abducted. It sounds fantastic but I can prove it. These experiences have all come to light under hypnosis. Whether you believe it or not, there is some kind of genetic engineering programme taking place. Women are being used as surrogates. It's a bit difficult talking to a lady about it . . ." Mike falters, shifting about in his chair and looking a bit uncomfortable. Totally agog, I urge him on. "Well, it appears to be aliens - entities that we call the 'greys' because of their appearance. More and more women are coming forward to speak about it. They'll be driving home on a country lane one night and suddenly something diverts their attention. When they get home, they realise they've lost an hour and the next thing they discover they're pregnant. Some eleven weeks or so later another unusual thing will happen, although they probably won't connect the two, and they'll find themselves suddenly unpregnant. The foetus is removed."

Having only just discovered I am pregnant myself, this all begins to take on a deeply disturbing significance. I can see the tabloid headlines already. As my colour slowly drains away, Mike continues in a near-whisper.

"The medical profession are closing ranks. In some cases the woman has had an ultra sound scan which is proof enough and then the baby just disappears. In America they call it the Missing Foetus Syndrome. You're never abducted just once. Usually it starts at puberty and they keep coming back . . ."

I begin to wonder if I've been sold some kind of wind-up, but Mike is so earnest that it's impossible not to believe his sincerity.

"It's thought this has been going on since the

no feelings. They totally lack compassion and act in a purely scientific way."

Grey. Lacking compassion. Everybody thought Margaret Thatcher was a robot but it looks like John Major's gone one better. Mike has a lot of information on the "greys". He quotes instances where UFOs have not only been sighted but taken away for investigation containing real live aliens.

Reading an extract from a copy of his UFO magazine, I discover that as a result of the "Kalahari Incident" in 1989, two EBEs (extra-terrestrial biological entities, American jargon for alien) were discovered in a disc-like object which had crashed in the desert. The description went as follows: "Four feet tall, greyish blue skin, oversized head, prominent cheekbones, slanted eyes, thin neck, no ears, short thin legs, chest and abdomen covered in scaly ribbed skin, webbed hands and feet with three digits, totally devoid of body hair and no exterior sexual organs." Not the sort of person you'd like to meet in a dark alley.

"What everybody wants is evidence," stresses Mike, "and there we have it! Photographs. Bodies. Recovered alien craft. What more can you want?"

"Strangely enough, the Kalahari Incident hasn't hit the headlines here. We are so far behind the rest of the world. This government is the most secretive in NATO."

Closer to home than the Kalahari desert, there have been spates of UFO sightings around the Rochdale/Todmorden area and I wonder if Mike can throw any light on them?

"It could be something as straight-forward as lay lines - the Earth's natural energy lines. There was a sighting in the centre of Heywood in 1988. 

BRIGHT lights and silver oval shapes are the most common UFO sightings reported to stargazing members of a local group.

Kettering and District Amateur Astronomers' Society receives about two or three reports a month from people who claim to have spotted UFOs.

In most cases there's usually a very simple explanation for the mystery objects they have seen in the sky.

Steve Williams, society secretary, said: "People who report seeing a silvery oval object in the sky have usually spotted a weather balloon.

"The other common sighting is bright lights, and these are usually seen at night, often in the sky."

Mr Williams, who lives in Wellingborough, and has been a member of the society for ten years, said people were usually keen to get to the bottom of UFO sightings. He said: "In 99 per cent of cases we can come up with an answer."

And after years spent gazing to the heavens does he believe in aliens?

"The nearest place we can expect an outer space visitor from is four light years away - I don't think we can expect too many callers."

TRUCK driver Mark Kitchener joined other ET readers in spotting a fire in the sky.

Mr Kitchener, of Duchy Close, Higham Ferrers, was on his second run of the night, travelling along the A45 towards the M1 past the Earls Barton turn, when he noticed the object just after midnight.

He said: "It came down in an uncontrolled fashion in the area of Wollaston and Grendon. It reminded me of a flare from a flare gun, and it flicked as it dropped."

Another reader, who asked not to be named, said he saw a mystery fire in the sky two Thursdays ago at about 2.30pm.

He said: "Looking over towards Islip and Thrapston I saw what looked like two halos side by side which were bright yellow and orange.

"They hovered for about a minute

quite low in the sky and moved upwards and diagonally towards Wellingborough."

Motorist Nick Gibbins saw a blazing object falling from the sky, which has not been explained.

As he was driving on the A509 last month, he saw the object descending from the sky over Grendon. He drove there but could not find anything.

Mr Gibbins, of London Road, Bozeat, received three calls from other ET readers interested in his sighting.

He said: "I must admit I was fairly sceptical about UFOs until I saw it that night. The reason I phoned the ET was because I wanted a logical explanation, but there wasn't one.

"It was like something burning. To begin with I thought it was some wreckage, but it came down slowly as if it was coming to land."

Sir, — Stuart Campbell (Letters, 3 February) has a point above the wording of the Dechmont, West Lothian, UFO plaque. I think what he is suggesting is that all UFO encounters must be taken as "alleged", rather than proved in fact.

However, the erection of a cairn was still the first official recognition of a UFO "incident", whether or not you accept the reality of the event.

As Mr Campbell knows, the wording put on the plaque was not acceptable to UFO groups in Scotland implying, as it did, that the important aspect of the event was Arthur C Clarke's coverage in his TV series of the incident rather than Bob Taylor's experience (the unnamed forestry worker described on the plaque).

Now, Arthur C Clarke's *A-Z of World Mysteries* (oddly enough, not written by the great man) has gone one stage further and claimed sole responsibility for having the plaque erected by Livingston Development Corporation!

In fact, there was a campaign by various Scottish-based groups and individuals to encourage the corporation to carry out this project. I am not aware of the involvement of Arthur C Clarke, or any of his co-writers, in this campaign.




We are currently producing a documentary on the subject of UFO phenomena. This is a serious and in-depth presentation of various aspects focussing chiefly on the objective reality of reports and witness accounts.

Much emphasis is given to reliable accounts from military and scientific personnel. We have recently returned from the United States and Russia where our interviews have included statements from Colonel Fletcher Prouty (one of the architects of the NORAD defence system) and Congressman Steven Schiff. In Russia we also filmed interviews with Colonel General Igor Maltsev (Deputy Chief of Staff of the Soviet Air Force) and Colonel Boris Sokolov who headed a ten year military and scientific project into the topic in the 1980's.

Another aspect of the programme includes brief sequences from the public at large who have captured unusual aerial phenomena with their camcorders.

We are aware that there is a significant gap in terms of statements from official British sources, and although we are also talking to Lord Peter Hill-Norton, former Chief of the Defence Staff, we would like to include an interview with Section 40, your spokesman on these matters.

We believe it is important that the British public are made aware that this department provides a focus for those who have witnessed or indeed filmed unusual aerial phenomena. As a public service we have found this is relatively unique and worth emphasising.

Broadly speaking we would like to cover a number of points:

- What is the department's remit in handling reports and does it deal with civilian as well as other official enquiries?
- What percentage of reports can be classed as unidentified, and would he tell us about some typical reports received - ie confusion between aircraft landing lights/airships etc.?
- When reports come in - what happens to them?
- What is the lifetime of a report? We understand that before 1967 reports were routinely destroyed. Has this changed?
- Are there typical report 'waves' and do these correlate with specific events? I.E. we understand that when the film 'Close Encounters of the Third Kind' was released, reports peaked for the year in question.
- Have there been any significant cases that may have constituted a security threat to the United Kingdom?
- Could the official statements by Col. de Brouwer of the Belgian Airforce in March 1990, and the then Minister of Defence Guy Coeme, that an object tracked by radar installations and pilots was intelligently controlled encourage more open debate within the British military services?
- Given the often hundreds of sightings reported to the department every year, what main conclusions have been made as to the nature of the objects reported?

The filming, including setting up and dismantling should take in the region of 2 hours, preferably at Section 40's office. We would like to film on the morning of next Wednesday 6th April if that is convenient both for you and for him.

We would be most grateful if this is possible.

Because of the intervening holiday break, I am initially faxing this request and will post a top copy to you.

Spooky goings on in Church Stowe

A CHURCH Stowe woman who spotted a UFO has had her experience immortalised on video.

Elsie Oakensen's trip home from Daventry to the village one May day in 1978 has left her a minor celebrity in UFO circles.

Her appearance in the video, *Penetrating The Web*, is the latest in a long line of screen spots, radio shows and mentions in at least ten books on the subject.

"It's very flattering to still

be invited to go on these programmes," said Elsie, who never gets tired of telling her story.

Her journey home to Church Stowe went wrong as she turned right at Weedon crossroads, where she first noticed a grey dumbbell object with red and green lights.

As she entered the village her car came to a halt.

"By the schoolrooms I was in complete darkness except for a series of white lights

with no beam," she explained. After the lights had circled around for a time, they left, and Elsie found herself driving along the road as before, only her journey had taken twice as long as it should have.

A few months later Elsie heard of a group of four Byfield women travelling through Preston Capes a few hours later, who had seen similar lights, which experts believe backs up her extraordinary story.

Pensioner's UFO sighting 'confirmed' by second report

Pensioner Alfred Clarke thought he was imagining things when he saw a UFO from his kitchen window — until he read the *Oxford Mail*, sister paper of the *Bicester Advertiser*.

For there in black and white was Geoff and Jenny Cunningham's account of their sighting of a UFO on the same night.

The Cunninghams from Hampden Avenue, Thame, saw an 80ft long object near the Oxfordshire Golf Club at Moreton on the edge of the town.

City date for Icke's psychic show

GREEN goalie and self-styled son of God David Icke is set to steer his psychic roadshow to Scotland.

But the former prophet of doom won't be visiting Arran — the island he predicted would be wiped off the map in an apocalyptic earthquake.

The demise of the West Coast holiday spot was one of a string of bizarre forecasts made by the sports broadcaster and environmental campaigner when he hit the headlines in 1991.

Sceptical

The 41-year-old's fondness for turquoise and a claimed hotline to God met a sceptical response but, three years later, the former professional goalkeeper is still striving to save the world.

He believes the next 18 months hold major revelations when it is proved the US military have known of UFO landings and extra-terrestrial visits since the 1940s.

The author of five books explaining his beliefs, Icke has spent recent years on talk-tours around the world and looks forward to a date in the Capital during a five-day visit to Scotland next month.

"I have been told the people of Edinburgh have an open mind and that is all I can hope for," he said today. "Obviously the minds of some people are already made up about me and what I have to say but there are an increasing number prepared to listen because of what is happening in the world."

While admitting that his 1991 predictions had a poor strike-rate, Icke said the general theme of the

forecasts had been proved correct although the specifics had not. "Look at the extremes suffered by people in California recently.

"That kind of chaos is being mirrored around the world and it is no surprise that people are becoming more and more convinced that something fundamental is wrong."

What is wrong, according to the Isle of Wight-based psychic, is misplaced faith in organised religion and science and too much negative, destructive thinking.

David Icke will speak at the Assembly Rooms on Friday, April 15. Tickets £5.50, conc £3.50.

Little grey persons from fruitcakeland

IN THE small hours of 30 November 1989, Javier Perez de Cuellar, then secretary-general of the United Nations, was being chauffeured through the Lower East Side of New York when he was abducted by aliens and taken to their spaceship. By now, y-jama-clad, he was subjected to an intimate physical examination before being returned to the folk whence he came. This bizarre rumour has filtered up from fruitcakeland to the semi-serious press. As a result, poor old Perez de Cuellar is harassed by fax, by phone and by persistent reporters.

The case of the missing secretary-general — the most sensational of the hundreds of alien abduction tales sweeping the United States — provides the centrepiece for Jim Schnabel's remarkably detailed, almost academic study of the evolution of the flying saucer myth. He is right to point out that the emergence of the Perez de Cuellar legend because, except for the superstar element, it is typical.

The tale centres on "Linda", a middle-aged woman who lives with her family in the Lower East Side. She was convinced that in her youth she had been abducted by aliens. She had also been plagued by ghosts and poltergeists. Linda started attending a support group for abductees led by Budd Hopkins, one of several influential characters who make a good living out of the rapidly growing flying saucer cult. One-day Linda told Hopkins that she had just been through yet another abduction. He "regressed" her hypnotically — a standard practise among ufologists — and, bingo, she recalled the event in detail, including sexual interference.

who claimed to have seen Linda and little grey persons float out of her window and into the spacecraft. In later communications, the two claimed they were members of the secretary-general's bodyguard. Subsequently, according to Linda, these men (who, unsurprisingly, have never been traced) abducted her on several occasions and they, too, attempted to molest her. Then, under further hypnosis, she "remembered" that she had been abducted by the spacemen yet again — and these latest ordeals had taken place in the company of the

then secretary-general of the UN. Next, one of her friends, another of Hopkins's patients, revealed that she also had been abducted, along with Linda, Linda's son ... and Perez de Cuellar.

Abduction tales such as Linda's are, according to Schnabel, increasingly common in the United States. There is usually an element of sexual harassment, the abductions are repeated and often the details reflect novels, movies or earlier accounts of abductions. (In Linda's case, *Nighteyes*, a sci-fi novel with a similar theme, had been published shortly before her crucial seizure.) As well as pseudo-sex, pseudo-science is often involved. There is, further, a wimpish, pseudo-religious element to a number of the tales collected by Schnabel. Many aliens command us to make love, not war, to look after the planet and, above all, be not afraid.

In recent years, Schnabel points out, hypnosis and other dubious forms of regression analysis have been used in the US to "rescue" lost memories of sexual abuse in childhood. Tales which Freud would have treated as oblique and symbolic expressions of deep drives, fantasies and neurotic symptoms are taken as literally true. It has, according to Schnabel, become usual for ufologists to employ similar hypnotic techniques and to give similar credence to the tales that emerge.

What is astonishing is that there is a vast audience out there that is only too ready to believe such nonsense. Schnabel's next book could focus on the believers, rather than the "abductees", and the self-appointed high priests of what seems set to become America's next barmy cult. Move over, L Ron Hubbard, here comes Perez de Cuellar.

But seeing is believing! Those who have had a very clear view of this type of phenomenon cannot forget the detail, even though the sightings lasted only a few seconds. I myself am not


given to exaggerations or hallucinations but what I saw about 40 years ago convinces me that I witnessed a UFO.

As I looked, it shot across the sky at incredible speed and disappeared in the northern sky in a matter of seconds. A UFO? I think so!

Could it be possible that the mysterious sightings of unidentified flying objects are in fulfilment of the prophecies of Jesus, which He stated would be witnessed in the last days? Among a great variety of signs, He said that there would be great signs from heaven to herald His return to planet earth!



HAVING SPENT many years tracking Sandy Kidd's efforts to invent a space machine, I was intrigued to learn that the European Parliament now intends to establish a UFO observatory in France.

Not surprisingly, this news has gone down in certain quarters like a lead balloon with Teddy Taylor, MP, describing it as "a madcap proposal... an idea cooked up in some kind of ethereal dream world."

Perhaps so. But millions of people have reported seeing strange objects in the sky, with many eye witness accounts of space ships landing and contact being made with their occupants. When such stories hit the headlines there usually follows a bout of flying saucer mania.

I was caught up in such a mood six years ago in Australia where I had gone to report on laboratory tests being carried out on the controversial Kidd Machine. I was staying with the Dundee engineer and his wife on a bungalow estate just outside Melbourne. One morning I was wakened early by a loud, eerie humming noise approaching the house, until I was certain a space craft was hovering overhead.

At that time the Australian media was giving extensive coverage to a family's graphic account of how their car had been buzzed by a UFO while driving across the Nullarbor Plain, east of Adelaide. For the next few minutes I was convinced this space invader had returned, this time to carry off Sandy Kidd and his anti-gravity device.

This, I know, sounds a laughable, far-fetched theory now, but at the time, in the half light of that otherwise peaceful morning, I really did believe the Martians had arrived. Peeping through the curtains I saw a large vehicle adorned with flashing yellow lights moving slowly down the street. Uniformed men were darting silently up and down the driveways as if looking for a particular address.

Then suddenly the truth dawned. I was witnessing nothing more than the cleansing department on their weekly round, the men emptying wheelie bins into the rear of a mobile crushing unit. I crept back to bed, never so glad to have seen the scaffies.

Ever since, I have kept an open mind on extra-terrestrial phenomena, although one thing does puzzle me. Why is it that UFOs are only ever spotted by individuals or small groups of observers? Why doesn't one of these flying saucers float at 200 feet above the centre of Dundee during the rush hour so that everyone can witness the miracle for themselves?

Putting that point to a UFO buff this week, he replied, "That would never happen. The crews of these space craft know that low flying over built-up areas is against our laws. You saw what happened to the paraglider who landed recently on the roof of Buckingham Palace. He finished up in court. Our friends from outer space wouldn't want that."

Ah well, now we know.

All they left was a circle of melted snow on her lawn. According to author Jenny Rowley, some people's encounters with alien beings have been far more unpleasant.

Ken Edwards, of Warrington, Cheshire, bumped into a grotesque, white figure with arms sticking out of its chest.

It beamed white rays at him, he said, which made him dizzy and lose all sense of time.

EXPLODED

When he recovered his watch had stopped, his fingers were burnt and his expensive radio set had exploded.

The noises UFOs are reported to make are reassuringly familiar.

A woman at Gateshead, Tyne and Wear, who claimed to have had an encounter with an alien with 'an Action Man hair-cut', said his craft made a noise like a lawnmower.

A UFO reported to be seen near Tamworth, Staffordshire, was said to have sounded like a swarm of bees.

Extinction of Bigfoot Linked to U.S. Robot Pointing a Cucumber

Not Really, but U.K. Journal
Notes Abnormal Nuttiness
In 1993 and More for '94

LONDON - These are weird times. In fact, the times are a full 3.5% weirder than they were just a year ago.

That, at least, is the conclusion of the Fortean Times, a London-based magazine dedicated to the study of all things bizarre. The February/March issue of the 20,000-circulation journal compares thousands of zany happenings in 1992 and 1993, and declares, somewhat arbitrarily, that the overall strangeness index rose during the period to 3,520 from 3,400. Among the curiosities of 1993:

Ticket, Please

A trash bin belonging to the London borough of Lewisham was found beside the Sea of Galilee. An enormous egg laid by an extinct elephant bird washed ashore in Australia. Sixty lambs in Germany were attacked and killed by hundreds of crows. Swedish doctors cured a deaf man by removing a 47-year-old bus ticket from his ear.

The Fortean Times Index (not to be confused with the Financial Times Index, which has been heading the other way), has 34 components, including apparitions, strange things falling from the sky and water monsters. In each category, the editors pondered their newsclippings from 30 countries to gauge the change in weirdness in 1993.

Leading the index upward was the Strange Behavior component, which includes people who throw birds into cars waiting at stoplights, people seriously injured by vegetables ejected from passing cars, and the robber who taped two cucumbers together and pretended he had a sawed-off shotgun.

The Hoaxes and Panics category got a boost from Chong Qing, China, where people were convinced that a giant deranged robot from America was killing and sucking the blood of people who wore red.

"People are more and more erratic," says Robert J.M. Rickard, the editor. "There are just such stupid extremes of behavior."

The component for Out of Place Animals also had strong gains in 1993 on the numerous citations of pumas and panthers around Britain. But the Manimal component, which includes Bigfoots, declined in 1993. "They may be becoming extinct," Mr. Rickard theorizes. "Or people may be sobering up." The index also saw a dip in

The new FT Index hasn't exactly moved the market. "I salute these guys, and I'm intrigued to think the world is becoming less rational, but it's probably worthless," says Nicholas Stevenson, an S.G. Warburg & Co. European equity strategist. "If people start using it for investment analysis, that would be even more weird."

Spanner in the Works

There are early signs that 1994 may be even weirder than 1993. Sightings of the Virgin Mary and highway ghosts are on the rise so far. Mr. Rickard has also recorded a surge in crimes against men's genitals after the celebrated case in Virginia. A Chinese woman cut off her husband's penis in the belief that he would grow a new one and it would restore their marriage. A Filipino woman wired her man's penis to an electrical device used to stun fish. Another man came to a hospital with a monkey wrench stuck on his testicles.

With such weirdness already on record for 1994, Mr. Rickard thinks his FT Index could well outperform the other FT Index. For the Fortean Times, at least, that's a bullish sign.

"The world is more full of anxiety, a more uncertain place," Mr. Rickard says. "I take comfort in the fact that it's getting weirder. It shows that man hasn't explained away everything yet."

The children couldn't estimate the size of the object, and their teacher did not see it.

I'm not suggesting there is anything extra-terrestrial about this, but it is odd. My daughter was one of the children and doesn't read the newspaper, so isn't jumping on any local bandwagon. Will the dab-hand at radio controlled models please own up?

Aliens stole my virginity

Dark White: *Aliens, Abductions And The UFO Obsession*

The forms that psychiatric symptoms take appear fairly fixed; it is their content that changes from culture to culture, epoch to epoch. Hence there are delusions and hallucinations the world over but what the hallucinated hear and the deluded believe is heavily coloured and moulded by their context. In the 19th century, if the records of the Bethlehem Hospital are anything to go by, the psychiatrically ill were pre-occupied by sex and religion. Today's patients are more troubled by hypochondriacal worries about cancer, political interference involving the CIA, the KGB and the IRA and, to judge by the contents of Jim Schnabel's beguiling book, by kidnapping and exposure to a myriad of sexual and gynaecological indignities by aliens from outer space.

The abductees, as Schnabel courteously terms them, currently pour into the offices of America's psychotherapists, telling stories of dark deeds in sterile operating chambers aboard gleaming spaceships humming with hi-tech machinery. His ironic, wry account contains all the classic UFO stories, each one of them worthy of a Spielberg movie. There is Richard Shaver who, in 1943, began to be interrupted by strange voices and forced to do things he didn't want to do. Psychotic? No — a strange race of aliens, inhabiting the centre of the earth, were focusing deleterious rays on the benighted man. Eventually, they took him down to their underworld where a siren named Nydia tried to get him to engage in forms of sexual behaviour shocking to a crane-operator from Detroit.

In an earlier age, he might have been dispatched to the local mental asylum, but the 1940s were to provide the overture for the great UFO opera which plays to vast houses to this day. Reports were already appearing regularly of sightings of strange objects and lights in the sky. By the 1960s, reports of abductions by 5ft humanoid, with putty-coloured heads and a propensity for conducting medical examinations (with special attention to the reproductive organs), had reached epidemic proportions. By the 1980s, the accounts had become utterly ridiculous — which did not prevent millions of people believing them absolutely.

A typical account is that provided by science writer Whitley Strieber, who described being hauled out of his bedroom by the blue meenies and into a messy chamber with a vaulted ceiling, where the atmosphere reeked of Cheddar cheese and the aliens smelled like cardboard and cinnamon and zapped his head with a needle. Following a rather unpleasant session with a female alien and a



scaly proctoscope, he woke to find himself naked on his living-room couch, whereupon he calmly went upstairs, cleaned his teeth and went to bed.

Given the well-known psychological law that there is nothing so far-fetched that a sizeable number of seemingly reasonable people won't believe, the wildest ufological claims have been accepted uncritically by millions of people in America. However, society is split. At what Schnabel archly terms "higher levels of culture", the UFO debate has evolved into discussions, after a few drinks, of hoaxes, hallucinations, weather balloons and Venus. However, "for low-rent people who bought tabloids and mistook Spielberg movies for reality", accounts of women being inseminated on operating tables in spaceships by pinkish translucent-skinned humanoids with metallic eyes were simply evidence that out there in the night sky an alien menace hovered.

As Schnabel points out, many eminent psychiatrists have taken a cold, sceptical look at UFO claims; they have concluded that most of the accounts reek of paranoid fantasy, manic elaboration and, in many instances, blatant fraud. Many of the abduction cases involved the use of hypnosis for verification; under

hypnosis, the stories became more bizarre and compelling. It took until the late 1970s before a sustained assault on the reliability and validity of hypnosis was mounted. In study after study, subjects were shown to confabulate and embellish. One critic, Martin Orme, a professor of psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania, warned: "If the hypnotist has beliefs about what actually occurred, it is exceedingly difficult for him to prevent himself from inadvertently guiding the subject's recall, so that (the subject) will eventually 'remember' what he, the hypnotist, believes actually happened." I could not have put it better myself.

More careful psychological studies of the personalities of "abductees" showed a tendency towards high intelligence, high creativity, lowered self-esteem, emotional immaturity, egocentricity, confusion about sexual identity, mild paranoia and, in the words of one researcher, "a tendency, under stress, to slip into 'more or less transient psychotic experiences' involving a loss of reality testing along with a confused and disordered thinking that can be bizarre". In short, the sort of people that I, as a practising psychiatrist, spend some of my time, and with modest success, persuading to take a

rest, some medication and another perspective.

What does Schnabel make of these strange accounts? In much of the book, he hedges his bets, yet he comes down on the side of the sceptics. It is difficult, he admits, to ignore the phenomenological, sociological and psychological links between alien abductions and a host of other unusual experiences, not to mention sheer mental instability. He concedes that the reported experiences appear capable of being triggered by stress, a desire for attention, a shot of mescaline, a hypnotic trance, and involve such fundamentally similar experiences as bedroom presences, levitation, flight and sexual sensations. There is, too, the remarkable ability of people to produce information they do not remember receiving. Even incidental, unconsciously absorbed information can invade consciousness. Schnabel quotes female therapists who treat Vietnam veterans for post-traumatic stress syndrome and who have themselves begun to suffer "flashbacks" about their own "combat experiences".

He is drawn to the theory put forward by Princeton psychologist Julian Jaynes who, in a remarkable book entitled *The Origin Of Consciousness In The Breakdown Of The*

Bicameral Mind, argued that, up until the end of the second millennium BC, human introspection, evaluation and decision-making in unusual situations were always performed unconsciously by the right side of the brain which delivered commands in the form of hallucinated voices and sometimes visions to the obedient left. These voices and apparitions, in the course of time, became interpreted as the voices and visions of gods — initially benign, wise, omnipotent gods to whose authority all regions and sciences attempt to return. The myriad extraterrestrial beings are merely the latest in a long line of elaborations which the human mind constructs and then becomes debused by. Other theories haul in the temporal lobe, the phenomenon of multiple personality, the sexual dimorphism of the limbic system and anthropological views on spirit possession. In the end, though, confronted by the extraordinary proliferation of ufological reports coupled, with bizarre, complicated and often ludicrous deceptions involving nose x-rays, scars, disappearing grey-stained sheets and sand-and-seaweed-covered struggles on the beach, Schnabel admits defeat.

At 9.45 p.m. on Friday 25th March 1994, I received a telephone call from a gentleman in Garforth, Leeds. He reported seeing three strange lights and an orange ball shooting northwards over Leeds. Due to the gentlemen's position in society he wishes to remain anonymous. What follows is his own written report of the sighting.

Looking towards Leeds in the constellation of Orion, I noticed a bright flashing light travelling northwards at a relatively high speed, I then noticed another bright flashing light at approximately 30° up and to the north of the first light. Its movement equaling the first.

I then looked around to see if this was occurring elsewhere in the sky, to the east I noticed a third white flashing light which after 2-3 seconds vanished.

At this point I called my mother out from the house to see this, I was pointing this out when just above the horizon I noticed an orange light

travelling fast, much faster than the other lights. I also pointed this out to my mother, after it passed out of sight no more lights were seen.

While this was happening there was absolutely no noise whatsoever, even from the roads around Garforth.

All lights described were travelling far faster than a normal aircraft.

It is possible that the white lights were chasing or trying to follow the orange light or were watching from a distance. Also possible that the lights were on approach to Leeds Bradford Airport.

A conversation the following day with a family friend revealed that he had also seen the strange lights at around the same time from his home in Castleford, this gentleman declined to give an interview.

Following my leads I telephoned Leeds Bradford Airport, what follows are questions and answers discussed over the telephone.

Q. "I am researching a U.F.O. sighting in Garforth, Leeds on the 25th March 1994, have you any other report of this?"

A. "Apart from the one you are researching, no, sorry."

Q. "I understand that an aeroplane had just landed at around the sighting time, could you confirm this?"

A. "Yes, it was a D.C.9 from London and landed at 9.30 p.m."

Q. "I also understand that an aeroplane was due to land, can you confirm this also?"

A. "Yes, that was a 757 from Alacante and landed at 9.40 p.m."

Q. "Did the flight crew on these aircraft have anything to report?"

A. "Sorry, no."

Telephone conversation ended.

I also telephoned the R.A.F. Base at West Drayton, what follows is the telephone conversation.

Q. "I am researching a U.F.O. sighting in Leeds on the 25th March 1994, could I have your name please?"

A. Refused to give personal name but did say "We are A.I.S. Military."

Q. "Could I have your extension number for future reference?"

A. "Yes, it's Section 40"

Q. "Have you had any reports of this U.F.O. sighting or any reported sighting in the Leeds area on the 25th March 1994 at around 9.35 p.m.?"

A. "No."

Q. "Could this sighting have been military air traffic or experimental aircraft?"

A. "No idea, we don't research these reports, you will have to contact M.O.D."

Q. "Can you confirm that a NATO training exercise had taken place on the 25th March 1994?"

A. "Sorry, no, I can't confirm that."

Conversation ends.

One thing has left me puzzled about this conversation with the young lady at West Drayton Air Force Base, when I introduced myself and told her why I was calling she said, "Hang on while I get an Official Report Form". She then answered one of my questions, "We don't research these reports".

If no research into these sightings is done by the military, why would they need an Official Report Form!

Dear Section 40 :

I wish to thank you for your kind letter and informations dated 25 August 1993 regarding the wave of UFO sightings reported in the early hours of March 31, 1993.

I want to correspond to you by providing the firm conclusions of my research on this issue. These represents the scientific consensus among international aerospace centers all over the world.

On March 30, 1993 (12:00 Z hours) the Russian ELINT satellite Cosmos 2238 was launched. Goddard Space Flight Center's publication Spacewarn Bulletin, April 1993, reports that Cosmos 2238 rocket booster decayed on March 31, 1993 (Attachment 1).

NASA associated the fiery objects with the Cosmos 2238 rocket body reentry, which was predicted to fall at 01:20 Z plus/minus two hours. (Attachment 2).

NORAD provided the ground trace (Attachment 3). In addition to the predicted course, it included the actual position of the RB at 23:56 Z (on March 30) and its orbit, which was to cross a few minutes later over Ireland, Britain, France and the Mediterranean sea. They received a report of a visual sighting over British isles at 00:06:43 Z (on March 31). (Attachment 4). Apparently the decay took place one orbit before predicted time. The Cosmos 2238 orbital path was NW-SE crossing Wales, France and the Mediterranean sea. There were lots of "UFO" sightings over the southwest of Britain, at around 00:10 Z, as you know well, yet there were numerous sightings also all over France and the northeast of Spain at the interval 00:10-00:14 Z.

The three-country "wave" path correlate perfectly well with the Cosmos orbit. (Attachments 5 and 6). Qualitatively speaking, the descriptions of sightings fully match with this space debris reentry too.

The CNES (French NASA) released a formal announcement explaining the observations as the Cosmos 2238 Cyclone rocket decay (Attachment 7).

Le CNES étudie un phénomène de rentrée atmosphérique observé en France dans la nuit du 30 au 31 mars 1993

Le 31 mars 1993 au matin, le SEPRA (Service d'Expertise des Phénomènes de Rentrée Atmosphérique) du CNES à Toulouse était contacté par des dizaines de témoins (particuliers, brigades de Gendarmerie, aviation civile, observatoires) au sujet d'un phénomène aérospatial non identifié aperçu dans de nombreuses régions de France. Le SEPRA mettait aussitôt en place une enquête qui consistait à recueillir les données des témoignages et à en vérifier la corrélation. Les termes employés par les témoins étaient cohérents et permettaient de noter les dénominateurs communs des témoignages : observation vers 02 h 10 / 02 h 14 (heure française) d'un phénomène aérospatial traversant le ciel du Nord-Ouest au Sud-Est.

La description du phénomène par les témoins, l'heure d'observation et la durée de celle-ci (de l'ordre de 30 à 60 secondes environ), ont permis de constater qu'il s'agissait du même phénomène observé en différents lieux.

Le SEPRA, avec le support des services d'orbitegraphie du CNES, a procédé à des travaux de corrélation des observations recueillies avec la rentrée dans l'atmosphère du 3ème étage d'une fusée russe ayant mis en orbite le satellite d'observation COSMOS 2238. Ce lancement a eu lieu le 30 mars à 18 h 00 TU (20 h 00 heure française). Les données transmises au CNES, via la NASA, par l'organisation américaine NORAD ont permis de reconstituer la trajectoire du 3ème étage montrant le survol de la France le 31 mars entre 00 h 10 et 00 h 12 TU, soit 02 h 10 et 02 h 12 (heure française).

L'ensemble des éléments recueillis, coordonnés entre eux, montrent la relation de cause à effet entre les observations et la rentrée dans l'atmosphère du 3ème étage de la fusée russe.

Un cas similaire s'était produit le 5 novembre 1990 à l'occasion du lancement d'un satellite de télécommunications russe GORIZON 21.

Rappelons qu'en phase de rentrée dans l'atmosphère, un corps artificiel est soumis à un échauffement important (pouvant aller jusqu'à 4000°C en fonction de sa vitesse et de son poids) et génère des phénomènes lumineux.

Further to my telephone conversation with you today. I am writing to report an occurrence which was witnessed by both myself and my wife Section 40 [redacted] between 11 minutes to ten and ten minutes past ten approximately last night Mar 15th.

At about 11 minutes to ten last night my wife and myself were driving along the A414 road between Frampton Mansell and the Sapperton turning travelling in the direction of Cirencester on a journey from Minchinhampton to London. When we were about 600 yds from the Sapperton turning (to the west) we both saw at the same time through our car windscreen a white light descending in a curved trajectory at an apparently rapid rate of descent, it was in sight for about two seconds. I immediately took it to be a meteorite. However upon passing the bank of trees (see sketch map) that lie by the turning off to Sapperton we both saw moonlight in the field to our left and although there is a narrow verge neither ear or slope to stop my car I pulled onto the verge after about 100 yds, as this would correspond to the likely impact point of the white light

we had just previously seen. Upon stopping we both witnessed
to the field to our left at about 80-120 yds distance a triangular
white light close to some green lights which were rapidly
darting round but becoming stationary from time to time the
ground was being illuminated with a pinkish/purplish light
which appeared to be about 2 feet above the ground. I
got out of the car and my wife remained in the car and we
watched these lights for about four minutes. I also saw
green lights with conical beams illuminating the ground and
moving about erratically. As I was not safely parked and
there was some oncoming traffic approaching and felt there
might be hazard due to the peculiar colour of the lights
I decided not to attempt to approach I decided to do
a circuit and see if anything was visible from the other
Sapperton road which forks off the A.419 near Cirencester Park
and runs to the North of the A.419. - on six minutes I was
back at the spot and I saw the green conical beams intermittently
going on and off but did not deem it prudent to stop as
there was light traffic about. No one else had stopped but
unless they happened to be looking at the right place at
the right angle they could perhaps have assumed that it
was a farm machine working. I did yet a further
circuit but on the third occasion the lights ceased
as we drove up to the turning fork from Sapperton to A.419.
As an aircraft had been flying about a mile to the south
on the initial occasion I decided to report the matter
to Cirencester Police in case some kind of aircraft
equipment had fallen from it and we also had a
long journey to complete. I reported it to the officer on

duty who took my name on a pink form and said he would contact mobile units. This was at about 10.20 pm.

There was no sound and at no time did I think that an actual aircraft mishap had taken place. I did notice that some misty clouds had suddenly appeared over the new moon to the west and my wife said she saw a dark mist rising by the lights we saw.

I trust the above may be of use.

Ian's close encounter

THE sighting of a large frisbee-shaped
UFO at Craigluscar Reservoir is baffling
and intriguing experts.

Pictures taken of the object by Rosyth man
Ian Macpherson have been described as the
best to come out of Scotland.

And Dunfermline youngster Barry Smith
has also come forward to report the sighting
of a similar object from his house.

Several other incidents were reported in
the 48 hours around the sighting and are cur-
rently being probed by the Scottish Research
into UFO Group, which has been investigat-
ing the area for several years.

A keen amateur painter, Mr Macpherson
(43) had gone to the reservoir at about 3.15
pm last Saturday to take photographs of its
banks for a painting. On his way there he
saw the large object several hundred feet in
the air.

Mr Macpherson said that it had been in the
air for around 15 minutes and he did not
know why he had not taken a picture when it
was closer to him. However, he added, "If I
had not had that camera ready, with the cap
off and wound on, I would not have got any-
thing, because by the time I had done that it
would have been away."

While he had not had a particular interest
in the subject before the incident, he knew
right away that what he was seeing was not
an aircraft.

Mr Macpherson said he had not been look-
ing for any publicity from his sighting and
had been "disappointed" by what he
described as sensationalist treatment of the
incident by a national newspaper.

Barry Smith (14), of Woodmill Crescent,
told the Press he had been looking out of his
room window at about 7 pm two or three
days ago when he saw a similar object with
flashing lights.

He had been "really excited" and had
rushed downstairs to tell his parents, but by
the time his father had gone outside to look, it
had gone.

Nick Pope, of the secretariat that deals
with UFO sightings on behalf of the RAF,
said that a closer look would have to be taken
at Mr Macpherson's pictures, but initially no
obvious explanations sprung to mind.

Ron Halliday, who runs Scottish Earth
Mysteries in Stirling, said that there had been
a number of UFO sightings in the area over
the last five years, with reports dating back to
the 1960s. "There are certain spots where you
do get greater incidence of sightings. This is
continuing a bit of a trend."

A similar object had been seen in Edin-
burgh two years ago and since Mr Macpher-
son's sighting, a Glasgow woman had con-
tacted him to say that she had also seen one.

Malcolm Robinson, of Strange Phenomena
Investigations, said that the sighting was par-
ticularly interesting because of how close Mr
Macpherson had been to the object. And
he said that the photograph was the closest a
most detailed he had seen to come out of
Scotland.

There could only be speculation about
what the object had been, such as a se-
rious military aircraft, and he was not saying it
was something extra-terrestrial.

"What we are saying is that with
shadow of a doubt it is, to all intents and
poses, an unidentified flying object," he
said. "Sometimes when people hear the
word 'UFO', it conjures up fanciful imagery of
green men. It should not be like that."

There were numerous ways to fake
photographs, but he did not think
Macpherson's sighting was a hoax.

The picture will now be examined
closely with state-of-the-art
enhancement in Phoenix, Arizona.

MUSICIAN Stephen Sheering says he does not believe in flying saucers - but he claims to have had a close encounter with a triangle of mystery lights.

Mr Sheering, 36, says he was inexplicably drawn to Silbury Hill near Avebury. He says he was one of a group of about 30 people from all over the world who congregated at the top of the hill.

"None of us knew what we went there for, it was just a feeling that we had to go" said Mr Sheering of Penhill, Swindon.

"It's not easy to explain what we saw but a triangle of lights about 40 feet across glided silently past. It was truly unbelievable and I just don't know what it was except that it was an unidentified flying object."

He says the strange experience happened two years ago and the lights were also seen by people on the hill who came from France, Germany and even China.

Mr Sheering, who is married with a daughter, has been a keen UFO spotter for several years. After the Silbury sighting he contacted other UFO clubs throughout the country to see if there was an explanation for the lights.

LAST Thursday's sudden snowfall brought with it an unusual mystery!

So, is there anybody out there?

During 1991, the American pollsters, Roper, conducted interviews with 6,000 Americans. From their startling results, it is possible to conclude that as many as four million U.S. citizens may have had 'close encounters' of one kind or another with an unidentified flying object.

A close encounter, however, no longer means quite what it did when you and I last went to the movies. These days, simple tales of strange lights seen late at night on the distant horizon hardly raise an eyebrow. Even reports of actual spaceships are as unremarkable as Tory MPs in sex scandals. If you really want to gain the media's attention, it is not enough just to have seen a little green man from Mars ... you have to have been abducted by one.

Fortunately, the aliens themselves seem willing enough to comply with the need to inject a little sensationalism into their publicity. According to Jim Schnabel, author of a revealing new book*, they will not only whisk you aboard their craft, but tie you to a desk, subject you to surgical probing and introduce you to the former secretary general of the United Nations. Then they will return you to Earth, feeling slightly the worse for wear, but otherwise oblivious to the dramatic journey you have just made.

It may be weeks, or months later, before you are able to recall the full experience — and even then only if you happen to be lucky enough to come into contact with a trained alien abduction specialist.

Of these, however, there are now plenty — at least in the U.S. Just as in the Sixties it was *de rigueur* among Hollywood socialites to spend an hour a week on their psychoanalyst's couch, it is today, in certain circles, the height of fashion to be in ongoing hypnotherapy for post-alien encounter trauma. During these sessions, you simply lie back, relax your body, listen to the gentle murmurings of your cosmic counsellor and gradually the picture will come flooding back to you.

'Ah, yes ... they were grey ... and four foot tall ... with pointy heads ...' Under further questioning, if you can recall this much, you will almost certainly continue in future sessions to dredge up many more disturbing aspects of your space odyssey. You will remember being strapped to some kind of operating table. You will remember various insignia on the wall of the craft. Eventually, it seems, you will also remember having your private parts subjected to interstellar scrutiny.


But what can it all mean? Surely no one can really believe these are ambassadors from a distant universe attempting to make contact with humanity? Could it be that we are suffering from a widespread 20th-century outbreak of contagious mass hysteria? Or is there something altogether more sinister going on?

Expert opinion varies dramatically. Some scientists have dedicated their lives to the development of a rational explanation; others have declared themselves cautiously open-minded. Yet others are convinced that aliens have actually made contact — but that the world's governments are desperately trying to hush this up. Is this simply paranoia, or does some truth underlie the latest wave of disturbing stories from the UFO watchers?

For some, there is little doubt. John Keel, a mainstream journalist with an interest in weird phenomena, was one of the first investigators to encounter the freakier side of space aliens. In the mid-Sixties, he began to check out reports involving UFOs, power failures, and

a winged, half-human creature known as the Mothman. His attempts to interview witnesses, however, were impeded by a series of strange developments: his calls were interrupted by static or gibberish, and sometimes by people claiming to be aliens themselves.

Each time he came up with a theory to explain the reports, it would be immediately and mysteriously confirmed. Once, he noticed



that two people on his interview list had been born on September 6. Within days, he was inundated by 'contactees' also claiming to have been born on this date. It was almost as if something, or someone, was reading his mind — and playing games.

Eventually, he talked to people who claimed to have seen aliens or their ships. On one occasion, a woman who had been regressed under hypnosis introduced herself as an alien called Apol — and predicted the imminent deaths of Robert Kennedy, Marilyn Monroe and Martin Luther King.

Then there is the case of Dr X, a respected biological scientist living in the South of France. In the early morning of November 2, 1968, he woke to see strange pulsations of light emitted by a pair of large, bright, disc-shaped objects, silver above and sunset-red below, several miles away. As he stood, mesmerised, the two objects coalesced into one and moved towards him, bathing his house in an unearthly light. He shielded his eyes and after a few moments heard a bang and the craft vanished into an evanescent vapour. A wound on his left leg, incurred several days before, had, he realised, mysteriously healed.

In another case described by a psychology professor at the University of Connecticut, Kenneth Ring, a woman who had just discovered a tumour in her breast collapsed on her couch and experienced a strange kind of abduction. 'There was a bright, white light directly above me with four to seven thin, tall figures around me,' she recalled later. Sud-

denly she felt she was tumbling head over heels, hurtling towards Earth at unbelievable speed. Falling from the couch to the floor, she began to vomit relentlessly — and then found the lump in her breast had gone.


There are some who might think such tales are suspicious in themselves. And there are plenty who think the whole business of alien abduction is highly suspicious. They wonder why it only ever seems to happen to people with a particular type of psychological make-up? Why does it take a particular sort of hypnotherapist to bring the 'buried memory' to light? And why, rather like those who claim to have met the Loch Ness Monster or seen the 'green shoots of recovery', can the people who believe they have been abducted never quite manage to furnish a credible witness or provide any tangible evidence?

Naturally, the excitable and vociferous members of the 'international abduction club' have their own counter-arguments. They will tell you they are victims of a dark conspiracy between the space invaders themselves and certain high-ranking government officials.

Schnabel's own convictions waver. Immersed in his research, he sometimes believed that UFO abductions really were happening: at other times, that they were more likely to be triggered by outside influences, such as stress, a desire for attention or a hypnotic trance.

Either way, it seems, the ufologists still have a useful role to play. Some day, says Schnabel, their phenomena will become no more mysterious than thunderstorms, shooting stars or Saturn's rings.

Facing up to the paranormal

A NEW book by Jenny Randles, *The Unexplained: Great Mysteries of the 20th Century*, is published on Tuesday. Here, a Courier writer talks to the author about her views on the paranormal.

THERE ARE people who are receptive to the notion of the supernatural, and there are scientists—factions as distinct and disparate as Campbells and Macdonalds. Somewhere in between, a rare hybrid, is Jenny Randles. Her training as a science teacher clashed with an interest in the paranormal kindled by her grandmother's psychic abilities.

"When I tried to get my views across to scientists, who are supposed to be open-minded and constantly in search of new discoveries, they dismissed the whole thing," she says. "There was so much prejudice around 20 or 25 years ago. Happily, this is now beginning to change."

Jenny believes that the paranormal should be explored in search of some solutions. "We should be trying to turn it into the normal," she says.

Jenny's grandmother, who lived some distance away, would often arrive on the doorstep knowing that something was wrong in the family.

"Bill Waddington, who plays Percy Sugden in *Coronation Street*, has a similar gift," she says.



Jenny.

She also had a very dramatic and frightening premonition about the space shuttle disaster in 1986.

"Where premonitions are concerned, there seems to be a connection between people and events. When you find people who have had dreams of remote events, they appear to be getting a preview of their own reaction to the news which will come later. If you steep yourself in the news, premonitions will happen more often."

Jenny consolidated her early interest in the paranormal by collecting personal experiences from as many people as possible. In her new book, she presents a selection of paranormal events and experiences that have taken place this century. Some are well-known, like the mysteries of *Flannan*

which came to light in June last year. The case involved a young woman whose investigation into her recurring dreams convinced her that she had lived before. She even met her "children" from this previous life, and staggered them with her intimate knowledge of the family.

Will the questions that these stories raise ever be answered?

"Some of the things which are considered paranormal now will prove to be tomorrow's mundanities," says Jenny. "Others, like the *Bermuda Triangle*, are bound to be nonsense.

"Some phenomena are just misunderstood. Take UFOs, for instance. I think we have misinterpreted them. I think some UFOs are energies connected to geophysical processes in the earth itself and having links with earthquakes. By learning more about these phenomena, we might one day be able to prevent earthquakes.

"We must face up to the paranormal at some point—Russia, Japan and America take it much more seriously than we do. I believe that something which is shared by everyone has to be important.

"Future science is what the paranormal is all about. There is a lot of nonsense involved—that's the price we pay. But if it enables us occasionally to make progress, say in the field of

According to friends, he claimed to have seen a flying saucer land and take off in the back garden of his home in Los Angeles.

"I saw strange lights and objects in the sky," he said. "It was an experience I'll never forget."

In 1986, disc jockey **MIKE SMITH** jammed the BBC switchboard after telling listeners: "I've just seen a flying saucer."

Dozens rang in to say they had also seen a huge white light hovering over West London.

PRINCE CHARLES is reported to have held a secret garden party for UFO experts and enthusiasts. The party was attended by ex-Goon Michael Bentin and psychic spoon-bender Uri Geller.

Both Charles and his father Prince Philip are interested in the paranormal.

In 1982, Kinks pop star **RAY DAVIES** was relaxing with wife Nancy in an American hotel room when he suddenly felt like he was being grasped round the neck.

Ray said: "I could visualise the beings sitting around an imaginary table taking turns to speak to me. They showed me the world in a new light."

RACHEL Jones says aliens removed eggs from her womb during a painful operation on a spacecraft.

The pretty housewife has been unable to conceive and believes the infertility may be a result of the experiments.

Rachel, 30, says she has been whisked away by aliens THREE times. She was first taken on board a craft at the age of four and endured intimate medical examinations at the age of 14 and 24.

On one trip she was shown an image of a futuristic space city.


The Norfolk housewife, whose name we have changed to protect her identity, has suffered three miscarriages and has been unable to have a child.

It was through hypnosis last weekend that she discovered that her first encounter with aliens was when she was four.

Previously, her only recollection of UFOs was being followed by one at the age of 14.

Then, at the age of 24, she saw a white light outside her bedroom window. When she woke the next morning she found a painful hole in her navel which oozed clear liquid.

Rachel says that a large grey alien, wearing a skull cap and blue suit, operated on her in a darkly-lit

room. He had no facial features other than eyes and a nose like a bulldog.

"It was only after regression that I discovered what had happened," she said.

"They inserted a needle into my stomach like doctors do with pregnant women. I think they were taking eggs from my womb.

"It was frightening at first and I remember feeling I couldn't move. They were trying to keep me calm and let me know that they didn't want to hurt me. I don't think it is their

intention to harm but I felt I was being used as part of a biological experiment.

"Although I am very fertile, I have never been able to fully conceive a child."

Rachel, who has been married twice, was told she would be visited again in her 30s.

"I suppose it could be when I'm 34 - they've come every ten years. I'm not frightened at the prospect.

"What does annoy me is that the Government is trying to cover up the whole thing."

MARIA Ward was kidnapped from her bed by a gang of alien beings - then her body was violated in a sickening ordeal which left her bleeding and battered from harrowing injuries.

"I can remember having something done to me in my womb - I could feel something moving around inside me like a wriggling worm," said Maria, 33, fighting back tears.

"I felt so disgusted, guilty and ashamed - all the normal emotions of a rape victim."

Maria dared not tell her own doctor of her ordeal but went to her local hospital for treatment. Medical staff there were convinced that she had been raped and urged her to tell the police.

An official hospital report reveals that she suffered a catalogue of injuries. And later examination also showed that Maria had suffered bruising to her cervix.

"I knew I'd been violated. I was sore around my private parts and had a wound around my navel," said Maria.

"The doctors thought I had been raped because of the trauma and they said I had suffered damage to the walls of my cervix. They asked me if I wanted to see the rape crisis counsellor and said I should call the police.

"I just looked at them and said, 'You'll never catch who did this to me'."

Maria, who lives with her husband and teenage son near Dartford, Kent, is convinced her injuries were caused by aliens.

"My husband was away on business and I remember being woken by this intense light outside the bedroom window," she said.

"I got out of bed and looked at my alarm clock which was flashing at 3.17am. I panicked and ran on to the landing and the lights went out.

"Then suddenly this ray of light appeared on the wall and a voice started saying 'Follow the light'."

"I was overwhelmed and then remembering this sensation of being lifted up. I can remember looking down at my feet and seeing the tree in the garden and the rooftops.

"I was paralysed, I couldn't move - it was awful. My next recollection was of standing in a corridor and the sound of shuffling feet.

"Three little beings appeared in front of me. They looked like under-developed children and stood about three or four feet tall.

"They moved in unison and had big heads, no nose and a thin opening where a mouth would be. Their tan-coloured bodies were hairless and naked.



"That's why I'm speaking out - to show other victims they are not alone and that it doesn't mean an end to their lives."



They're getting closer to us all the time

UFO activity over Britain has gone "haywire" in the past month, say experts.
Ufologists recorded more than 70 sightings in January alone - the highest on official record.
And last year the Ministry of Defence received 258 reported sightings at its London UFO unit.
"I would say we're probably in line for the busiest year ever," said a spokesman for the British UFO Research Association.
"There are five hotspots in particular where things have been going crazy."
They are Lincolnshire, Yorkshire, Cheshire, Central Scotland and the north east of England.
In Bonnybridge, near Falkirk, there have been more than 200 reports of UFOs since November 1992.

The most recent sighting, last month, was captured on video by a businessman.
It is now being examined by Ministry of Defence experts.
Malcolm Robinson, of UFO group Strange Phenomena Investigations, said: "The film is very exciting and we're hoping the MoD can shed some light on it."
"A high proportion of sightings can be explained rationally but that still leaves a hell of a lot of genuine UFOs."
Investigator Tony Dodd, a former policeman, claims at least 60 personal sightings of UFOs in Britain and cites cases of Britons being abducted by aliens aboard spacecraft.

"Hundreds of men and women have told us of kidnap ordeals where they are experimented on by aliens."
"I'm talking about intelligent people like doctors, policemen, lawyers and nurses. This isn't pie in the sky."
●THE PEOPLE presented its dossier of alien abductions to the Ministry of Defence.
A spokesman said: "We get hundreds of letters from people who claim to have seen UFOs."
"There's a public relations function to give them a polite reply and we usually provide these individuals with the names and addresses of clubs they can join."
"During the Cold War we were called many times to intercept men from Murs but they turned out to be men from Moscow."

They showed me the end of the world – in the year 3600

PETER Gregory says he was whisked away on a flying saucer and shown "the end of the world" by beings from the 37th Century.

He claims pollution and natural disasters had left the earth covered in lifeless swamps, forcing mankind to live underground.

At his home on the Lincolnshire coast, where the 54-year-old writer says there have been more than 30 UFO sightings, Peter recalled the journey in April last year.

"I opened my eyes and appeared to be in the control room of an enormous flying machine.

"There was a loud humming, the place was bathed in light and it pulsed with a strange rhythm, beating in time with my own heart."

He believes he was transported from his home to the craft "in a huge whirlpool of colours".

"They flickered and danced in front of my eyes in a never-ending display of hues and patterns."

Once on board, his "hosts" appeared to be human – except for abnormally long fingers,

which had no nails. "I walked slowly towards them and tried to touch one of them – but my hand went straight through him," said Peter.

"The leader was a little taller than his companions – about 6ft and slender, with a bronzed complexion. His hair was shoulder-length and reddish-brown."

"He wore a small silver band around his forehead with two small lights on each side. His lips were tinged blue."

The three-man crew wore grey uniforms with high collars and three-quarter length sleeves.

An insignia, resembling the letter M or W was emblazoned on each man's breast pocket.

But Peter's astonishment soon turned to horror when he was shown the future of the world on a giant viewer screen.

"It showed a planet which is no longer inhabitable – air had

become unbreathable and pollution so great that man had been forced to live in an artificial underground world.

"The sun still shone but only through a thick blanket of pollution – the ozone layer had been destroyed and there was no protection from ultra-violet radiation."

"By the year 3600, where the UFO travellers came from, the only trace of man's occupation was rubble scattered across the surface."


This final vision seized Peter with panic but he now believes nothing can be done to avert the end of the world.

When he was returned home by the craft his heart was beating wildly and he had broken out in a cold sweat.

Peter accepts that many will scoff but insists it really happened.

"I've been called a crank and a liar but what I experienced was no dream or delusion."

"You can see the beginnings of it already – the spread of diseases like AIDS, global warming and a breakdown of law and order."

ICY MOMENT OF TERROR FOR JULIE

JULIE GREAVES says she was picking flowers with her two young children when she "looked up to see a huge orange-pink ball of light".

Her daughter suddenly screamed: "Mum, the Moon's coming towards us."

When she returned to her Merseyside home she discovered she had lost an hour of her life.

Months later under hypnosis she recalled being subjected to humiliating examinations by six alien clones.

"I have feelings of guilt, shame and disgust," says Julie, now 50.

There were six tall figures all looking identical in dark cover-alls up to their necks.

"Their hair was dark and their eyes were black and almond-shaped. I experienced a floating sensation."

"Next, I was on a table being examined and had a feeling of ice being put on my legs."

Clouding the UFO issue

ON NOVEMBER 1958 Dr and Mrs M. Moore were driving in their car through the deserts of Dakota when suddenly they looked up and noticed in the sky a "silvery, cigar-shaped object, like a giant windsock," which accelerated out of view leaving behind it a trail of strange purple clouds. Their sighting was reported to the Flying Saucer Review and like so many other similar accounts marked down as a highly promising incidence of a UFO.

Many similar sightings have even produced dramatic photographs of huge saucer or lens shaped objects in the sky. But they all look rather ghostly and suggest something less extraterrestrial to their origins. Later analyses showed they were in fact unusual clouds called lenticular clouds. These have an astonishing resemblance to a colossal flying saucer, often with circular rings around them and occasionally luminous if the sun is shining from behind.

Lenticular clouds come from mountains but are fairly unusual. Normally winds passing over mountains lose their strength and become weaker on the leeward side. But occasionally something strange happens — the air on the leeward side bounces up and down like a bob-

bing wave with nowhere to go. It's caused by air on top of the mountain pushing down on the bottom of the leeward side and "squashing" the air there. If the air is also moist, then every time the air bobs up a lenticular cloud is formed.

Apart from their shape they behave even more UFO-like because they often stay stationary as they rest on the lee-waves.

In fact, you can see them in Britain at places like the Pennines, where, with a strong westerly wind, as many as 10 bouncing lee-waves with lenticular clouds can form about five miles apart across Yorkshire, from the Pennines down to the coast. A fairly harmless encounter of a lenticular kind.

Bewitched, bothered but not bewildered...

STRANGE things are happening around Biddulph - but explanations for some of them could soon be at hand.

UFO sightings and a ghost on the moors are just two of the subjects a new group could be looking at. Mysteries surrounding the Saracens who came to the area at the time of the crusades will also intrigue local folk.

The recently established Green Dragon Mystery Society has attracted massive interest in the town and in neighbouring Congleton. It aims to look into paranormal and unexplained events of the past and present.

The group's name comes from the old name of the Swan Hotel, Leek, where it holds its regular meetings.

And the local area is a fertile source of mysteries for members to investigate.

One series of UFO sightings is being looked at by group organiser Doug Pickford. A Knapeney man's reports of strange objects in the sky have fascinated Mr Pickford so much he is chronicling them in a forthcoming book. He is coy about giving details of them, but told the Guardian: "I'm keeping an open mind on them. He certainly saw something."

Nobody's saying they came from outer space - there could be a natural explanation. North Staffordshire has not been short of such reports in the last few decades.

UFO investigator Jenny Randall, who spoke to the group's first meeting, says that one of the first cases of apparent contact with alien beings was reported in the district 30 years ago.

A girl was said to have hovered over a family's house as they dined under a table in it. Strange beings with long blond hair wearing silver jump suits were reported to have looked compassionately at the family through a window.

Many sightings were reported in the 1960s at the Newchapel observatory, just a few miles from Biddulph.

But perhaps the most bizarre case is a couple's recent claim to have been abducted from their



PEACEFUL... Biddulph Moor is quiet now but stories of paranormal happenings in the area abound. car in the moorland village of Pastures. They say they woke up two hours later to find themselves in Macclesfield.

Doug admits that 95 per cent of UFO reports have a rational explanation and the recent surge of phone calls by worried local to police when an airship flew over Moor Cop are proof of this.

Such events are not the only unexplained mysteries which could interest local folk. There are the centuries old claims that a ghost walks around Biddulph Moor.

Witnesses who claim to have seen it say it is a woman wearing a white dress, possibly a wedding dress.

Then there is the older legend dating from the 12th and 13th centuries about the Saracens brought back from the Crusades as servants to Biddulph Hall, where Biddulph Grange now stands.

They quickly mingled with the Biddulph Moor population, which afterwards spoke a different language from the rest of the area and had little contact with other local communities.

UFO spotters and those interested in the paranormal are often seen as cranks, but it's a view Doug says is misplaced.

He told the Guardian: "A lot of the people in our club are very, very educated people who are just interested in the fact that a lot of things are unexplained."

"People are just trying to find an explanation for them. I would say to people 'come along and see what we are about'."

The group's next meeting is at Swan Hotel at 7.30pm on April 5.

Richard's on trail of UFOs

THE account (right) is the one given by former city man Richard Millen of an unidentified object which he personally witnessed in the skies over Lincoln in 1980. And it was an experience which spurred on his already lively interest in UFOs.

Having moved to Newark in 1981, Richard — a representative of the Mansfield UFO group established in 1987 — to provide a focal point for people interested in UFOs and similar phenomena — has become the official UFO investigator for Newark and Lincoln. As such, he is interested in hearing from anyone locally who has experienced a UFO sighting, or who has captured an unexplained object on film or video.

"One of the first things that really caught my interest was when articles on Erich Von Daniken were serialised in the national newspapers. I think that sparked the interest of a lot of kids at that time," Richard told the Standard.

But international interest in UFOs and flying saucers has actually been growing steadily since the 1950s, both through the work of bona fide investigators

"IT WAS about 1am and I was driving down Yarborough Road when I saw what looked like a star, but it was moving.

"It was November 5, but I knew it was nothing to do with Bonfire Night. I turned into Long Leys Road and looked across to where it came from just behind St George's Hospital.

"It started off as a point of light and I wondered what it was, so I pulled the car up and watched it come nearer and nearer, becoming a row of lights that proceeded to circle. I watched it approach and then it continued to circle around. It was very cold but I watched it for about an hour and a half. In the end I just had to drive away.

"It may have had a terrestrial explanation but I just haven't a clue what it could be. I have thought it could have been a helicopter circling with a boom of lights, or a small plane, but there were no flashing lights and no normal navigation lights. There was a slight droning sound, but not the sound of a helicopter. And why a small plane would circle round for an hour and a half at 1am, I just can't imagine."


Said Richard: "Steven Spielberg did use UFO experts in making that film and a number of the characters were based on UFO research so that it would be as accurate as possible."

Spielberg is planning to release a film in 1997 about a famous incident which happened 50 years earlier in 1947 at a US air base in New Mexico. The base issued a press release — which appeared as a story in a local newspaper — about the discovery of a crashed saucer.

Said Richard: "Within two days, a counter-story was released to say the object was a weather balloon, which does beg the question: Is the American air force really so stupid as to mistake a weather balloon for a crashed flying saucer?"

There are also reports that distinguished director Oliver Stone may be



working on a film based on an incident in Suffolk in 1980 when a flying saucer allegedly landed but later took off again.

And implicit in many reports of UFO activity are stories of people being abducted — claims of "lost time" when people have no feeling of time having passed but cannot account for even several hours.

Phenomena

Said Richard: "It's something psychiatrists and psychologists have been sneering at for years but now are starting to take seriously. It may be in the mind or it may be a physical event — we really don't know — but it is a real thing which is happening to these people; they are experiencing this abduction syndrome."

The number of reports

of strange phenomena from this area has been small in recent times, mainly because of the lack of a focal point or investigator. Richard's job will be to collect and investigate any reports of unusual sightings, and be the first line of explanation for what often turn out to be natural phenomena.

"Obviously there is a possibility that people are lying. But mostly they are being truthful, and we have to see whether they are mistaking something mundane for something else," he said.

"The most common one is Venus which does show as a very bright light at times, and which may even appear to be pulsating or moving slightly. That can usually be identified if we know the time of day of the sighting.

"You also find people who have an interest in UFOs ignoring the more rational side of their character."

There have been a number of interesting sightings in the Mansfield and Nottingham area recently, including one over Radcliffe on Trent which was captured on video. That film is now being analysed at NASA.

But it is also part of Richard's job to remain **healthily sceptical**:

"Some people do more readily accept things. I would like to believe an extra-terrestrial hypothesis rather than one of the more mundane explanations, but I can't kid myself."

'They collected 100 rolls of film after 1,400 men saw flying bright object'

UFO expert Bob Boyd says he's got proof the Ministry of Defence know all about alien visits to earth.

Bob, from the Plymouth UFO Research Group, says he's been handed three photographs taken by the soldiers in Cyprus in 1971.

He claims the photos - of a mysterious hovering light - prove the MoD have evidence of UFO activity.

And he wants the Ministry to release it's flying saucer films and photos so UFO spotters can study them.

'Last year I did a radio broadcast and afterwards got a call from an ex-regimental sergeant major in the Royal Marines,' explained Bob, who claims to have seen UFOs over the South West several times.

'I met him and he showed me three pictures and told me the most amazing UFO story I've ever heard.'

Unexplainable

'He said 1,400 men saw an unexplainable bright light fly above them while on night manoeuvres in Cyprus more than 20 years ago.'

'The MoD collected more than 100 rolls of film after the sighting and the RSM personally sent a film taken by a naval photographer to Whitehall.'

'But before he sent it he got prints made - they lay in a drawer for 20 years until he gave them to me.'

'I think the Cyprus pictures are indisputably authentic - I've interviewed hundreds of people and believe the man was telling the truth.'

'The MoD must have lots of photos and film of UFOs dating right back to the 50s,' he said.

'Lots of times a sighting was followed by jets going up to investigate - they must have shot film.'

'I think the MoD have more proof but for their own reasons won't release it - maybe because the British Government is not the most open of governments.'

'But I would like them to show us the films and evidence they've got - we still won't know what the objects are but it would be amazing to study them.'

Interested

'I don't think the MoD knows what these objects are either but they've treated them in the right way by nullifying reports,' he added.

'And the MoD have changed their attitude towards UFO groups during the past two years.'

'They used to say they were only interested in things which affected national security - and UFOs don't. But now they've set up a UFO desk and say they accept them as unexplainable objects.'

'While UFOs are the most mysterious of objects we are only interested in hard facts,' he stressed. 'We don't call them aliens they are photographic phenomenon - nothing more.'

MoD spokesman Squadron Leader Tony Cowan said: 'I'm unaware of any evidence which proves extra terrestrials have visited the earth.'

'Of course we are interested in this subject and will listen to what the UFO groups have to say.'

'I look forward to the day when one of these people comes to my office and has a chat.'







UFO 'explosion' captured on video

The latest UFO sighting in the Ashbourne area has been reported — and this time there is video evidence to back up the claim.

The four witnesses, who do not want to be named for fear of ridicule, spotted the mystery object while walking in the town's recreation ground on a recent Sunday afternoon.

They had a camcorder with them and managed to shoot several minutes of footage of the bright light in the sky towards Derby.

At one point the sinister single light, which remained stationary for most of the time, explodes like a firework but then returns to its original shape.

Footage of a recent UFO filmed by three fishermen was dismissed by experts as the iris of the camera.

But the exploding effect of this recent Ashbourne sighting was also witnessed by the three people not looking through the camera's viewfinder.

The UFO spotters, who were badly shaken

by their experience, are currently having their camera checked.

During the five minutes of film a plane comes into view and the light clearly follows it but then shoots off quickly out of sight.

UFO experts at the Ministry of Defence in Whitehall say that 95 per cent of sightings can be explained in terms of known objects or phenomena — but the remaining five per cent do defy explanation.

Last year 147 sightings of mysterious objects were reported to the MoD.

UFO sighted by schoolboy

UFOLOGISTS have long considered the Chingford and Epping areas prime locations for mysterious sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects.

Now the Barking-based London UFO Studies group is investigating the latest report of a saucer-shaped object over the area.

It was seen by Walthamstow schoolboy Stuart Halliday of Camner Road at about 11.30pm on Thursday February 17.

"I was just about to go to bed when I noticed a dome-shaped object with bright orange or red lights underneath," said Stuart, 14, a fourth year student at Aveling Park School.

"At first I thought it was a shooting star but it appeared to be very near to my house, perhaps over Kitchener Road — about 400 yards away and 300 feet in the air.

"I'd never seen anything like that in my life and it hung there for about three minutes before moving off very fast.

Dome shaped

"It was totally silent and had bright lights coming from the edges. It was dark and dome shaped."

The incident is being investigated by Roy Lake, founder of London UFO Studies, who is calling on anyone else who saw the object to contact him.

Roy says the area close to Epping Forest has a long history of sightings and research into paranormal activity.

Cynics might suggest that the area is close to both Stansted, Stapleford Abbots and North Weald airports plus a police helicopter site at High Beach which could account for aerial activity.

But Roy is unbothered by that and says that in particular the Pole Hill and Barn Hill areas are known for paranormal activity because of a Ley Line crossing through there.

"Since the 60s when I became interested in paranormal phenomena — some pretty strange things have occurred up there," said Roy.

"Two children were found drowned in a pond off Barn Hill and the area was immediately cordoned off by the Army, for no apparent reason."

M5 'magnet' for UFOs?

COULD it be the local section of the M5 is attracting visitors from outer space?

Sue Hembury-Kellow, director of investigations of the local UFO organisation, is beginning to think this may be the case for several sightings recently reported to her have been close to or along the route of the motorway.

A previous UFO sighting in West Buckland was also reported in October. This time the object, spotted at 5.30am, was described as oblong, covered in red, blue, green and yellow

lights. "It sped away so fast, you couldn't compare it with any known aircraft," claimed the witness.

Other sightings include a silvery disc-shaped UFO at Bradford on Tone, and several sightings at Trull, near Taunton.

Mrs Hembury-Kellow is keen to hear from anyone who may have seen anything unusual. "The majority of sightings have quite ordinary explanations, such as weather balloons, aircraft, etc.

"But there are still a certain percentage that we just can't explain," she said.

Late one night in 1989, an Italian-American housewife was taken on a blue beam from her bedroom into a spacecraft parked above her apartment on the Lower East Side. Once inside, small grey aliens gave her a gynaecological examination—as they often do with kidnapped earthwomen—before sending her back to bed and relaxing their mind-control. This seizure was witnessed by CIA agents and the VIP they guarded that night: UN Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar. Other observers thought that Perez de Cuellar was himself abducted.

Who believes this stuff? Well, the chief characters in Jim Schnabel's 'Dark White: aliens, abductions and the UFO obsession' (Hamish Hamilton, £16.99)—source for the above, fairly typical yarn—include a

respected abstract painter, a Harvard psychiatrist and prize-winning biographer, a bestselling novelist and some highly qualified therapists with "abductee" clients.

According to a recent poll, up to 15 million Americans claim memories of UFO abduction.

Faced with one of the most virulent of contemporary cults, Schnabel has kept his cool and produced a wonderful slice of urban anthropology. His first book, on crop-circle watchers ("Round In Circles"), covered a small, fresh field; here he has a half-century of Astounding Stories to study. The modern UFO wave began with the cold war. In 1946

With an admirably straight face, Schnabel traces the long row between nuts and bolts

and "psychosocialists". The former believe in real spaceships, period. The latter range from out-and-out debunkers to New

Age mystics, who see tales of alien kidnap as an allegorical quest for esoteric wisdom. He

finds strong geophysical evidence to account for mass UFO sightings (luminescence from tectonic shifts, it seems). He explores the

More and more people claim to have been abducted in spaceships. What lies behind it?

Readers of this paper probably do not routinely read *The People*. So they would have missed an extraordinary recent story about seven people who claimed to have been abducted from their homes by aliens, taken on board spaceships, and then subjected to a series of humiliating sexual assaults.

These stories are new to this country, but are common in the United States. According to journalist Jim Schnabel, whose fascinating book *Dark White: Aliens, Abductees and the UFO Obsession* has just been published here by Hamish Hamilton, the first case surfaced in the 1960s. Since then the topic has become a craze, with numerous journals and conventions devoted to these UFO abductees, as well as support groups for the alleged victims, known as UFO abductees.

The stories are so bizarre that the instinctive reaction is to dismiss them as the delusions of individuals suffering from severe mental illness. However, the "victims" are not usually mentally ill in the sense of suffering from a psychotic illness, nor are they drug or alcohol abusers. A recent paper in the prestigious *Journal of Abnormal Psychology* describes them as "solid representatives of the American middle class".

Most of those claiming to have been abducted by aliens say the experience began during sleep, and was associated with extreme emotional states. The victim may recall vivid, unexpected and frightening internal sensations, such as terror, visual hallucinations, choking sensations and other abnormal sensations affecting many parts of the body.


Neuropsychologists have suggested that their experiences may be related to brief episodes of epileptic activity in the temporal lobe of the

Sexual Fantasy and Science Fiction

brain, also implicated in the genesis of complex hallucinations such as religious visions. Others have been linked to sleep-related disturbances such as sleep paralysis. This not uncommon phenomenon occurs in people either when going to sleep or on waking, and causes muscle paralysis and frightening sensations such as choking.

These mechanisms may be sufficient to account for the abnormal sensations that herald a UFO experience, but do not account for the fully formed stories of being transported to alien spacecraft. To understand those one needs to consider the victim's background and pre-existing beliefs.

He or she probably also suffers from what are known as dissociative disorders, in which the normal integration of thought, feelings and experience into memory and consciousness is interrupted. A person's ability to dissociate is determined by



experimentation including being operated on by aliens who frequently remove eggs from the subject's womb or inseminate them.

The final thread is found in the background beliefs and culture of the subject. The study carried in the current *Journal of Abnormal Psychology* reported that those with the most intense UFO experiences shared a similar range of pre-existing beliefs. Those ranged from the only mildly unusual, such as telepathy or astrology, to the more bizarre, such as channeling or spontaneous combustion. Also shared was a conspiratorial view of the world. Those active in the UFO movement overlap with those who spend their time deriving elaborate conspiracy theories of the Kennedy assassination.

If these otherwise incomprehensible stories can be understood only by bringing together the sufferers' internal and external worlds, people who become convinced that they have been abducted by aliens are those who already believe in the paranormal in general and UFOs/aliens in particular. They then experience vivid, terrifying experiences such as occur in sleep and dreams. Perhaps because of previous trauma, they also have the capacity for intense introspection, which may lead to gaps in their memories. These sensory experiences and subsequent memory gaps are then elaborated, sometimes under hypnosis. The consequence is the mixture of sexual fantasy and science fiction that constitutes their final belief.

THE 16-year-old mystery of an unidentified flying object over Nomansland Common has been solved.

The UFO seen by 21-year-old Martin Tominey from Sandridge Road, St Albans, and his friend, Steve Bleich, then 25, from Welwyn Garden City, was a flying saucer.

The story, complete with pictures of the saucer taken by Martin, made the front page of the Herts Advertiser and was also carried by several national newspapers.

But the flying saucer did not come from outer space - it was just part of the research project aeronautical engineer Colin Rogers was working on at the time.

The flying saucer used some of the technology which has since helped the Americans develop their "stealth" fighters and bombers.

Mr Rogers, who took early retirement two years ago, went on to build a much larger version of the saucer in conjunction with a Belgian company and now he is hoping he will be able to construct a man-carrying version.

He said: "At the time of the UFO story I could not say anything because the project was secret and I should not have been flying it at Nomansland."

HUNDREDS of People readers jammed the switchboards of Britain's UFO experts last week eager to share their out-of-this-world experiences. Many found the courage to come forward for the first time after our special investigation. Here are some of their incredible stories...

ENGINEER Graham Holland says he was "mentally raped" by aliens who probed his mind.

They performed intimate experiments on his body and delved into his past.

People reader Graham's horrific experiences started in the summer of 1991 when he was engulfed in green mist as he worked on the dockside at Dover Harbour. "I looked out to sea and saw a green mist rolling in," said Graham, 47, of Wellington, Somerset.

"I had a terrifying feeling of being mentally raped and was reduced to tears.

"I felt drained, like my life and all my knowledge was being probed. It was the most terrible experience I have ever had."

"They in turn passed on information to me about their civilisation. After the encounter I didn't eat for seven days. I was terrified."

Graham has since been visited by other aliens who, he claims, performed experiments on him.

"I woke up one night and found myself on an operating table in a surgery with three or four beings about 3ft tall probing me."

"They used pen-like devices to check my hair, skin and internal organs. The small beings were being ordered around by two, larger human-like creatures about 6ft tall."

"At first these people terrified me because I didn't know their intentions, but now I know them to be benevolent."

Graham believes the beings are not from another planet, but from another dimension.

THREE anglers captured a bright yellow UFO on video while fishing near their Norfolk homes last October.

"I saw it a long way off and made a joke that it might be a UFO," said Stephen Farra, 31. "It came overhead, right above us, then disappeared into the distance."

Investigator Philip Mantle of the British UFO Research Association is now studying the footage. He said: "There's no suggestion of a hoax."

Spotlight turns on the 'saucers'

UFO experts reckon reports of a 'flying saucer' above Frodsham and Runcorn are more than a flight of fancy.

There have been a spate of sightings of a strange cigar-shaped craft over the past few weeks.

Members of the British UFO Research Association are taking them seriously and are now carrying out an in-depth investigation.

Latest to report a sighting is 74-year-old former lorry driver Mr Tom Wade, who lives in Clifton Drive at Frodsham.

Weelchair-bound Mr Wade saw the UFO out of an upstairs window at 9.30pm at night and it has left him baffled.

'At first I thought the moon was very bright. I pulled the curtains apart and realised it was not the moon but an object with lights along the side.

Added Mr Wade: 'It was not an aircraft or a helicopter. The way it moved was completely different.

'I've always thought there might be something in UFO reports. After seeing this I believe they do exist.'

Mr Wade as part of inquiries into over 70 recent eye-witness accounts of UFO sightings.

Said association spokesman Philip Mantle: 'Strangely we have had an awful lot of similar reports from the Wirral and Chester area and also from over on the East Coast around Scarborough.

'They've all come over about six weeks and a lot of them are of a very similar nature.

'At the moment we have not been able to come up with an explanation and that means we're keeping an open mind about it.

'Plenty of people will have seen the film *Close Encounters of the Third Kind* and I have no doubt personally there are craft from another world.'

It looks simple, really. If tachyons exist, so does the reality of time travel. But many eminent scientists have dismissed such ideas as nonsense, claiming that time travel goes against all the laws of physics and that we are trapped in the present, whether we like it or not.

Then, in 1991, Dr Amos Ori of the California Institute of Technology suggested that quantum effects might make it possible to "tunnel" through space near a black hole and emerge in another region of space and time.

This idea was also dismissed by other scientists on the grounds that anything approaching the immense gravity of a black hole would be warped out of existence.

Ori's calculations, however, show that this is not necessarily true. He says that an object can approach the boundary - or horizon - of a black hole as closely as it likes without being destroyed.

This theory has also been advanced by other scientists, who maintain that under conditions a black hole's massive gravity might be used to accelerate a spacecraft to fantastic speeds and catapult it on a journey to the stars, but Ori has taken the idea a step further.

His theory is that a space traveller might be able to use the loops of warped space-time that girdle a black hole's boundary to hurt himself back into the past.

The notion has sent a fresh ripple of interest through the world of physics, and opened the gateway to what could be the ultimate scientific adventure.

Exciting though it may be, though, the prospect of time travel presents some major problems. If you communicate with the past, you must in some way change the present - and in the altered present, you never communicated with the past.

To put it simply, if you kill your grandfather before he has any children, you wouldn't exist - so how do you kill him in the first place?

The complex laws of quantum physics provide a possible answer to this one. Quantum theory allows a particle, such as an electron, to tunnel through an energy barrier such as that surrounding a black hole. In theory, it then enters a different region of space and time - another universe.

So, if we do crack the secrets of time travel, we won't be going back and forth in our own universe, but whatever we do may affect the history of another time, but not ours.

UFO fever returns

STRANGE lights over Scarborough and unexplained objects in the skies above Pickering in the last week have once again brought UFO fever to North Yorkshire.

These recent sightings are only the latest in a long history of reports of Unidentified Flying Objects in the area.

In 1984, a York taxi driver claimed to have seen a flame-coloured Zeppelin-like alien craft set fire to the Minster.


In 1986, York City FC had a close encounter of the sporting kind when their team bus was apparently buzzed by a UFO. It was said to be a strange round object, flying at speed, which none of the team could identify - although cynics might suggest it was a football.

In 1988, a "large pumpkin object with several cocktail sticks coming out of it" appeared over York.

And in 1992, a York man photographed a Polo mint-shaped object in the sky over Foxwood.

In fact North Yorkshire is top for UFO sightings, accounting for more than half the national total in the last decade.

But why do these extra-terrestrials choose Yorkshire. Is it the beautiful countryside or the clear air - or are they planning an invasion?

Visitors from outer space, take heart

All down the ages people have seen strange things in the sky. And in this age of communication, says **BILL BECKETT**, the good reporter duly writes it all down ... even if it means choking on your mirth, because some of it just might be true

Phew, what a saucer

OCCASIONALLY it is the lot of the reporter to pick up the phone and be told that the caller has seen a strange object in the sky.

Most treat this with worldly-wise cynicism, but write about it because it is good for a laugh and, no matter how deep-rooted that cynicism, unidentified flying objects are fascinating simply because that is precisely what they are.

Therefore we should take seriously the efforts of Stephen Sheering of Penhill, Swindon, to form a group of UFO spotters in the town after being drawn, along with a number of other similarly attracted people from all parts of the globe, to Silbury Hill near Avebury to witness something odd in the sky.

Generally it was my attitude to deal with UFO callers by telling them two words, the first beginning with 'O' and the second with 'F' and inviting him or her to form them into a well-known phrase or saying.

Not any more.

A few years ago when I lived in North Devon I was on my way, I repeat, ON MY WAY, to the pub when I was conscious of something in the sky, totally silent but giving off a red glow.

When I stopped, the thing stopped. I walked on and the thing followed, disappearing only as I approached the village.

I phoned the police and the Ministry of Defence, but neither could explain what I

had seen - though both asked: "Have you been drinking, sir?"

For days afterwards I scanned the night sky, but never saw the thing again.

Obviously there had to be rational explanation, but no one has yet given me one.

Wiltshire, of course, is a UFO spotters paradise.

Back in the 1960s thousands flocked to the hills around Warminster to gawp at the strange sky sightings of objects allegedly from outer space.

Witnesses reported UFOs like red hot

pokers or huge cat's eyes that crackled and buzzed.

One woman said: "I went to the bedroom window and saw this brilliant object quite low in the sky. It was travelling very slowly. It went for half an hour."

She said the noise was like a refrigerator; she was shaking like a leaf and couldn't take her eyes off it.

Dr Cleary Baker, evaluation officer of the British Unidentified Flying Objects Research Association, said at the time that what the woman saw was a manifestation

of an advanced technology from somewhere and the craft, if that is what they were, were piloted by alien beings.

So put that in your pipe and smoke it.

Throughout the Sixties strange things were spotted in the skies of Wiltshire, and all over the place people reported sightings.

The phenomena moved journalist Arthur Shuttleworth, then editor of The Warminster Times, to write a book about it. Make what you will of what follows, but he met a bloke called Karne who he said was a passenger in a flying saucer.

The scribe also recorded the details of a man who was reduced in size so that he could get into a soup-dish-sized spaceship.

Some may think that Mr Shuttleworth, ex-Guardsman and pillar of society, was just a cynical old hack who saw an opportunity to make a couple of bob out of an intriguing tale (I know of others, like a mate of mine who, whenever in need of extra beer money, suddenly discovers the Beast of Exmoor walking down Minehead High Street).

Perhaps Arthur was as I have suggested; if so, he disguised it well.

After all, there were loads of people with letters after their names who were as convinced as he that visitations from other parts of the universe were a fairly common occurrence.

So it has gone on, and I would lay money on people ringing this newspaper in the next few days with reported sightings, and everyone will start believing that the skies are swash with little green men spying on planet Earth.

There will be millions of others who think they are nuts.

In spite of my own rather unnerving experience, I tend to side with the doubters.

I find it hard to accept that people have been abducted and spirited off to Outer Space by the aliens, though some alleged

victims produce pretty convincing tales of their experience.

Naturally most of the alleged abductions take place in the United States, perhaps the most easily-taken-in society ever to populate the Earth.


I recall talking last summer to two citizens of Los Angeles (where else?) who had popped over to Wiltshire to try to solve the mystery of the corn circles.

They cut symbols in long grass depicting a man, a house and love at Hackpen Hill.

Two days later they found a corn circle at West Kennet that looked like a "disabled toilet" sign, and claimed that was the response from outer space that they had been waiting for.

They phoned to tell me, and I had great difficulty in keeping a straight face.

Lights in sky

BEAM me up, Scottie, or just an earth-moving experience? Episode two of the mysterious UFO-type light sightings around the valley...

J C Kilner, of Choppards, Holmfirth, says he is not the sort of person to have hallucinations and he has never seen strange lights in the sky before, here or anywhere else.

But at 5.05am last Tuesday morning he was going to the bathroom, the window of which faces on to his long lawn.

"About 100 yards from the house I saw a circular patch of quite bright lights.

"They were well-defined, about 20 yards in diameter and stationary for about four or five seconds. It was dark and their effect was like a beam of light, a lot brighter than a torch, down onto the stretch of ground. I couldn't have been dreaming.

"I didn't hear a helicopter, as I would have done if it was that close and it wasn't a plane because the lights weren't moving.

Mr Kilner put it down to being one of life's odd experiences until he saw last week's report in The Express concerning UFO-type lights in the Holmfirth area.

Holmfirth police's Insp Terry Jepson verified that various reports on bright lights over the moors had been made over the years. But he could only speculate on the mystery.

According to him, in the past bright lights spotted over the moor were mostly found to be the landing lights of planes going into or out of Manchester airport.

He said it had also been known for laser beams used in shows to bounce off heavy cloud layers and be visible in areas other than the locality of the event — but this generally happened over the Christmas period.

Inspector Jepson said: "We have been looking for years for these mysterious UFOs which have allegedly appeared in the Holme Valley. But we still haven't found anything."

Baffled defence chiefs are also studying the film.

An RAF spokesman said: "We are examining this very closely..."

Ian, 44, from Rosyth,

By TOM HAMILTON

took the pictures as he walked along the banks of the reservoir. He said: "I took photographs as I walked along the bank and I became aware of a kind of humming noise. Then I saw it."

"I was holding my camera but felt unable to use it. I have never experienced such a feeling before."

Ian reckons he was looking at the craft for around 15 minutes. He said: "It was definitely metallic and had several points of diffused light on its underside inside a darker, coloured rim."

"As the craft began to move away, I raised my camera and took two photos."

"The craft's acceleration was phenomenal. By the time I wound the film on it was a dot in the sky."

When he returned home he contacted the Daily Record and we developed his film.

Ian then got out his sketch pad and produced drawings of what he had seen - before we showed him the photos. The drawings show the UFO.

The RAF say there were no aircraft movements in

the area at the time when Ian took the pictures.


We showed Ian's pictures to Malcolm Robinson, of Strange Phenomena Investigations.

He said: "These pictures are really remarkable. I have never seen anything like them in this country before."

The Ministry of Defence have also been given a set of Ian's photographs.

RAF spokesman Nick Pope said: "Our initial examination shows no obvious explanation."

They'll be using specialist staff and equipment to probe them more closely





They showed me the end of the world – in the year 3600

PETER Gregory says he was whisked away on a flying saucer and shown "the end of the world" by beings from the 37th Century.

He claims pollution and natural disasters had left the earth covered in lifeless swamps, forcing mankind to live underground.

At his home on the Lincolnshire coast, where the 54-year-old writer says there have been more than 30 UFO sightings, Peter recalled the journey in April last year.

"I opened my eyes and appeared to be in the control room of an enormous flying machine.

"There was a loud humming, the place was bathed in light and it pulsed with a strange rhythm, beating in time with my own heart."

He believes he was transported from his home to the craft "in a huge whirlpool of colours".

"They flickered and danced in front of my eyes in a never-ending display of hues and patterns."

Once on board, his "hosts" appeared to be human – except for abnormally long fingers,

PETER'S STORY

which had no nails. "I walked slowly towards them and tried to touch one of them – but my hand went straight through him," said Peter.

"The leader was a little taller than his companions – about 6ft and slender, with a bronzed complexion. His hair was shoulder-length and reddish-brown."

"He wore a small silver band around his forehead with two small lights on each side. His lips were tinged blue."

The three-man crew wore grey uniforms with high collars and three-quarter length sleeves.

An insignia, resembling the letter M or W was emblazoned on each man's breast pocket.

But Peter's astonishment soon turned to horror when he was shown the future of the world on a giant viewer screen.

"It showed a planet which is no longer inhabitable – air had

become unbreathable and pollution so great that man had been forced to live in an artificial underground world.

"The sun still shone but only through a thick blanket of pollution – the ozone layer had been destroyed and there was no protection from ultra-violet radiation."

"By the year 3600, where the UFO travellers came from, the only trace of man's occupation was rubble scattered across the surface."

This final vision seized Peter with panic but he now believes nothing can be done to avert the end of the world.

When he was returned home by the craft his heart was beating wildly and he had broken out in a cold sweat.

Peter accepts that many will scoff but insists it really happened.

"I've been called a crank and a liar but what I experienced was no dream or delusion."

"You can see the beginnings of it already – the spread of diseases like AIDS, global warming and a breakdown of law and order."

JULIE GREAVES says she was picking flowers with her two young children when she "looked up to see a huge orange-pink ball of light".

Her daughter suddenly screamed: "Mum, the Moon's coming towards us."

When she returned to her Merseyside home she discovered she had lost an hour of her life.

Months later under hypnosis she recalled being subjected to humiliating examinations by six alien clones.

"I have feelings of guilt, shame and disgust," says Julie, now 50.

There were six tall figures all looking identical in dark coveralls up to their necks.

"Their hair was dark and their eyes were black and almond-shaped. I experienced a floating sensation."





Dear Sir,

Having just discovered you in the Mail on Sunday, I would like to take this opportunity of reporting what I would consider to be a sighting under the heading of U. F. O.'s. I am 74 years old and still with keen long sight, and to underline what I am going to say, would like to mention that I served 4 years in the Royal Air Force and then 10 years in the Royal Observer Corps. At that time I attained a high proficiency in aircraft recognition, and have continued that interest ever since, so it adds up to 50 years of sky watching. On Sunday Jan. 2nd 94, I saw, for the first time, objects in the sky which did not fit in to any category of aircraft I have known.

REPORT ON UNIDENTIFIED OBJECTS (SIGHTING) SERVED OVER ME 2.1.94.

As between 10 and 11 am on Sunday 2nd Jan. 94, I was standing in Oakland Park, Bessish. Weather was good, with a clear sky and scattered high cloud. At the time stated I heard a light plane overhead, but on looking up, it had disappeared and its sound faded. But at that moment my attention immediately focused on 3 white objects at 12 o'clock. Please note that the colour white and not silver, so there was no refraction or reflection of light, thus giving a fairly sharp definition.

The 3 objects, shaped like elongated ovals with tapered ends, were in a shallow V formation, widely spaced, on a straight course West to East, at about 20 to 25,000 ft. East speed 700 mph. There were no wings or tailplanes to be seen, neither significantly was there any sound whatever. There were no contrails. I kept them under constant scrutiny for 10 to 15 seconds, until they vanished.

towards the horizon in high cloud. Their course, height, formation, and speed, were maintained during this time.

In my opinion, we can at once discount Met. balloons, satellites, missiles, etc or any natural phenomena. Aircraft produce a sound, even at this height, which is audible at ground level. (2 weeks later, I watched and identified a Boeing 737 at 25,000ft by its configuration. I also heard the sound and saw the contrail) .


I think that the three important points of the sighting were:

1. The sighting was on a Sunday, when military aircraft do not usually fly.
2. There was no sound. (3 jet fighters together would undoubtedly have been heard).
3. The apparent lack of wings or tailplanes as in a conventional aircraft.

We do appear to have a genuine mystery, and I think that based on my long experience in this subject, you will be able to credit me with an accurate report. As I have stated already, this was the first time in my observing experience, that I was not able to account for what I was looking at in the sky. Apart from aircraft identification, I have also read all the available information on U.F.O.s over the years, at the same time, keeping an open mind on the subject.

I would be most interested to receive any comments which you may wish to make on this.






Thank you for your reply of the 9th and for giving me the official version of the Capt Schaffner case. My own knowledge of it was limited to the series of articles published recently in the BUFORA magazine (editor, Section 40). It just seemed that the date of the incident roughly corresponded to the time when, in my mind, the RAF ceased trying to intercept high-performance UFOs.

Your letter is more revealing by its omissions rather than its actual contents. In fact, the style of all your letters is very familiar to me. I signed the Official Secrets Act forty years ago and, with regards to some classified matters, I have to assume I'm still gagged by it.

We must bear in mind that my reason for writing to you on this matter was not to extract confessions of a 'cover-up' but, rather, to offer the results of my prolonged and detailed study of the Close Encounter phenomenon for MoD's appraisal (though I believed, and still do, that there is little that I can teach your aerospace experts about that topic). The fact that you have not mentioned referral of my article to one of your technical branches speaks volumes. Either, it was an unintended omission, or, despite your confessed lack of understanding of its importance, you have decided that it has no importance, or, you know that there is little point in passing on information which is already in the possession of your technical and intelligence branches. Recognising that an answer to that allegation would present you with difficulties, I don't expect one. (Incidentally, the last paragraph of my paper 'Circles Within Circles' was not intended to be a criticism of MoD; instead, it was directed at those members of the Crop-Circle/UFO fraternity who persist in the folly of trying to squeeze confessions from those who are not free to make them).

For your further information: It took 13 years of spare-time study to arrive at the astronomical solution to the UFO CE phenomenon. Although, during the initial 6-year period, I had already analysed hundreds of British reports, a new data sample, selected from other sources, was created for the global study. That second sample consisted of 450 reports, chosen for their apparent authenticity and detail, which had been gathered from many places in the world. The timescale covered was 1865 to 1973. Only after another seven years of manual processing (and after following a number of false trails) was the astronomical link established.

Further years of development were then necessary to create the mathematical model which is now computerised. Since the creation of the model, something like 1000 additional CE reports have been processed through it. The degree of correlation has been far beyond expectations. When I say that something like a 90% 'hit' rate has become the norm, it has to be remembered that the cases processed have usually been subjected to investigation and deemed to meet the 'high-strangeness' criteria beforehand.

I think all this should answer your suspicion about the size of my data sample. As far as I am concerned, my curiosity of 27 years ago has been satisfied and the results of my labours of love have been far more conclusive than ever I could have hoped for at outset. The outcome amounts to scientific proof that the world's airspace is being constantly violated by advanced aerospace devices beyond present-day human achievement. I am now seeking to understand the motives behind the operations and the to identify, scientifically, the probable extraterrestrial source, or sources, from which they originate.

I have no interest in going on lecture tours or jumping up and down on television to create a stir. I'll continue to share my findings in a rational manner with anyone who wants to hear them and, perhaps, gradually I will be able to prepare people for the shocks to come. My work has already featured briefly on a number of serious TV programmes (one of those broadcast from California) and through contacts, lectures to specialist groups and videoed interviews, it is fast-becoming known within the UK, in the USA, Canada, Japan, Germany, Norway and Australia. (It is interesting that professional scientists shy away from it because, primarily, they realise that they would not be funded to do the necessary work to check out my model. However, I did manage to achieve a 'back-door' consultation with a member of Jodrell Bank's staff, who considered my method and agreed that it was, indeed, sound. He would not be able to check the work himself and knew of no-one within the entire Manchester University campus who would be able to devote the necessary time to it. It seems that Science has become just a pseudonym for Orthodoxy and a scramble for funding).

If MoD is not already aware of my findings then, I believe, in the interests of the nation, it should be. That's my reason for writing to you. It's now up to you and your MoD colleagues to take the next step if you require further information.

UFO watchers' Tuesday night sightings

MORE mysterious sights have been reported in the skies by local UFO watchers.

Psychic Peter Gregory, of Mablethorpe Skywatch, said that flashing lights were seen in the sky at Markby, near Alford, between 7 and 8pm last Tuesday night. "The witness has asked not to be identified for fear of embarrassment," she said.





INVESTIGATING unidentified flying objects is more than a hobby for Ripon man Mr John Holman — it is a life-long passion.

And now the 44-year-old, of Newton Gardens, is launching a group in this area to spread the word on extra terrestrials as well as investigate and record the phenomena.

He is setting up a local branch of SKYNET — the British network of UFO investigation and public information — and is inviting anyone with an interest in the subject to join.

There will be monthly meetings and the group is also asking for members of the public to submit UFO sightings so that local UFO activity can be investigated.

Mr Holman — who has been interested in UFOs since he was a teenager — is the UK co-ordinator for the Alien Acknowledgement Campaign's Right To Know project which began in America two years ago.

He is also heavily involved with the CSETI project which studies and analyses UFO activity worldwide.

Often a subject of ridicule, UFO spotting has long been the butt of many a joke, but through the local branch of SKYNET, Mr Holman hopes to give the subject the credibility it deserves and bring it to the public's attention.

"A lot of early science fiction portrayed alien life as hostile, and we have to turn this into a sensible way of looking at the subject," said Mr Holman.

He has studied the subject for many years and has collected videos of UFO sightings. Only last week, people in the Scarborough area reported something in the sky in their area.

"There is overwhelming abundant evidence for UFOs," said Mr Holman, who has a report of UFOs seen by the Belgian Air Force as well as documents from the EC on setting up a European centre for UFO research.

"And we are trying to build up a local database of UFO activity," he added.

Any local reports submitted to the new Yorkshire and Humberside branch of SKYNET will be dealt with according to the wishes of the witness and can be in confidence if requested.

MY personal opinion of that strange tribe known as "UFO spotters" is distinctly unfavourable. The motto of the committed searcher for unidentified flying objects must surely be that phrase from the 'Agricola' of Tacitus: "omne ignotum pro magnifico est." I was intrigued to come across a report in *New Scientist* for November 6, 1993, that researchers in the psychology department of Carleton University in Ottawa have

decided that people who report alien encounters are no less intelligent, no more prone to fantasy, and no more liable to mental disorders than those who claim agnosticism or antagonism.

Four groups of subjects underwent a battery of psychological tests and were also asked about their beliefs in UFOs and paranormal phenomena in general. One group had reported time delusions or contact with alien beings. A second group was content with reporting unexplained lights seen in the night without invoking a paranormal explanation. The other two groups claimed to have had no such experiences. The results did not support the hypothesis that reporting UFOs implies a psychological disturbance; nor were there significant differences in the fantasy lives of the different groups. However, people who credited UFOs showed a willingness to interpret frightening experiences in terms of close encounters with alien beings.

Some natural phenomena may persuade people that they have encountered aliens. For example, sleep paralysis, in which there is a feeling of being awake, feeling threatened by vague forces, but being unable to move, shows an incidence in the population at large of some 10 to 15 per cent.

reports of people being abducted keep enthusiasts fascinated.

Schoolteacher Elsie Oakensen had one of the most famous sightings in 1978. She was driving home from Daventry to Church Stowe when she spotted a huge flying saucer hovering above her car.

She said the car gradually lost power and she found herself sitting in total darkness.

There was a sudden flash of blinding light which scanned the car before the darkness lifted and she found herself 200 yards further forward than when she had stopped.

Eleven years after the event she was still sticking to her story convinced that she saw a spaceship

which examined and rejected her.

In 1989 UFOs were spotted three times in one week over the village of Moulton.

And four years ago householders from Wellingborough to Towcester thought they were watching a UFO invasion which turned out to be lights and patterns from a nearby Tina Turner concert.

ASSESSMENT OF UFO VIDEO (UK)

INTRODUCTION

1. (R). This report is in response to an ad hoc task requirement from DI55c1 to report on whether an object shown on a video supplied by DI55c shows a real object or whether it is a hoax.

DESCRIPTION

2. (R) The video tape has been thoroughly examined but it cannot be determined whether the object is a real object or a hoax. However, the following factors have been considered:

- a. The object appears almost stationary relative to the clouds while the video zooms in at approximately 6.4 times magnification. The apparent movement is probably camera shake.
 - b. No cable can be identified from the object to the ground nor between the house, the object and the trees.
 - c. Although the video extract lasts for 24 seconds and is followed by a non-related episode, neither the arrival nor the disappearance or the removal of the object is recorded.
 - d. The configuration of the object has some similarities with a drawing (Reference D) of a UFO produced by JARIC in 1992 from 35mm positives.
 - e. It is impossible to determine the size of the object.
- f. Using modern video studio equipment and techniques it would be relatively easy to compile a similar video.

(b). Possible explanations are:

- a. A kite.
- b. A montage.
- c. A studio construction.
- d. A UI
- e. An anti defence project (a less possible explanation).

4. (K). A fuller analysis might have been possible had the following information been provided:

- (a). Location including where photographer was standing.
- (b). Date and time of day.
- (c). Type of video camera, especially focal length used.
- (d). Who was the photographer and what was he doing?
- (e). Orientation of camera.

5. (K) **IA Comment.** While it cannot be determined whether this object is real or a hoax, it is possible that it is a hoax using either a kite or video studio effects. **(End of comment).**



At 12:10 p.m. on 10/18/91, an individual identifying himself as [REDACTED] telephonically contacted the Salt Lake City Division and spoke with the duty Agent, SA [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] identified himself as an employee of [REDACTED] Utah, telephone number [REDACTED], extension [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] advised SA [REDACTED] that while walking through the lobby of his place of employment on the morning of 10/18/91, he found the enclosed document lying on the lobby floor. [REDACTED] stated that he read the document and due to the nature of the contents thereof, decided to contact the FBI. During the early afternoon of 10/18/91, [REDACTED] delivered the enclosed document to the receptionist in the Salt Lake City Field Office.

Salt Lake City indices are negative on [REDACTED]. A review of public source records revealed the following information:



Based upon the contents of the document and the manner in which it was recovered, Salt Lake City initially dismissed the document and its classification markings as a hoax. In an effort to determine possible DOD interest in the unusual document, via referenced secure telcall on 10/25/91, SSA [REDACTED] was provided with a synopsis of the contents of the enclosed document, with a request for him to determine through his DOD contacts any DOD interest in "OPERATION MAJESTIC-12", U.S. AIR FORCE "PROJECT SIGN" or "PROJECT [REDACTED]".

NOTE: This document has been prepared for a preliminary briefing only. It should be regarded as introductory to a full operations briefing intended to follow.

OPERATION MAJESTIC-12 is a TOP SECRET Research and Development/Intelligence operation responsible directly and only to the President of the United States. Operations of the project are carried out under control of the Majestic-12 (Majic-12) Group which was established by special classified executive order of President Truman on 24 September, 1947, upon recommendation by Dr. Vannevar Bush and Secretary James Forrestal. (See Attachment "A".) Members of the Majestic-12 Group were designated as follows:

On 24 June, 1947, a civilian pilot flying over the Cascade Mountains in the State of Washington observed nine disc-shaped aircraft traveling in formation at a high rate of speed. Although this was not the first known sighting of such objects, it was the first to gain widespread attention in the public media. Hundreds of reports of sightings of similar objects followed. Many of these came from highly credible military and civilian sources. These reports led to independent efforts by several different elements of the military to ascertain the nature and purpose of these objects in the interests of national defense. A number of witnesses were interviewed and there were several unsuccessful attempts to utilize aircraft in efforts to pursue reported discs in flight. Public reaction bordered on near hysteria at times.

As a result of these efforts, little of substance was learned about the objects until a local rancher reported that one had crashed in a remote region of New Mexico located approximately seventy-five miles northwest of Roswell Army Air Base (now Walker Field).

On 07 July, 1947, a secret operation was begun to assure recovery of the wreckage of this object for scientific study. During the course of this operation, aerial reconnaissance discovered that four small human-like beings had apparently ejected from the craft at some point before it exploded. These had fallen to earth about two miles east of the wreckage site. All four were dead and badly decomposed due to action by predators and exposure to the elements during the approximately one week time period which had elapsed before their discovery. A special scientific team took charge of removing these bodies for study. (See Attachment "C".) The wreckage of the craft was also removed to several different locations. (See Attachment "D".) Civilian and military witnesses in the area were debriefed, and news reporters were given the effective cover story that the object had been a misguided weather research balloon.

A covert analytical effort organized by Gen. Tining and Dr. Bush acting on the direct orders of the President resulted in a preliminary consensus (19 September, 1947) that the disc was most likely a short range reconnaissance craft. This conclusion was based for the most part on the craft's size and the apparent lack of any identifiable provisioning. (See Attachment "D".) A similar analysis of the four dead occupants was arranged by Dr. Bronk. It was the tentative conclusion of this group (30 November, 1947) that although these creatures are human-like in appearance, the biological and evolutionary processes responsible for their development has apparently been quite different from those observed or postulated in homo-sapiens. Dr. Bronk's team has suggested the term "Extra-terrestrial Biological Entities", or "EBEs", be adopted as the standard term of reference for these creatures until such time as a more definitive designation can be agreed upon.

Since it is virtually certain that these craft do not originate in any country on earth, considerable speculation has centered around what their point of origin might be and how they get here. Mars is still remains a possibility, although some scientists, most notably Dr. Engel, consider it more likely that we are dealing with beings from another solar system entirely.

Numerous examples of what appear to be a form of writing were found in the wreckage. Efforts to decipher these have remained largely unsuccessful. (See Attachment "E".) Equally unsuccessful have been efforts to determine the method of propulsion or the nature or method of transmission of the power source involved. Research along these lines has been complicated by the complete absence of identifiable wings, propellers, jets, or other conventional methods of propulsion and guidance, as well as a total lack of metallic wiring, vacuum tubes, or similar recognizable electronic components. (See Attachment "F".) It is assumed that the propulsion unit was completely destroyed by the explosion which caused the crash.

A need for as much additional information as possible about these craft, their performance characteristics and their purpose led to the undertaking known as U.S. Air Force Project SIGN in December, 1947. In order to preserve security, liason between SIGN and Majestic-12 was limited to two individuals within the Intelligence Division of Air Materiel Command whose role was to pass along certain types of information through channels. SIGN evolved into Project GRUDGE in December, 1948. The operation is currently being conducted under the code name BLUE BOOK, with liason maintained through the Air Force officer who is head of the project.

On 06 December, 1950, a second object, probably of similar origin, impacted the earth at high speed in the El Indio - Guerrero area of the Texas - Mexican border after following a long trajectory through the atmosphere. By the time a search team arrived, what remained of the object had been almost totally incinerated. Such material as could be recovered was transported to the A.E.C. facility at Sandia, New Mexico, for study.

Implications for the National Security are of continuing importance in that the motives and ultimate intentions of these visitors remain completely unknown. In addition, a significant resurgence in the surveillance activity of these craft beginning in May and continuing through the autumn of this year has caused considerable concern that new developments may be imminent. For these reasons, as well as the obvious international technological considerations and the ultimate need to hold the public public at all costs, that the Majestic-12 Group of the unanimous opinion that imposition of the strictest security precautions should continue without interruption into the new administration. At the same time, contingency plan MJ 1949-04P/78 (Top Secret - Eyes Only) should be held in continued readiness should the need to make a public announcement present itself. (See Attachment "C".)

Please find enclosed the video of which I spoke to you about this morning. The segment is ready to play as soon as you insert the cassette. The segment at the very start of the tape, you have already seen, (Nethermill Dumfries & Galloway) sent to you last year. So ignore that. The following are some details on this case.

- (1) The video was taken on Wednesday the 19th of January 1994. Time between 7pm and 7 : 15pm.
- (2) Filmed above the outskirts of the town of Larbert in Stirlingshire Scotland, roughly 3 miles from the town of Bonnybridge, scene of a number of UFO reports.
- (3) There were six witnesses to this sighting. The object appears on film, over the Alexander Bus Dept garage.
- (4) Very briefly, the witness was driving alone in his car through Larbert, when he noticed a large bright object in the sky to the right hand side of his car. It followed him as he drove along, in which at one point, he claims it illuminated the interior of his car.

The witness arrived home, dashed into the house, and told other family members. The result was this video. They could have filmed it for longer, as it was a good few minutes (3-4) before one witness decided to get the camera. No red or green navigation lights could be observed at any time. A slight hum was the only sound heard.

- (5) Local police have no records of any callers to the stations I called. I am awaiting letters from Glasgow and Edinburgh and RAF Pitrievie airports. I am also checking on helicopters.

- (6) This is only a very brief outline of the facts. Should you require more details, then I shall send them on.

Can you tell me what other places I should go to for other assessments of this film. You see I'm looking for a good few assessments from a number of specialists. It would be silly to sit with just the one opinion.

Should you require more data Nick, then give me a call. Return the tape upon completion of tests. Best of luck, look forward to hearing from you soon.

1. You will wish to be aware that the Mail on Sunday has obtained a video recording of a UFO, which was allegedly taken over the Norfolk Broads last year.

2. We had already been given a copy of this video by a member of the public, and been asked for any comments.

3. It is my understanding that the Mail on Sunday intend to print a number of stills from the video, and feature the story in the near future - probably this weekend. They may well get in touch and formally ask us to comment. In this case, the following lines should be used:

- We are aware of this video.
- We have had an initial look, and no obvious explanation springs to mind.
- We are having a more detailed look, but are not yet in a position to comment.

We should avoid getting into the details of whether we are doing a full analysis, who is doing this, and with what equipment. If pressed on this point we can say:

- All sighting reports (including on occasion photographs and videos) are referred to those staff responsible for air defence of the UK, who examine them as part of their normal duties.

Additional material from your existing standard lines on UFOs can also be deployed as necessary.



Dear Section 40,

Thank you for your very prompt and measured response to my rather provocative letter of 29th January. It was as I had expected it to be, in view of your PR role within MoD. However, your expressed interest in my work prompts me to continue our dialogue. Perhaps understanding of the situation will be made clearer if I tell you a little more about the reasons for my involvement and of my knowledge of MoD's involvement in numerous Close Encounter investigations over many years.

I began my career in aerospace as a member of the Special Projects department of the Avro Weapons Research Division, based at Woodford, Cheshire. The department was headed by (later Section 40), who was a well-known advocate for an independent British space program. The department had been set up to investigate future applications of our acquired rocketry expertise and to keep abreast of all new developments in aerospace. One of my special tasks was to investigate the performance capabilities of new missiles and space-vehicle launchers by gathering information and analysing photographs. I became quite adept in that role. As a department, we were also involved in feasibility studies of advanced-technology vehicles, such as aerospaceplanes (of the HOTOL and NASP kind). After a take-over by Hawker Siddeley Dynamics (HSD), the department was disbanded and I opted to transfer to aircraft R&D with HSA, still based at Woodford.

During 1967 I found myself living in the midst of a UFO 'flap' which was centred on Manchester. Witnesses were regularly describing brilliantly-lit, low-flying, aerial devices which they described as being circular in planform and with side-elevations resembling brimmed hats or kitchen utensils. They were often of the view that they had witnessed artifacts from an extraterrestrial source. I decided to apply my (by then) wasted intelligence activity expertise to the reports, as they became known. By the end of 1967, I had concluded that the evidence very strongly supported the witnesses' viewpoint and, so, continued to monitor British CE reports for the following 6 years. The rest of the story will be told by the attached article, which was written last year for publication in the Centre for Crop Circle Studies (CCCS) magazine, 'The Circular'.

To my knowledge, MoD investigated some of the cases also studied by me: so it is logical to think that your experts would have almost certainly concluded as I did. It is also untrue that the circular shapes described in 1967, for example, were in any way carbon copies of the sci-fi devices depicted in 1950s films. In fact, some of us have been around long enough to know that the latter were inspired by CE reports of the late 1940s. Major Donald Keyhoe's investigations bear witness to that fact, as related in his book of (I think) 1949, 'The Flying Saucers are Real'.

MoD, whilst acknowledging the existence of unidentifiable aerial objects, seems constantly to hide behind its statement that there are no defence implications as yet apparent; and it is probably true that there have been no overt acts of aggression by the visiting vehicles. There are, however, enough worrying aspects of their activities to keep MoD on its toes; eg. the mysterious disappearance of Capt Schafer, September 1970, during an alleged interception of a UFO, and the constant inexplicable aerial activity in the vicinity of defence establishments in Wiltshire and Hampshire.

My findings facilitate observation of the 'visitors' at work and, therefore, should be of intense interest to those whose task it is to monitor the activities taking place in our skies. (Of course, if they are already in possession of similar information, my discoveries will be regarded as being of no consequence.)

Whereas no good purpose can be served by unduly alarming the public, I believe that it is important that people should be counselled to exercise extreme caution in the event of a Close Encounter. We have no idea what the ultimate purpose of the visitors is, but one thing is very clear to me: we are completely at their mercy. They come and go as they wish. It is apparent to me that the RAF stopped chasing them a long time ago; perhaps following Schafer's disappearance?

So that, in a nutshell, is my view of the hard-core UFO evidence and of MoD's true position. I hope that you and your colleagues find all this of interest and that our dialogue will continue.

Circles Within Circles The Astronautical Connections

Background

My involvement in crop-circles research began in the late summer of 1988, following an unexpected encounter with Colin Andrews, Busty Taylor and a small group of other investigators during May 1987, on the occasion of my BUFORA public lecture entitled 'We are DEFINITELY not alone'. During the talk I had attempted to explain how my (then) twenty years' spare-time research of UFO Close Encounter (CE) events had led to me to the conclusion that such happenings are explicable as one aspect of a continuing astronomical surveillance of Earth, by vehicles which are far beyond present-day human accomplishment. It must be emphasised that my conclusion was reached after innumerable hours of objective analytical work and had not, in any way, stemmed from a personal need to believe in an alien presence. To satisfy my curiosity, I had simply drawn on astronautical knowledge acquired during the early years of a long professional career in the aerospace industry and had applied this to the available CE evidence.

How did all this relate to crop-circles research? Colin Andrews had noted that the locations, which, I had claimed, were favoured by UFO CE events, could equally well be the sites favoured for the crop-circle happenings. He invited me to link up with him and to travel south, from Cheshire, to view the evidence for myself.

That link-up with the Andrews team did not occur until August 1988, and it is important to stress that I did not immediately jump to the conclusion that we were dealing with alien technology. Obscure

natural phenomena (such as Dr. Meaden's plasma vortex, which I had no knowledge of then, and Colin Andrews' suggested electromagnetic vortex) had first to be eliminated before any such 'exotic' explanation could be acceptable.

In my article published in the March 1993 edition of 'The Circular' (1), the outcome of my subsequent research into crop-circle flow patterns was described. For the reasons given in that article, I concluded that the genuine flattening found in the cornfields could have been produced only by a mathematically-precise piece of advanced technology. A controlled laser-like beam of radiant energy, projected from high above the fields, seemed to be the only reasonable source of the effects found in the crops.

A Tangible Link with UFO Close Encounters

Having modelled the crop circles very successfully and shown them to be artificial, but beyond human scope, another revelation, of a similar kind, was soon to be presented to me.

After purchasing a copy of Dr. Terence Meaden's first crop-circle book (2), I was challenged by his assertion therein that his plasma vortex concept could explain all kinds of aerial phenomena which had previously been classified as UFO reports. Dr. Meaden had given dates and times for the events, most of which had occurred in Wiltshire. This enabled me to process the data (which included witnessed crop-circle events) on the PC, using one of my UFO-derived programs - and to discover that all the events had occurred at well-established Close Encounter sidereal (star) times.

I will explain the full significance of this result: but, before doing so, it is essential that the reader becomes acquainted with certain facts of an astronomical/astronautical nature.

Basic Principles

From our position on the Earth's surface, the sun, moon, planets and stars seem to rotate; from East to

hour day. This is caused, primarily, by the Earth's rotation about its polar axis. Although the individual motions of the celestial bodies within our solar system are superimposed on this movement, the stars and constellations are so far away from us that they appear to be fixed to the inside surface of a huge stationary globe, which is known as the 'Celestial Sphere'.

Fig 1 (opposite) shows the concept, as used by both astronomers and astrologers, with two hoops superimposed. The hoops will be explained later.

In this diagram, only the Earth is considered to be moving, rotating about its poles once in 24 hours at the centre of the fixed Celestial Sphere. The rotation is from West to East beneath the fixed stars. The imaginary sphere of the sky is divided into divisions of celestial latitude (Declination) and celestial longitude (Right Ascension), so that the position of any celestial body can be located, exactly, by its equivalent lat/long co-ordinates. In this way, the starry heavens provide us with a fixed frame of reference, whereas everything else around us, including each planet, is moving perceptibly in its own fashion.

So: if we could stand at the centre of a transparent Earth and look all round us, we would see that the stars were not moving. They would seem to be fixed, forever, in their ordained places in the sky. That is why we can use the stars for navigational purposes. The Pole Star is important for navigation in the Northern Hemisphere because, being fixed in the sky above the North Pole, it does not move in any appreciable manner as the Earth rotates. With knowledge of each star's position on the Celestial Sphere, the stars can also be used as navigational markers for space-travel within our solar system.

Returning, now, to our imaginary position at the Earth's centre: looking outwards, we would see each artificial Earth-satellite moving round us, as if following a large Great Circle hoop, with us situated at the centre of it. It is a physical fact that each satellite would seem to pass the same stars and pass through the

round the Earth. These paths through the stars would change only very slowly as the days and weeks progressed; therefore, the track of a satellite which operated for just a few hours would not seem to change at all. So, we could plot the path of that satellite on a star chart by linking up all the stars which it had seemed to pass through during each round trip.

The Astronautical Modelling of UFO CE Activity

The principle just described was used to extraordinarily good effect in my UFO study. After a thorough investigation of the unidentified low-flying aerial devices reported by eye-witnesses, I had concluded that the objects could not have been of this Earth (the implied technology was too advanced) and, furthermore, they were too small to have arrived here unaided. I speculated that they had probably been delivered and retrieved by large spacecraft, perhaps established in short-stay orbits. The assumption was made that the Close Encounters (CEs) might have occurred almost directly below the paths of the orbiters.

After taking a sample of the best CE reports from all over the world (which covered a period of about 100 years) I determined, in effect, which star had been directly overhead at the time of each event. By linking those stars on a star-chart, I hoped to find those tell-tale hoops in the sky which would characterise the favoured paths of hypothetical delivery vehicles. Much to my amazement, I found them! I also discovered that a large number of additional paths had been orientated using the sun as the celestial marker.

In summary, my global study of UFO Close Encounter events revealed that such events could be linked to the pre-programmed orbiting of advanced space vehicles. Throughout a century of activity, the hypothetical orbiting craft had followed the same tracks among the stars or relative to the Sun.




Fig. 1: The Celestial Sphere & Favoured Track Orientations

Fig 1 shows two typical star-orientated examples: two hoops superimposed upon the Celestial Sphere. Notice that the hoops have different inclinations and are drawn

on opposite sides of the polar axis. To each of those hoops can be added nine more passing through the same points on the Celestial Equator.

Furthermore, I discovered that the 10 favoured orbits adopted (whether star-orientated or sun-orientated made no difference) were also keyed to navigational points on the Earth's equator, and that this feature of the strategy determined which of the favoured orbital inclinations could be used to provide access to a given location on the planet's surface. Thus, at any geographical location, CE events could be expected to occur whenever a predictable set of stars was overhead: and this would be true even for the sun-orientated options.

Understandably, all this may seem to be highly speculative and contrived to those who did not participate in the exercise; but the proof of any pudding is in the eating of it, and through its 'eating'

the validity of my rather stodgy 'pudding' is beginning to be proved.

Proof of the Astronautical 'Pudding'

Fig 2 (overleaf) shows how the Meaden sample conformed to the CE expectations.

The sloping lines are lines of constant meridian sidereal (star) time. The lower set of twinned lines indicates the times, throughout any year, when the head of the Draco (Dragon) constellation is overhead, whereas the upper when part of the Cassiopeia constellation is directly above us. In the light of my previous work, the gap between the sets of twinned lines was instantly recognisable as being the 'hour angle' (Celestial Longitude angle) between the north-going and south-going legs of the same (67 degrees inclined) satellite orbit, as they interact with locations at British latitudes (50 to 58 degrees North).



Reference to Fig 1 may aid understanding of this. A 67-degree inclined orbit was one of those predicted, by the astronomical model, to give 'main-line' access to Southern England.

Fig 3 (below) shows a set of CE prediction lines for Wiltshire and Hampshire, as derived from my global study. Comparison of Figs 2 and 3 shows that all the Meaden points are accounted for, including the observed crop-circle events. Three events communicated to me by Colin Andrews are also plotted on Fig 2 and seen to conform. One of them (No. 6) is the much-disputed White Crow noise event which was followed, after daybreak, by the discovery of a beautifully-cut ringed circle in an adjoining field. (I can vouch for that circle's precision because I was able to be there to inspect it at 0930 hours BST on the same morning, only nine hours after the commencement of the noise). How much more evidence is required, I wonder, to link crop-circle events to Close Encounters - and to link both activities with astronomical surveillance of our planet by extraterrestrials?

The lines drawn on Fig 3 are not arbitrary: they reflect my predicted inclinations and celestial orientations of the paths of hypothetical ET orbiters passing over Wiltshire and Hampshire. The model assumes that those orbiters spawn and retrieve surface-exploration vehicles with predetermined and exact timing.

My continuing research suggests that the exploration vehicles are usually witnessed within any one hour gap between two of the predicted pass-over times and often (presumably during arrival and departure periods) within only minutes of a pass-over time. I am often asked why the orbiters are not very evident, and why the objects seen at close quarters often seem to suddenly appear and disappear from view, to which I answer - "Ever heard of Stealth?"

Fig 4 (opposite) provides further proof of the efficacy of my astronomical model. The timings of events recorded during the Warminster UFO period have been extracted, without selection, from



Ref. 3 and then superimposed upon Fig 3. Arthur Shuttlewood's basic beliefs are surely vindicated by this evidence.

Finally, readers of the October 1992 edition of this magazine will remember Chris Mansell's account of a Close Encounter event which he experienced in the company of Dr. Steven Greer, Director of CSETI. It took place near Alton Barnes in the early hours of July 27th, 1992. What is not generally realised is that Dr. Greer and the remaining members of his team had decided to linger in the area, despite the terrible weather, because they had received information that something was likely to happen at around 12.30 a.m. on that morning. That information had been read directly from my Fig 3, during a fortuitous encounter (facilitated by Busty Taylor) which occurred on July 26th between myself, Dr. Greer, Shari Adamiak and Ron Russell of CSETI, at the Glastonbury Symposium. (In fact, three times were read off the graph and UFOs were witnessed at all three during that nightwatch. Further 'proof' of the 'pudding' which is testified to, with great enthusiasm, by those who have ventured to taste it.)

Conclusion

Through my UFO and crop-circle studies I believe I have created a very strong case for the existence, in our skies, of advanced technology which does not originate on Earth.

Recently, that technology seems to have been used to create puzzles in crop fields. I hope that, through this article, many of the questions posed by George Wingfield in the October 1992 edition of this magazine have now been effectively answered.

Those mysteries which have not yet been addressed I will deal with briefly now. My CE investigations have indicated that telepathic communication by the 'visitors' is just one of those standard 'miracles', so it does not surprise me that suitably gifted subjects are experiencing leadings of that kind in association with the appearance of crop-circles. And I suggest that those mysterious and active balls of glowing plasma, often seen over the crop fields at night, could be the results of the focused convergence of two or more 'gravitational-laser' beams, perhaps being used as altitude-checking devices, similar in function to those two searchlights on the 'Dam Busters' bombers of WW2. (The production of precise patterns in the fields would require the beam focusing to be exact).

The electronic interference which

upset the BBC team during an interview in a circle formation, when it ruined one of their cameras, could very well have been caused by the monitoring of human activities by a high-flying visiting craft or orbiter using remote-sensing beam techniques.

To conclude, I appeal to all concerned in crop-circle investigations to search the skies directly overhead at the targeted fields; and especially, when operating in Wiltshire and Hampshire, at the times given by the sloping solid lines in Fig 3. Perhaps then, like Dr. Greer and members of his CSETI team, more people will begin to observe our observers and recognise them for who (I have good reason to believe) they really are - a set of scientifically and technologically advanced creatures from another star system who, like the gods of ancient Greece, may well be having sport at our expense (perhaps to relieve the boredom of their data-gathering scientific assignments?).

Whatever the meaning of all those patterns in the fields, I think


it can be safely concluded that we are, DEFINITELY, not alone! (Who needs MoD's guarded opinion on the matter when the proverbial 'cat' is out of the proverbial 'bag'?)

More in the next issue of The Circular. Meanwhile, here is a related account of another 'coincidence'. B.D.

UFO fever spreads as more lights seen in sky

STRANGE lights over Scarborough and unexplained objects in the skies above Pickering in the last week have once again brought UFO fever to North Yorkshire.

The mystery remains: are these lights in the sky the spacecraft of extraterrestrials who have travelled billions of light years for a weekend in Bridlington?

Strange as it may seem, these recent sightings are only the latest in a long history of reports of Unidentified Flying Objects in the area.

North Yorkshire seems to have always had a special fascination for these visitors from distant galaxies.

Over the years there have been some strange reports.

In 1984, a York taxi driver claimed to have seen an alien craft set fire to the Minster. The intergalactic arsonists travelled in a flame-coloured zeppelin-like space ship.

In 1986, York City FC had a close encounter of the sporting kind when their team bus was apparently buzzed

by a UFO after a 3-0 defeat at Bristol City.

It was said to be a strange round object, flying at speed, which none of the team could identify - although cynics might suggest it was a football.

In 1988, a "large pumpkin object with several cocktail sticks coming out of it" appeared over York. Experts from the Yorkshire UFO society claimed at the time that it might be a Nazi "flying disc" from World War II. Experts from Practical Housekeeping suggested it might make an interesting centre piece for a dinner party.

In 1992, a York man photographed a Polo mint-shaped object in the sky over Foxwood. Experts examined the photo, but could find no holes in his theory that it was a UFO.

In fact North Yorkshire, the largest county in England, is top for UFO sightings, accounting for more than half the national total in the last decade.

But why do these Extra Terrestrials choose Yorkshire. Is it the beautiful countryside or the clear air - or are they planning an invasion.

Now there's a plot for Emmerdale!

Retired South Ronaldsay farmer Mr Marcus Wood had a similar experience to the two electricians who were baffled by the huge, glowing cigar-shaped object they saw for just seconds as they travelled from Stromness to Kirkwall at 8.30 am on Thursday, January 13.

But in the case of Mr Wood of Odinsay, Berrisdale, he was at home that morning, standing by the kitchen window and looking in the

direction of Copinsay when he saw a bright light in the sky.

'There was a streak in the distance which was burning or glowing,' he told *The Orcadian*. 'It was going southwards and dropping and ... it appeared to disintegrate as it disappeared out of sight before it touched the sea.'

'I said to my wife, Nan: 'That's funny' - but she wasn't looking. It only took one or two seconds and it had gone.'

Mr Wood said when he looked at his kitchen clock it was exactly 8.33 am which

makes him believe he may have seen the same object that Stephen Leech and Paul Anderson reported.

But while they saw a very large glowing green UFO, tinged with blue, Mr Wood says the light he saw was "a small streak in the sky".

Mr Ron Halliday, who is chairman of a group Scotland Earth Mysteries Research who investigate UFOs, commented: "We have had a number of reports of glowing green objects from all over the UK in the past 40 years and during the past couple of weeks, there have been sightings around Scarborough and down the east coast of a glowing ball shaped light."

He said his group have a database with over 400 sightings covering Scotland, and added: "There is certainly a link-up between what has been seen in Orkney and elsewhere."

Your letter in reference concerning unusual sightings over Belgium was received, through the office of Section 40, on 25 January 1994.

Relating to your questions I can confirm that 2 F-16 have been scrambled on 30 March 1990, as a reaction to both visual and radar observations. The scramble was co-ordinated with and authorised by the Sector Commander of the NATO Air Defence System.

Reports to other agencies or adjacent countries have not been made since the events took place in the central part of Belgium and no presumed activities of any hostile or aggressive nature were registred.

A press conference on the findings of the radar observations has been given in July 1990. At a later stage, since no more additional military interventions took place and with the intend to contain the growing aggressiveness of the media, the Minister of Defence and the Chief of the General Staff decided on an information stop on the subject.

I hope that the above information will be helpful to answer the question on the non-involvement of the UK Air Defence System.


I understand that during 1989 and 1990 there was a wave of sightings of unusual objects in the sky over Belgium. I have also been told that as a result of a wave of sightings on 30/31 March 1990, F-16 aircraft were scrambled and vectored towards the area concerned. Apparently there were a number of strange radar returns, involving ground-based radar and radar systems on the F-16s.

We have received a number of letters about this, and although our basic position is that this is a matter for the Belgian authorities, we have been drawn into a debate about whether there was a potential threat to the UK, and whether or not the Belgians would have notified UK Air Defenders about what was happening in their airspace.

I would be grateful if you could give me some indication of the official Belgian position on this matter, together with any other background information that you may have.

Shoppers spot UFO over store's car park

SHOPPING at Tesco in Rickmansworth was an unforgettable experience for a couple who looked up to see a craft "the size of a hundred aeroplanes" overhead.

The mysterious craft, shaped like an eye and covered in lights, appeared in the sky as Mr Barry Clarke and his wife, Carol, were loading groceries into their car on Monday evening.

It flew at the height of a helicopter but was, Mrs Clarke said "much, much larger".

The even more bizarre twist to the tale came when the Clarkes looked at other shoppers expecting them to be in similar awe of the unidentified flying object.

In a scene reminiscent of Close Encounters of the Third Kind, Mr and Mrs Clarke found themselves the only people to have noticed the giant ship.

While the couple craned their necks to the skies, other shoppers waited impatiently to leave the car park.

Then, as they tried to follow the ship while it continued its flight, the pair could not believe other motorists in Riverside Drive were not stopping to watch.

Mrs Clarke, 42, who runs a card shop in Buckinghamshire and has never seen a UFO before, said: "I

have been wondering to myself if I was seeing things but my husband backs me up and he is a very logical man.

"It was unidentified and it was flying so, yes, it was a UFO.

"I am desperate to talk to anyone who saw it as well. I have always believed the light can play tricks on your eyes, especially at night, but this was not a trick."

Mrs Clarke has asked for anyone else who saw the craft to get in touch with her.

She said: "It was covered in lights, hundreds of them, with one flashing on the top.

"I am sure other people must have seen it. I cannot understand how so many people missed it.

"I am beginning to even doubt it happened myself because I have never seen anything like it."

UFO sightings that are reported to the Civil Aviation Authority are referred to the Ministry of Defence.

A spokesman for the ministry said the sighting would be logged and investigated by a secretariat dedicated to the subject.

ARE aliens watching us? That's the question they're asking in the Hucknall, Bulwell and Basford area after further sightings of UFOs.

There was a wealth of interest last November when sightings of UFOs were recorded over Newstead Abbey.

They made national news and ensured full halls at meetings of the East Midlands UFO Research Association, who aim to keep abreast of any developments.

Now more sightings of unusual lights and mysterious objects have been made by sky-watchers.

More than 30 sightings have been recorded in recent months and fresh reports from Bulwell and Basford have come from more than a dozen independent sources.

The Ministry of Defence deny any military activity and East Midlands International Airport claim there have been no unusual aircraft movements.

The latest batch of baffled sky-watchers all described the alien vision as a series of three white lights and two red.

No noise accompanies the sudden appearance of the lights which seem — according to some eye-witnesses — to be hanging in the sky.

Thirteen-year-old Shane Barratt of Midland Gardens, Bulwell, and his friend, Jonathon Bloomfield (15) of Cheltenham Street, Old Basford, insisted they saw a glowing object regularly in the skies last week.

Shane explained: "We were outside with the telescope looking at stars and trying to find Saturn when we saw this glowing object. The next minute it was gone out of sight."

His grandmother, Mary Swift (55) of Corben Gardens, Bulwell, confirmed his story when she saw a similar object.

"I cannot be sure what I saw but I know I saw lights in the sky and I know it was not an aeroplane," she said.

Others spotted the object above Daybrook and in Holbrook, Derbyshire.

Lynne Walton (39) of Charlsworth Avenue, Chatsworth, said: "It was just hanging there like it was on a piece of string. It had three white lights and two red ones.

"I have always kept an open mind but I have never seen anything like that in my life."

Investigator Tony James, of the East Midlands UFO Research Association, said that the latest sightings matched descriptions of craft seen over Arnold in August, Mansfield and Newstead Abbey in November and Arnold two weeks ago.

Some of the descriptions claim the UFOs were as big as three to four

houses across — about 150 feet — with white, grey and blue coloured lights and hovering about 100 feet in the air.

Mr James said the organisation had checked with stockists of high-powered laser equipment and had ruled out any chance of pranksters.

A BRIGHT white light hovering in the sky in the early hours today has left one Norfolk man puzzling about the existence of UFOs.

Terence Pressley, of Tunstead, says he saw the strange light as he looked out of his window towards Norwich.

"It was a ball of light, moving erratically," he said.

"We live near RAF Coltishall so we are used to seeing aeroplanes and helicopters with search lights, but this was nothing like that and there was no noise. I think it may have been a UFO."

RAF Coltishall spokesman Sqn Ldr Jack Love said he was not aware of any activity from the base.

Experts to probe UFO sightings

AN INVESTIGATION is being launched by UFO experts into a strange object spotted flying over both Scarborough and Ryedale this week.

"There were three white lights moving away towards Pickering," he said. "It was an odd-shaped set of very bright lights that I didn't recognise.

"I really don't know what it was, but we kept them in sight to the top of Ebberston."

Mr Leng saw the lights at about 8.20am on Wednesday — just minutes after that time that

THE first ever alleged crash landing of a flying saucer is reported to have happened on the outskirts of Scarborough.

According to Phillip Mantle, of the British UFO Research Association, back in the 1950s local residents were driving on Silpho moor when they saw a whoosh of light and something fall to earth.

When they went to investigate, they found an object which they later opened and found it full of pipes, tubing and strange chemicals.

"The object itself was available for many, many years, but this was before there were any structured UFO groups," Mr Mantle said.

He has no idea where the object is now, but would dearly love to hear from anyone who might know what happened to it.

"There are many interesting theories, but the 'u' in UFO still stands for unidentified," he said. "We hope that at the end of the day we can say what they are."

FORMER UN Secretary General U Thant believed UFOs to be the biggest issue facing humanity.

Author and UFO researcher Palden Jenkins agrees with that view.

Palden (right), who will lecture on ETs and Planet Earth at the Wessex Research Group meeting tonight (Thursday), reckons the full truth of visiting aliens will hit the world like a cosmic bombshell some time during the next 10 years.



"It will cause major psychological disturbance," warns Palden, whose talk is at 7.30 pm the Friends' Meeting House in Boscombe's Wharnclyffe Road - admission £2.

Palden, editor of Gateway Books of Bath which has just published his book *The Only Planet of Choice*, claims as many as 40 different alien groups - some friendly, some malevolent - are flocking to our little world.

One disturbing reason given for all this attention is that Earth was long ago chosen for an evolutionary experiment - with humans as the guinea pigs.

Palden, 43, accepts that a lot of folk will dismiss his views as pure fantasy but argues that much hard evidence about UFOs is emerging every day, especially from America.

"And just in case it's correct - forewarned is forearmed," he suggests.

A UFO sighting in Wales when he was 22 sparked his interest in the phenomena.

"I and a friend saw four craft emerge from a mother ship," said father of three Palden, who lives in Glastonbury. "We watched them for half an hour."

His new book details 18 years work of psychic Phyllis Schlemmer, who claims to channel "the Council of Nine, a circle of universal beings living outside time and space".

It was these sessions, attended by the since deceased science fiction writer Gene Roddenberry, which are said to have inspired much of his *Star Trek* material.

Palden's "coming out" as an ET believer has the effect, he says, of encouraging others to talk of their UFO experiences.

So if you've been buzzed, abducted or even haunted by THEM, Boscombe tonight is the place to be.

"I've been a professional UFO investigator for the past 20 years. My interest started when I was a teacher and children told me of unusual things they had seen. I thought they deserved a more sympathetic hearing. The proposal which has been put through the energy commission would be a significant development. Research on earthquake diffusion would be most useful. People should learn the facts before they call us cranks."

FERGUS STORRIER

Policeman and UFO Investigator

"I do all my research in Scotland. The kind of people who come to me usually don't want to report it to the police for fear of being called loonies. I've never seen anything myself but so many people have had sightings that I felt I had to find out more. A friend from up north once saw a spaceship outside her house. I'm always sceptical but there are things out there that we don't understand yet."

BOB MAJOR

Curator, Museum of Flight

"One time I was convinced that I was witnessing the arrival of UFOs. I looked up and saw two or three shining objects in the sky which looked like nothing I had seen before. However, I soon realised that it was simply the sun reflecting off a flock of seagulls."

Dr GORDON SAYER

Retired pharmaceutical chemist

"I was in Michigan in 1966 when I got involved in a wave of UFO sightings. I didn't see anything but for a whole month reports came in. The whole experience was most bizarre. One man nearly had a collision with a spaceship which landed in his path. I think there is something very peculiar going on in the world but I don't know what the explanation is. I would be in favour

JAMES FERRIER

Male nurse

"I'm a Catholic but I believe that there are other life forms which we haven't made contact with yet. I was walking home one evening when a huge blue light hovered in the field next to me. There was a strange humming sound coming from somewhere. I was so frightened that I fell into some bushes and sat there quivering for about an hour. If there is a rational explanation for what I saw I sure as hell can't think what it is."

RON HALLIDAY

University administrator and UFO investigator

"Our group investigates throughout Scotland. We have had several hundred reported sightings. I think the idea of an official study centre is a good thing. People are becoming more interested in UFOs. In Edinburgh in 1992 a man saw a group of round objects land within 150ft of him. In Livingston a dome shaped craft sent out sharp objects which knocked a man out. The highest concentration of sightings has been in the Edinburgh area."

DAVID REYNOLDS

Meteorologist

"My specialism is research into crop circles. This is one area where people think they have proof that UFOs have landed. However, 30 or 40 of the cases we had were genuine — that is, they were caused by whirlwinds (some of which glow). The others were all fakes made by people trying to fool the experts. A centre for serious study would be worthwhile but you always have to look out for the lunatic fringe."

DES BROGAN

Ghost Tours operator, Edinburgh

"There are certain things you can't explain which is why a study centre would be a good idea. Like many others I believe there are supernatural forces at work. One of my friends who set up the company had strange encounters every time he went under Edinburgh City Chambers. The light above the door would flicker, turn green and then go out every time he stood there. We made many investigations and it never happened to anyone else. I think it's wrong to be completely sceptical. I don't believe these forces are evil. We should open our minds to new things."

JESS FERRIER

Sociologist

"In my experience people who claim to have seen UFOs either like a drink or are wishful thinkers. You'd think the European parliament would have better things to spend their money on."

Probe into sightings of UFOs at seaside

REPORTS of strange flying objects in the sky above the Yorkshire coastline have prompted a full-scale investigation by the British UFO Research Association.

Several sightings of mysterious bright lights flying over Scarborough have been received by the association.

According to the RAF, there were no reports of military activity over Scarborough last Wednesday when the sightings were made.

There were also reports of unexplained bright objects in the sky near Eberston and Pickering early on Wednesday morning.

Philip Mantle, the association's director of investigations, confirmed that more than 20 sightings had been made in the region last week.

He said: "It would be wrong of me to speculate about what people may have seen, but we will certainly attempt to find out exactly what it was."

"About 95 per cent of sightings can be explained — it's the remaining five per cent we are interested in."

Mr Mantle said UFO investigators had been despatched to Bridlington and Hull to look into the sightings.

UFO expert Ron Halliday, chairman of Scottish Earth Mysteries Research, said: "One explanation put forward for these bright lights is that they are caused by movement within the earth's surface causing a release of energy. But there is no similar explanation for sightings over the sea."

"It depends how close people get to them. If they are very close, it is difficult to give a natural explanation."

City UFOs: Oops, did I do that?

SHOWMAN James Mellors today threw some light on the county's latest UFO mystery.

Mr Mellors had been testing his new 7,000-watt laser light show, imported from Italy, at his Redhill home.

Following sightings over the city last week, an artist's impression of unusual light patterns was published in Friday's *Evening Post*.

And Mr Mellors believes that what people thought were UFOs were his laser lights.

UFO-watcher Tony James said: "This explains one of the sightings of light patterns. But there have been several types of sightings, and this laser show wouldn't be responsible for them.

"So this doesn't affect my belief in UFOs. I know for a fact that UFOs do exist, but the point is that 90% of sightings can be explained — this is just

one more." He said the sighting which was represented in Friday's *Post* had not been explained, nor had one in Mansfield.

Mr Mellors said he had no idea he would cause such a stir. "Cars were apparently stopping on Mansfield Road and kids were coming to see what was going on," he said. The beam stretches about half-a-mile and changes appearance, depending on how far away the observation is made.

"The further away you are the beam starts to fade out and it just leaves spots in the clouds," he added.

Mr Mellors plans to use the lights at his summer fairs and at the Goose Fair in October. And he said: "We don't want any UFOs landing on top of us and we certainly don't want any Martians coming to the fair unless they have got a few quid to spend!"

Mick's space shot crashes

TIME ran out this week for prospective aliens millionaire Mick Howe, of Batley, when his 10,000 to one bet that space creatures would be ruling the world by January 18 failed to come off.

Mick, of Blenheim Hill, placed his £100 bet last year with William Hill.

No sign

But there was no sign of ex-terrestrials in Batley this week, unlike 1979 when Mick became a confirmed UFO believer after spotting bright lights in the sky over Tingley.

He is convinced that one day they will land and take over this much-troubled earth and he vowed this week to continue with his bets until he is proved right and becomes a rich man into the bargain.



Secret of little men in a UFO!

THE sensational truth is soon to be revealed about the world's most baffling UFO mystery.

Four tiny alien bodies were reported to have been found in the wreckage of a crashed spacecraft.

Movie director Steven Spielberg has obtained secret military film of the incident, which has always been officially denied.

He plans to use the astonishing footage, which has only been seen by a handful of generals and officials, in a Hollywood version of the story.

Spielberg says: "I'm a UFO enthusiast and I've known about this secret for years."

Fact

"ET and Close Encounters were fantasy, just science fiction. This will be science fact."

A script is being written and Spielberg has earmarked £50 million for the film, which is due for release on the 50th anniversary of the UFO landing in three years' time.

Its provisional title is Majic-12, codename of the White House committee appointed to investigate UFO sightings.

"The film will prove conclusively that beings from outer space DO exist," says

one of Spielberg's team. "There has been a huge cover-up to prevent the public knowing the facts. We will tell the story exactly as it happened."

It began on the night of July 2, 1947, when a disc-shaped object was spotted flying over an air force base near the sleepy city of Roswell, New Mexico.

Soon afterwards, almost 100 miles out in the desert, there was a thunderous explosion.

The next day, a rancher stumbled across wreckage and called in the authorities. U.S. Air Force Major Jesse Marcel arrived, but

was mystified. "There was foil which couldn't be torn or even dented," he reported.

"There were sheets of hard stuff like plastic, only it wasn't plastic. And rigid rubbery stuff that wasn't like anything I can describe."

Bodies

But, just as the two local radio stations were broadcasting this astounding news, they received an order from Washington to cease transmission "for national security reasons".

Meanwhile, 200 miles away, on the remote San Agustin Plain, engineer Barney Barnett and a group of archaeology students were trekking towards a huge metal object. It was the craft's

cockpit, and inside were the bodies of four aliens.

Barnett claims: "The heads were big, round and bald. The eyes were small and oddly spaced."

"They were between three and four feet tall, with long fingers. You could see they weren't human."

The military's official photographic record of the discovery was made by Nicholas Van Poppen, who took hundreds of still pictures and several reels of cine film.

He was made to hand over every frame to intelligence experts and warned never to reveal what he had seen.

But he says: "Three of the aliens had been badly mutilated in the crash — but the fourth

was unmarked. I filmed the post mortem, when doctors tried to see how they differed biologically from humans, but I never knew their findings."

Van Poppen's film is now in Spielberg's possession and it will be the centrepiece of his movie.

Damaged

Some of the UFO wreckage was taken to an air base in Ohio, but although most of it was stored under armed guard in Hangar 84 at Roswell.

Even today, Hangar 84 is guarded and sealed.

The damaged bodies were cremated, according to another eyewitness, but the fourth was flown to a hush-hush UFO research museum on the outskirts of Los Angeles.

It is still there, kept in a refrigerator, and known as The Man From Nowhere.

Experts probe new UFO sightings

CLOSE encounters of the mystery kind have happened in Chester, Helsby and Eastham, say UFO experts.

They say about 30 further sightings of a hovering cigar-shaped object have taken place since initial reports came in last week.

Eye witness accounts suggest the unexplained craft was in the skies over the area for a four-day period and people who spot it are being urged to get in touch with a group investigating the incidents.

Philip Mantle, of the British UFO Research Association, said a stream of details had come in from eagle-eyed householders since we reported the original sightings over the Boughton Heath and Wirral areas.

He said people coming forward with further descriptions of the craft included a resident in Chapel Lane, Boughton, a Helsby villager and a youngster from Eastham.

'The reports of a strange cigar-shaped object are still coming in and are consistent with the information we received last week,' he said.

'We have also had similar sightings in the Wrexham area and the reports are continuing to come in slowly but surely,' Mr Mantle added.

'We have had about 30 reports, all from around the same time, although there will be more than 30 people involved as some were with relatives or friends.

'There is a chance the sightings will not be explained but we are keeping an open mind,' he said.

Mr Mantle added that witness reports are now being examined and air bases are being contacted as the investigation continues.

More UFO sightings reported

EXPERTS are being called in to investigate some close encounters of the Scarborough kind after another spate of UFO sightings in the region.

Close encounters of the North kind

THE North-East is at the centre of a wave of UFO sightings, according to excited investigators of the paranormal.

She was moved to speak out after reading about other UFO sightings in North Yorkshire.

but three. Now experts at the British UFO Research Association have been asked to investigate the sightings.

Spokeswoman Gloria Dixon said: "The latest Darlington sighting has real potential. It certainly doesn't sound like an aircraft or natural phenomenon."

A spokesman at Teesside Airport air traffic control said he had no idea what was in the area at the time.

"We close down at 10 o'clock so I haven't the faintest what this may or may not have been. It certainly wasn't one of ours."

RAF Leeming could throw no light on the mystery. A spokesman said military flights may have been in the area but they would not have been hovering for half an hour.

TOP UFO experts are probing claims that unidentified flying objects were spotted over Ugglebarnby last week by a resident.

The woman, who does not want to be named, said she saw three bright lights just after 10pm on Tuesday night.

"My daughter called me upstairs to look at the lights which were in a row and stationary," she said.

"There was no noise and we watched them for nearly five minutes before they moved off slowly in a line towards the moors in the direction of Blue Bank," the woman added.

The reported sighting comes as several other people have claimed to see three bright

lights in the Scarborough and Ryedale areas in the last week.

One of those was on the Wednesday morning after the Ugglebarnby sighting by four men who saw the lights heading towards Pickering.



They say there is a chance the cigar-shaped object could prove to be from another world.

Ministry of Defence officials based at national headquarters in West Drayton say the craft, initially spotted over Boughton Heath, did not show up on their screens.

Christleton High School pupil Adam Clayton, of Littleton, was among the people who saw the mystery object looming in the sky over Chester.

'I was going to my friend's house in Huntington when I saw it coming over from the Saughton area,' he said.

'It was oval-shaped like a rugby ball with pads of some sort, was bigger than a car and came quite close to the ground. It must have been about 200 feet up.

'It came towards me very slowly and was there for about 60 seconds before going off towards Boughton Heath in the direction of Sainsbury's,' said Adam.

'I would say it was something out of the ordinary as there was no noise coming from it, which indicated to me that it was not an aircraft.'

Police later notified the West Drayton authorities of a large object with seven different-coloured bars across it.

Research Association

Inspector Andrew Horne, of Chester police, said a report had come in of the object being in a stationary position for about 10 minutes over Boughton Heath.

British UFO Research Association spokesman Philip Mantle said a dozen separate sightings had come in of an unknown craft hovering over the Chester areas since it was first spotted on Sunday night last week.

'There is a 95 per cent chance the sightings will be explained but there is also a five per cent chance they will not,' he said.

'It was speculated at first that it was a weather balloon or hot air balloon but it was too thin in shape for that. It was also seen at night, at a time when balloons are not supposed to be flying,' he said.

UFOs — fact or fiction?

Group to keep eye on the sky

A GROUP has been set up to investigate a spate of UFO sightings on the Lincolnshire coast.

Since last May, there have been more than 20 eyewitness reports of glowing objects or flashing lights, particularly in the Mablethorpe area.

Now Peter Gregory, (54) of Somersby Avenue in the resort, has established a group called Skywatch, to collate and analyse the information.

He says he has filmed one of the flying objects on video.

"We're not cranks and we're not saying these are visitations from little green men from Mars," he said.

However, there is definitely some unexplained activity which needs proper researching.

Mr Gregory believes the craft may be using the coast as a flight path, with the red lights on the BT mast at Truethorpe providing a useful beacon.

There is also a theory that UFOs may be linked to a phenomenon 17 miles away in Louth, where several householders reported that their TVs had suddenly switched channel for no apparent reason.

Dear Section 40,

Many thanks for your D/Sec(AS)12/3 of 5 January and for the material enclosed with it. I have also seen your letter of the same date to Section 40 as well as the very forthcoming summaries of UFO reports which you released to a number of ufologists last year. Things have certainly changed since my day ! (And for the better, I think.)

As I was the source of Tim's story that a few RAF gun-camera films of unidentified aerial objects were extant in my day, I owe it 'for the record' to enlarge a little on what I told him. This is also the opportunity to explain why I and colleagues in the MOD in the late-60s and early-70s took a fairly unhelpful stance in response to enquiries from UFO groups.

In 1952, when I was the PS to the then VCAS (ACM Sir Ralph Cochrane) news reached him of the remarkable UFO events over Washington, DC, which had occurred in the July of that year. Cochrane was interested; so was the then PM (Winston Churchill). The then Scientific adviser to the Air Ministry (Robert Cockburn) was instructed to make enquiries. Cockburn's report convinced Cochrane that it was 'all American hysteria', though he naturally wouldn't have put it in quite these terms in public. The PM was advised that there was nothing in the 'UFO nonsense'. No further official notice was taken of the subject within the Air Ministry. I think it was clear to the Air Staff and to their civil service colleagues from that time on that their seniors would be unlikely to welcome the devotion of any staff effort to the subject. (There was plenty else to be getting on with, for example the cold war.)

The Bentwaters/Lakenheath events of August 1956, the events at West Freugh in the following year, and other subsequent events which will doubtless be coming into the Public Record Office as time passes, suggested to some of us that a 'UFO phenomenon' of some kind or other certainly existed. But there were never solid grounds for regarding it as a Defence threat or as justifying official steps such as the establishment of a standing committee of enquiry. The subject remained something of a joke (albeit an uneasy one on occasion).

After 1952 I moved to other jobs within the Air Ministry (and subsequently the amalgamated MOD) which did not involve daily contacts with the Air Staff. It was not until early 1969 that I resumed such contacts on taking charge of the then DS8 (whose ambit was, I think, very similar to

that of the present AS.2). I found - without enthusiasm - that DS8 were charged, among their many other jobs, with the responsibility of responding to the public (including, of course, UFO groups) on unidentified objects which had been seen in the sky. I had no indication from any source in the MOD that the topic should be taken seriously: I saw our remit as being to respond courteously (even if sometimes wearily) to reports reaching us from the public and to pass on to the Air Staff the one or two which sounded as if they might have been an inadvertent Russian breach of our air space or a bit of uncovenanted low flying. Among those discharging this thankless chore in DS8 was **Section 40**, occupying a post which sounds very similar to your own. (I forget the names of his successors.) We were, I'm afraid, deliberately churlish in responding to UFO groups: the last thing I wanted was to encourage them! I foresaw the likely generation of an on-going correspondence which I felt would be a diversion of effort from other essential tasks. DS8 may, in consequence, have looked to the outside world as though it had something to hide. Your present policy strikes me as being better judged.

It is worth remembering, however, that the Condon Report had only recently been published in America. Few, if any of us, had had time to glance at more than its covering conclusions; the latter were entirely dismissive of the phenomenon. It was years before I discovered - after retirement, indeed - that Condon had accumulated a mass of very interesting material which seemed to indicate the persistence of a strange but well-evidenced phenomenon. As I saw it at the time, we had good justification for the 'courteous brush-off' stance which represented DS8's policy.

At some stage during 1970 (I have no note of the precise date) a small party of us were invited by (I think) the then D. of Ops (AD) to view some photographic material in the sub-ground cinema during the lunch break. He mentioned 'interesting atmospheric effects'. I attended as Head of DS8; half a dozen members of the Air Staff were present (not above Group Captain level); and there were a few others, including somebody from the Met. Office. The gathering was in no sense a formally constituted one: it appeared to have been arranged at private initiative by Ops (AD). We were shown some slides, purportedly from aerial photographs taken by air crew. The highlight was a couple of brief clips of what I understood to be gun-camera material obtained as far back as 1956. The Bentwaters/Lakenheath events were mentioned. The material was, on the whole, unimpressive: fuzzy greyish blobs in the daylight shots; small glowing globular objects in the night films. We were invited to comment. A civilian - the Met. Office man, I think - suggested that we were witnessing unusual meteorological events. One of the Ops. people said that ground-radar and air-radar responses had been reported on occasion. Somebody reminded us of the tendency of radar to produce spurious images on occasion. No conclusions were reached.

I was subsequently taken up with frenetic jobs deriving from the Mintoff/Malta 'crisis'. I did not follow up the material which had been shown to us except to the extent of a casual conversation with Ops (AD) many months later. We made some joke about UFOs.

Reflecting on this episode, I now rather feel that somebody in Ops (AD) had become uneasy about the occasional reports from air crew of unusual aerial objects but did not wish to expose himself to ridicule. The small informal gathering in the cinema was an opportunity to test the reactions of a few of us to the unusual objects caught on film. The lack of much response from any of us probably persuaded Ops (AD) to drop the subject. Quite possibly, the photographic material was simply scrapped, or 'pinched'

for somebody's private collection of *curiosa*, or conceivably passed to the Met. Office.

I rather regret that my retailing of this story to **Section 40** indirectly put you to the trouble of the enquiries you have been making. The material was not very impressive - less so, indeed, than the extant photographs from, for example, the Hessdalen Valley in Norway of unusual aerial objects or the astonishing account given us by Dr. Harley Rutledge of his studies of 'lights' in the Ozarks in America (*Project Identification*, Prentice-Hall, 1981). The evidence for the persistence of an odd phenomenon (occasionally with very strange effects) is abundant in the serious ufological literature. Collateral from RAF sources would be very useful, though mainly by way of lending 'respectability' to the subject. (The material I recall seeing in 1970 would not, in itself, have added much, if anything, of scientific value to the mass of evidence already obtained by the ufological groups before and since that time.)

That said, I can't help feeling that there must be at least a scattering of good photographic material of unusual aerial objects obtained by the RAF over the years, perhaps backed by radar evidence. This could be of scientific value if released for outside study. Moreover, as I've suggested above, the mere fact that a government department was known to be adopting a non-dismissive attitude to these unusual phenomena might assist in getting the resources for serious research (eg. in the universities) which the ufological groups are unlikely to succeed in obtaining for themselves.

In the meantime, AS.2's willingness to release information about reports received from the public (poor though those reports tend to be) is a welcome advance. I hope this remains MOD policy.

I have from time to time, in response to requests made by colleagues in the ufological groups, placed on record my own perception of the subject as an ex-MOD official. You may like to have the enclosed offprints.

I hope you will be able to give some thought to the possibility of releasing material obtained from RAF sources (though I would be the first to understand the likely official objections!). If you would like to chat informally about the subject at any time, I would be very glad to meet you.

I'm copying this letter to **Section 40** and also to two colleagues who have long taken a responsible interest in the UFO phenomenon - **Section 40** and **Section 40**.

Ralph Noyes Speaks

Editors note: When Dave Clarke & myself were putting together Phantoms of the Sky in 1989 we asked Ralph Noyes to answer sundry questions which we thought were germane to the topic of UFOs, the government & the Rendlesham case. Our publishers cut out about 90% of the material Ralph kindly supplied us with so we are printing it in full here. Although Ralph has made great contributions to the UK UFO community over the years there is still a great deal of suspicion about him because of his previously held position. I have had several ufologists, some of them well-known and published, who have seriously confided in me that they think Ralph is a government 'mole' working to subvert ufology! "Above Top Secret" or "Just Doing His Job"? This is what Ralph has to say. Make your own mind up.

Who?

I reached a fairly senior grade in the MOD and had access to whatever documents were necessary to my responsibilities. These included TOP SECRET material generally, as well as many other papers of a still more restricted character (eg. operational orders specifying how and when the Prime Minister would be advised to consider the British response to a nuclear threat to this country.)

But I'm also perfectly clear that much else was going on in the MOD which I didn't know about because it wasn't relevant to the jobs I was doing: for example, I remained as ignorant as the rest of us about that "anthrax island" in the Hebrides which my colleagues in the Navy Department successfully kept under wraps for about four decades until 1988! (I simply didn't "need to know" about that unpalatable episode for the sake of my own work in the Air Force Department; and nobody - quite rightly - ever told me.) If somebody above me had wished to conceal from me that the British or other governments were in touch with extraterrestrials, they could certainly have done so. But I'm pretty sure that I would have got some intimation of this, even if concern for my career prospects might have persuaded me not to enquire further! But I never had the faintest whiff of any such thing.

More important than my own testimony, however, is the fact that Admiral of the Fleet the Lord Hill-Norton, who was the Chief of the Defence Staff from 1971 to 1973, never had the smallest indication of ET contact. He was the Defence 'supremo'; nothing of Defence significance would have been kept from him; I'm clear from several discussions with him that he knew nothing of any extraterrestrial approach up to the date of his retirement in the mid-1970s. Those who still wish to disbelieve me or Lord Hill-Norton (on the grounds that we are either deceitful or ignorant - or perhaps merely incompetent!) will have to consider how the supposed "ET faithfuls" in Whitehall have managed (for four decades?) to secure government funds, Whitehall office space, telephones, secretaries, waste-paper baskets and total secrecy without so much as a word to the rest of us or any difficulty with the Comptroller and Auditor General, who keeps Whitehall accountable for every penny spent.

Intrusions?

In the several capacities which brought me into touch with UFO reports during my 28 years in the MOD I encountered several reports, particularly those from military establishments, which indicated "high strangeness". I, and military colleagues, had little doubt that

Common knowledge for years!

something had taken place for which we had no explanation. The classic instance is Bentwaters/Lakenheath in 1956 (and other cases are entering the public domain as files are released under the 30 years' rule). Not once, however, was there the faintest suggestion that extraterrestrials might be in question. We suspected the Russians...We suspected faulty radar...We wondered whether RAF personnel might be succumbing to hallucinogens...We found no evidence of any such things...In the end (and fairly swiftly) we simply forgot these uncomfortable 'intrusions' as rapidly as fire brigades forget apparent cases of SHC and local Councils forget the complaints of their tenants about poltergeist occurrences.

We never had the smallest evidence that Brothers from Space were responsible for our transient unease - and I do believe that we would have picked up anything of that kind, given our highly effective radar cover and the incessant watch kept on radio communications by GCHQ and NSA.

Cover - Up ?

The immediate recipients of reports of any disturbing phenomena in British airspace were always the Air Staff - the Royal Air Force officers who lived on the same MOD corridor as myself. They would have shouted very loudly to me - as the civilian colleague able to get them the ear of Ministers and/or necessary funds - if they had detected anything needing funds or Cabinet backing. They never did. My impression is that unexplained reports were passed to scientific colleagues (especially the Meteorological Office) when ~~the~~ the Air Staff had dismissed them as being of "no Defence interest".

If "good reports" were being kept from me (however you define "good"), the Air Staff were - quite unwontedly - missing the opportunity which only I and my Division could offer them of grabbing a bigger slice of the Defence Budget for the RAF (eg. for research and/or defensive measures against Space Invaders). If Defence Intelligence - D.I.55 is the currently fashionable name - are doing some cloak and dagger job on ETs, I wish them well; but it doesn't yet seem to have been reflected in hardware budgets for any of the Services.

Misinformation?

I can't imagine that any government department, however ill-intentioned, would be so silly as to conduct a propaganda campaign about "UFOs", however covert.

Let's suppose that the MOD and the Pentagon really do have evidence of extraterrestrial visitation, perhaps even to the point of hiding saucers and little space-folk at some military establishment. Let's suppose that they're desperately worried about all those anonymous chaps who keep ringing Len Stringfield and/or appearing on TV with funny voices. Let's suppose that they want to keep the rest of us in ignorance. Would they really take the risk of putting "disinformation" into the public domain? Would they succeed if they tried? Things may have changed since my own days in Whitehall; but when I or my colleagues (with Ministerial approval) felt it necessary to conceal something, we simply clammed up and stone-walled. We would never have been so stupid as to engage in active lying. Quite apart from questions of morality (which certainly operated in my own time), no competent official would have taken the risk of being detected! It was simpler and safer to keep quiet.

Rendlesham

There is no doubt at all that the MOD played a thoroughly dishonest game over the Rendlesham affair. I have already put some of my reasons on record in the afterword to my SF novel A SECRET PROPERTY, and in a paper, UFO LANDS IN SUFFOLK.., printed in Timothy Good's UFO ANNUAL 1990 (Sidgwick & Jackson, 1989). We know - the responsible Minister even admitted as much in the British House of Commons after more than two years prevarication - that the MOD received an astonishing report in 1981 from a responsible USAF officer (Lt. Col., now Brigadier General, Charles I. Halt) of very weird phenomena which (as he believed, and seemed in part to have witnessed) had taken place in the vicinity of a major military establishment in the U.K. in December 1980. The MOD had flatly denied the existence of this report in response to enquiries put to them in 1981 and 1982. We would probably still be faced with this bland denial but for the action taken by American citizens under the US Freedom of Information Act in 1983. In response to enquiries made to the USAF by CAUS (Citizens Against UFO Secrecy) the USAF obtained a copy of Halt's report from the MOD and released it into the public domain in mid-1983.

The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

The case itself is complex. I have given my own views about it in the papers mentioned above - essentially that Halt and several others came face to face with a striking manifestation of the "UF phenomenon" (whatever that may be) in the December of 1980. Other commentators may disagree; alternative theories abound. My only immediate point is that the MOD have resisted all attempts to obtain a sensible statement, even under sustained pressure to the Defence Secretary from Lord Hill-Norton. Why...? Simply, I think, because it embarrasses them. Either they must admit that a senior USAF officer at a highly sensitive base in the U.K. went out of his mind in December 1980 (with unthinkable potential consequences in defence terms) or they must acknowledge publicly that weird things occur for which no explanation is at present possible. Can we be surprised that they stalled and cheated? I would have done the same had I had the ill luck to be in post at the relevant time! (Let others among you who are without sin cast the first stone).

The Rendlesham incidents remain open to debate. I will merely add that they could not possibly have been a mere military misfortune, e.g. the loss or crash in Rendlesham Forest of a bit of troublesome hardware. I have given my reasons more fully in the papers mentioned above. Perhaps I may be forgiven if, in this paper, I merely summarize my conclusion by the assertion (based on hard MOD experience) that major military mishaps can't be concealed, anyway in this country, at

that not even the stupidest of officials would attempt concealment by seeking to over-excite local ufologists.

There was never, in my day, a deliberate policy of concealment or a deliberate plan of obfuscation. We received hundreds of reports from the public of unidentified sightings - just as I receive, today, from a cuttings service to which I subscribe, hundreds of similarly vague reports of things seen in the sky (if I may parody) worthy citizens who have seen something on the outskirts of Wigan while walking the dog. I and my staff dealt as courteously as we could with these well-intentioned communications - and we invariably considered (often with a sigh) whether they just possibly reflected some Russian breach of the "rules of the game". They never did...Only very occasionally (and usually from Defence establishments) did we receive anything definite eg. from Bentwaters/Lakenheath in 1956 and from RAF West Freugh in 1957. And they also, alas, never provided solid evidence which Defence scientists could get to grips with. They never happened twice at the same place; they never did us perceptible damage; we never had the faintest idea of what had occurred; we were very glad that the public never got to hear of them; we would have stone-walled like crazy if Parliamentary Questions had ever been asked.

What Next?

It is only since I left the MOD (in 1977) that I have seriously tried to consider what may possibly lie behind the "UFO phenomenon". It was impossible to discuss it seriously within the Department: I would merely have "rubbished" my working relationship with the RAF and scientific colleagues if I had disclosed the interest I felt in the better reports which reached us. What I retain from my MOD experience - greatly reinforced by much that I have since read - is that the "phenomenon" is veridical and important, and that the expert methodology developed over the past century by scholarly people in the field of the so-called "paranormal" may possibly be relevant. I wouldn't put it higher than that at present. I can't even define "paranormal" to my own satisfaction! All I can be quite sure of is that we, in ufology, are dealing with transient and somewhat insubstantial events of a bizarre character, and that we are not alone in doing so. I think they matter. I also think that we and the "parapsychologists" might have some useful exchanges.

URFO - IS THERE A DEFENCE CONNECTION ?
 Note by Ralph Noyes

In view of my service in the British Ministry of Defence for twenty-eight years (ending in 1977), I am very frequently asked what the official position is on the URFO problem, particularly whether there is a deliberate policy of government concealment or 'disinformation'. This note has been prepared for the convenience of correspondents and to save the Labour of repetition.

I have lectured on the topic of supposed government involvement from time to time and published articles in several outlets. A selection of these papers is attached. My present views about the supposed 'Defence connection' remain unchanged - in brief that there is probably a degree of official interest in (and perhaps some systematic study of) the URFO phenomenon, but that it continues to baffle the authorities quite as much as it baffles ufologists. This is, of course, a personal view expressed without any kind of official authority and recorded fifteen years after I retired from the Ministry of Defence.

My personal speculations about the URFO enigma have been placed on record several times. If correspondents are interested, they may care to refer to the following in particular.



**THE MAJESTICAL
 MYSTERY TOUR**

Timothy Good has done us a public service in giving us a facsimile reproduction of that great wealth of documents in the Appendix to ABOVE TOP SECRET (referred to as ATSt) - the remainder of this article). Large and exclusive ufologists, of whom I am one, can now study at a little closer to first hand some of the famous and infamous bits of paper which have enriched and littered ufology in the past four decades but which many of us only know by repute or selective quotation.

He has exposed his evidence, and this is the scientific way of carrying on. He must welcome, and will doubtless challenge, the kind of critical challenge on provenance and authenticity presented by Dennis Stacy, and he will certainly have foreseen some vigorous his evidence is not only accurate but also sustains his preferred hypothesis of extraterrestrial visitation.

Anyway, we now have a number of documents before us. And not only the Majestic two which Good gives us (pp. 541-547 of ATSt) and the Majestic third, the 'Garter memorandum' of 13 July 1954, reportedly picked up by happenstance in the US National Archives in 1967, but also a wealth of other papers. If Majestic, or *mirabile dictu*, becomes the judgement of the ETH by the only source which could now satisfy us, the President of the United States or officials speaking with his authority, our perplexities of the past forty years will be at an end (together with the productive occupation of many ingenious minds we value). But if -- as I feel convinced, for the reasons given below -- the Majestic papers merely take their place among such kindred tales of Zion, or maintain a tenuous link of the 'Majestic document' (like so much else in ufology) as objects of interest, I have no doubt that our papers of great significance and almost certain authenticity.

I can vouch for one of them myself -- a signal sent on 19 September 1952 to a NATO Command (and repeated to the then Air Ministry) about a minor and not particularly dramatic and sibling of what came to be known as the 'Majestic' 'daylight disc' (p. 486 of ATSt). I received a copy of this signal as the Private Cater of the Air Staff.

I mention this minor piece of the paper partly for the implication it bears, but mainly for the way of presenting my credentials for the 'Majestic document' of the 'Majestic document' which I wish to refer later in the Vang Commander if in charge of Ops (Air Defence) I.

above all (and second only to the Chief of the Air Staff) had prime responsibility for all operations, including air defence, and a major say in the conduct of scientific research in these matters and the intelligence assessment of enemy capabilities.

The job of private secretary to a senior member of a government department was, and I imagine still is, given to a "cadet" entrants to the Civil Service who are expected to reach higher office themselves in due time. It gives them early familiarity with the conduct of major business at a stage at which they are still learning their trade. The job cannot be done (and the young man or woman would rapidly be posted elsewhere if he/she didn't act accordingly) without access to, and intimate daily knowledge of, the entire range of the business of the office. No telephone call, no scribbler message, no letter, report, loose minute, signal or other paper, and no visitor entered or left Sir Ralph Cochrane's office without my knowledge. I kept the records of most of his meetings with staff and colleagues, and I drafted for him, under his direction, all of the papers which he took the responsibility of issuing within the Air Ministry or outside it. I therefore feel confident in making the following assertion: all of which derive from this, and which are in fact a period of my Civil Service career.

No nod or wink...

1. In the 1950s (though I suspect that this may now be seen true following recent security hiccups of the last few years) our links with the Americans were uniquely close among other European allies -- in the sharing of military intelligence, the assessment of enemy capabilities, technical research and development, joint planning and the training of facilities in British territory to an extent and in a manner which was unique in NATO (in the Point Induced of somewhat disturbingly spindly command staff members of the House of Commons).

Cochrane, in particular, kept up a close relationship, official and personal, with two key military figures in the American hierarchy who are now said to have been members of the M-12 group: General Hoyt Vandenberg (pp. 252 and 342 of TMS), frequently transcribed during visits to the United States, setting in train major bits of Air Staff planning and liaison on his return. It is inconceivable that he would not have been told -- at the very least by a wink and a nod from Vandenberg, or Tindal or, far more probably, by the offer of some, albeit token, British association with M-12 -- of the extraordinary event of a captured piece of extraterrestrial hardware, with all its potential implications for defence.

2. I am equally clear that I could not have failed, as Cochrane's PS, to get some whiff of the thing myself. It is conceivable that I might, for once, have been excluded from the details of a matter of such extreme sensitivity and importance, but I could not have failed to be aware (because I would have had to make the arrangements) of the urgent briefing meetings which Cochrane would certainly have sought with the Chief of the Air Staff and the Secretary of State for Air (not to mention the Prime Minister), the urgent instructions which Cochrane would have had to issue to senior members of the Air Staff, and the setting-up of at least some small study group. There was nothing of this sort at any time.

3. Cochrane was in fact impatient and sceptical about my period of service before him (i.e. before 1950) and he had like many others (the United States Air Force (the FBI, the CIA) considered the possibility that the "discs" were a piece of enemy hardware. By the time I knew him he had dismissed this hypothesis. And, like Vandenberg, he had no patience at all for the theory of extraterrestrial visitation.

4. I only once saw him disturbed by the "saucer question". The Washington "Times" of July 1952 interested him greatly, as they interested many of us at the time, including the then Prime Minister, Winston Churchill. Cochrane put some enquiries in hand through the Chief Scientist to the Air Ministry, Robert Cockburn, who in turn, I think, discussed the matter with the Government Chief Scientist, Lord Cherwell. The only comment which ever came back to Cochrane, following enquiries in the US, referred to "American public hysteria".

5. My argument, in short, is that anything so sensational and defence-laden as a Presidential approved study of a crashed extraterrestrial vehicle, conducted by a group which included two very close military colleagues of Cochrane's, Vandenberg and Tindal, would have become known to him in the then state of Anglo-American relations. But we got no whiff... And I think this is strong evidence against the existence of any Rosicrucian group in the United States with the terms of reference indicated on p. 542 of TMS.

6. It is some collateral for this view that the Air Staff, in 1950 to 1952, were taking only the most perfunctory (and embarrassed) cognizance of "saucer stories". The signal of 19 September 1952 which I have already mentioned carries the casual instruction from the VANG Commander in charge of Ops (AD) i. "ask PA (viz. my Personal Assistant...). Clearly no folder still less an official file had yet been opened by the Operations staff on flying saucers. Whether or not this was a dereliction of duty I leave to others.

7. It is no rejoinder to these points to say, as I have sometimes heard EIH fantasists declare, that perhaps some tiny, inner, amazingly secret group of M-12 members were conducting their own research circles but without telling Ministers or senior military officers. Perhaps there was such a group... Perhaps there

The argument about Majestic is not about some arcane, back-room group of dedicated boffins who are bearing, in lonely isolation, their terrifying knowledge of extraterrestrial intervention in human affairs.

8. I did not believe that the UFO phenomenon, that unassailable residue of human experience, contained something both real and potentially important. Here are some pointers.

9. I am convinced that there is a degree of official "finess" in the responses which the MOD gives to enquiries from the public. This may be no more than a weary self-defence against what is possibly seen as eccentricity on the part of persistent enquirers. (I was sometimes, myself, driven to polite evasion... in response to, for example, to members offering us exclusive rights in perpetual motion devices or in lighter-than-air materials which could be expected to repel gravity.) But I think I detect something far more. Some of the evidence for this view is given on pp. 68 and 67 of TMS and in the afterword to TMS. It looks like a piece of fiction published in 1985. It looks to me as though THEY are aiding something -- though it may be no more than encouragement -- which should encourage the bewildered rest of us.

10. I am also quite prepared to believe, with the editors of Quest, that some sightings of strange objects are the outcome of defence activities themselves -- perhaps of an even weirder character than the fertile Quest imagination supposes.

11. But none of this gives any support to the EIH or to M-12. Quite the contrary. If governments really had tangible evidence of extraterrestrial visitations dating from 40 years ago, officials would hardly be setting their time in questioning members of the public about whether an unidentified sighting had occurred in the vicinity of "deserted" lake or dam sites, or marsh, river, bight or other "natural" features. (See, for example, the "Chalmers" etc., etc. (p. 424 of TMS).)

12. It is not stand or fall with the

After I left the WCA's office my career brought me in touch from time to time with UFO questions. There is little to add to the information Timothy Good, and which he records in TMS, for this is the right place in which to defend the relative lack of excitement in the MOD during the 1950s, the 1960s and the 1970s (up to my own retirement in 1977) about a range of phenomena which has often greatly over-excited others.

I think there are good reasons for this neglect, and I believe they tell us something about the real nature of the phenomenon itself. At a convenient moment I shall be glad to deploy my reasoning in full. In the meantime, if any 'denial' is needed of the past 'fraction' of the Ministry of Defence, I believe that even Lord Hill-Torton, Chief of the Defence Staff in the early 1970s, would be the first to agree that he stands in the same white sheet as others who were serving at that time.

After so much scepticism I owe myself and Majestic at least the frisson of some tentative belief. I would not be troubling to cast my pennyworth of doubt into the current debate about the Majestic papers, if I did not stand or fall with the

For should utology cease if the M-12 papers turn out to be a chimera. We shall be left with a very persistent range of strange occurrences which even the MOD now shows signs of uneasily recognizing. And, thanks to Timothy Good, we now have the facilities of a number of interesting documents, some of which have a look of authenticity, and a few of which suggest different interpretations from those we have become accustomed to.

For example, a careful reading of that remarkable Canadian memorandum prepared in November 1950 by Vilbert Smith (pp. 460-462 of TMS) does not suggest to me that it provides any evidence at all for the existence of crashed saucers. What it does do is to give further support to the evidence provided by Good and others for keen American interest in, and alarm about, the saucer state of that era. And it contains one sentence of great interest: "...the United States authorities are investigating along quite a number of lines which might possibly be related to mental phenomena..."

The implications are worth considering. Quite a number of lines suggests a baffled look at several guesses about the nature of a disturbing phenomenon: it does not suggest an enquiry into these known facts of a crashed vehicle, and mental phenomena, which at least a nerve or two of my own with the intimation that some Americans had already, by 1950, detected a weirdness in UFO events which was unlikely to yield to treatment by the established physical sciences.

It is along that path that I suspect we should now be treading, of rather than in pursuit of anything so down-to-earth as a grounded saucer. As Marcelus says of Horatio's somewhat heavy-handed approach to the ghost of Hamlet's father, "we do it wrong, being so majestic".



STRANGE lights appearing in the skies above Nottingham can only mean one thing — the city is in one big FLAP.

The unusual lights and mysterious objects are baffling experts and authorities but UFO-watchers say Nottingham is suffering from a spate of UFO activity — known as a FLAP.

More than 30 sightings have been recorded in recent months.

Fresh reports range from Bulwell to Basford and have come from more than a dozen independent sources.

The Ministry of Defence denies any military activity and East Midlands International Airport claims there have been no unusual aircraft movements.

The latest batch of baffled Notts sky-watchers all describe the alien vision as a series of three white lights and two red.

No noise accompanies the sudden appearance of the lights which seem, according to some eye-witnesses, to be hanging in the sky.

Jonathon Bloomfield, 15, of Cheltenham Street, Old Basford, and his

friend Shane Barratt, 13, of Midlame Gardens, Bulwell, claimed to have seen a glowing object in the city's skies regularly since Friday.

And on Wednesday evening they caught sight of the it again.

"We were outside with the telescope looking at stars and trying to find Saturn when we saw this glowing object. The next minute it was gone out of sight," said Shane.

Their story was confirmed by Shane's grandmother Mary Swift, 55, of Corben Gardens, Bulwell, who claimed that she saw a similar object last Wednesday.

"I cannot be sure what I saw — I know I saw lights in the sky and I know it was not an aeroplane," she said.

The object was also spotted above Daybrook at around the same time as it was seen hovering over Basford.

Lynne Walton, 39, of Chatsworth Avenue, Carlton, saw the spherical object twice that night — once in Daybrook and an hour later as she drove into Holbrook, Derbyshire.

"It was just hanging there like it was on a piece of string. It had three white lights and two red ones," she said.

"I have always kept an open mind but I have never seen anything like that in my life."

Investigator Tony James of the East Midlands UFO Research Association said that the latest sightings matched descriptions of craft seen over Arnold in August, Mansfield in November and Arnold again last weekend.

He said the organisation had checked with stockists of high-powered laser equipment and had ruled out any chance of pranksters.



say it was an aircraft, but it seems strange because they had their lights on as if they were flying from north to south."

Three Huntingdon teenagers, Steffan Head, Matthew Crawley and Scott Burrows, spotted two bright, slow moving lights whilst standing in Kent Road on the Oxmoor estate.

Steffan said they were convinced that they were moving together and part of something bigger.

He added: "I jokingly said that maybe it was a UFO - but my mates said no way. I must say it was a bit strange."

Georgina Hale, of Ramsey, said she saw a very bright shooting star that night as she travelled from St Ives to Wyton.

"It was," she said. "the most beautiful sight I've ever seen. I've seen a few before, but nothing like this."

But a more down-to-earth explanation comes from Ted Fleming, of Great Ouse Kite Flyers, who told our reporter that it was not unusual for kite enthusiasts to fly the kites at night with lights. He commented: The size of the lights can vary and the angle of view can change."

Craft could be from another world

UFO experts are investigating a string of eye witness accounts of a mystery craft spotted hovering over Chester and Wirral.

They say there is a chance the cigar-shaped object could prove to be from another world.



Workmates baffled by mystery object in sky

THREE colleagues at a Scarborough garage had a close encounter of the distinctly unnerving kind when they spotted a strange flying object hovering over the town.

All three were in different places when they spotted an intensely bright light, the likes of which they'd never seen before.

And it was only later in the morning, when one of them plucked up the courage to mention his strange experience to his colleagues, that all three realised they'd seen the same thing.

Mark Beckett, 30, a mechanic at Stadium Garage, Seamer Road, was a UFO sceptic until yesterday morning when he was driving over Oliver's Mount and saw something strange in the

sky in the direction of the football ground.

"It was a very, very bright light," he said. "I just couldn't take my eyes off it.

"It sounds ridiculous, but I'd never seen anything like it in my life before."

Mr Beckett, of Martongate, Bridlington, lost sight of the rectangular-shaped white light for a moment when trees obscured his view, and when he looked again it had gone.

He was so baffled that he drove to the Boro ground to check that he hadn't just seen floodlights.

"But the floodlights were nowhere near the shape, it couldn't have been them," he said.

When he got to work he mentioned his strange experience to his colleagues, and to his amazement he found that two of them had seen the light as well.

Mind-boggling

Forecourt cashier Nigel Hoigate, 31, of Hovingham Drive, Scarborough, was already at work when he saw the strange light.

"I saw a circle of light above the trees coming from the Jacob's Mount area," he said. "I saw it rise and then disappear. About five minutes later the same circle of light reappeared in a different

area, moved around and disappeared... again."

And 10 minutes later, the same thing happened. "I'm not saying it was a flying saucer, I'm just saying what I saw and it was certainly weird," he said. "The mind boggles."


Another colleague had been driving over Gladstone Road bridge when he spotted a white light in the sky.

The US inaugurated Project Blue Book to review the phenomenon. Eventually, with great public fanfare, it announced that there was nothing of substance to report. However, documents released under the Freedom of Information Act reveal that in spite of an outward scepticism there exists, in reality, an intense private interest by military and Federal organisations in all manner of UFO incidents.

The Russians, now that communism has collapsed, avidly record UFO encounters and government scientists meet regularly to review cases. Alien technology, it is claimed, is the prize they are keen

Exposed: how UK came under 'nuclear attack' from meteors

AMERICAN military satellites have monitored at least three explosions as big as nuclear blasts in the skies above Britain in the past 20 years.

The explosions were natural events, caused by meteors burning up as they hit the atmosphere. They were among 136 explosions observed by US defence satellites around the world between 1975 and 1992, but kept secret until recently because of fears that they might be misinterpreted and by accident trigger a nuclear war.

All the blasts had an explosive yield of more than 1,000 tonnes of TNT, with some considerably larger. American astronomers believe that the satellites probably miss four explosions for every one they detect, so the total number could be up to 40 a year.

According to this month's issue of *Sky & Telescope*, the explosions were detected by

geostationary Pentagon satellites 23,000 miles above the Earth, using infra-red detectors designed to detect the hot exhausts of ballistic missiles. This type of radiation cannot be picked up on Earth because it is absorbed by water vapour in the lower atmosphere.

The explosions are bright but brief, lasting no longer than a couple of seconds. Some are undoubtedly seen on the ground, and reported as fireballs, flashing lights or even UFOs, but until recently no systematic record has been kept of such observations.

The Ministry of Defence is understood to have been briefed about the nature and frequency of the blasts, and some astronomers may also have known. *Sky & Telescope* says that much of the credit for having the observations de-


classified is due to Simon Worden, an astronomer who until recently headed a division of the US Ballistic Missile Defence Organisation, responsible for Star Wars.

Mr Worden says that one of the blasts occurred about 20 miles above the Pacific Ocean on October 1, 1990 — a two-kiloton blast during the period of high tension after Iraq had invaded Kuwait. "Had this occurred over Kuwait it would have been a sticky situation," Mr Worden says. "We could tell it was natural, but they could not."

Why, if the blasts are comparatively common, are they so seldom reported? John Mason, president of the British Astronomical Association, says that unexplained flashes and bursts are reported from time to time, sometimes attributed to flying saucers.

Peter Brown, director of the International Meteor Organisation for North America, says that most of the energy emitted in the blasts is in the infra-red part of the spectrum, which is invisible from Earth. Only recently have attempts been made to collect and correlate fireball reports. In future, he says, his organisation will try to work more closely with military observers to create a more complete record.

The Pentagon figures are of particular interest to astronomers trying to calculate the chances of a large object exploding closer to the Earth with far greater violence, as is now believed to have happened over Siberia in 1908. They suggest that the more apocalyptic scenarios painted by some astronomers may be an exaggeration, but they do not justify complacency.

I am the sort of person who is never happier than when trying to believe eleven impossible things before breakfast. To prove I am flexible as well as daft, I decided to watch the soberly named *International UFO Sensation*, an hour-long documentary buried, but not quite deeply enough, in BBC2's mid-afternoon scheduling on 4 January. At one level it was a marvellously wacky programme. UFOs and their inhabitants are apparently not immune to fashion. Little green men are out and small grey citizens with no ears, no eyebrows and three to four digits per hand are in.

But the Extra Terrestrials were not the stars of the show. I was riveted by the solemn, earnest, glassy-eyed witnesses retelling in monotone their close encounters. Of course, conspiracy theories abounded and they are very contagious. It flicked through my mind that most of the witnesses seemed to have unnecessarily large ears, but I got a grip on myself and addressed the underlying mystery of the programme — the unexplained absence of any real production values. The programme had been bought in, with licence-payers' money. It felt like schools broadcasting — by which I do not mean something made for schoolchildren but something made by the Lower Fourth as an alternative to macrame.

There were some unforgettable moments, however. The subject-matter was more than frivolous. Most of the witnesses were dull but completely plausible. Just occasionally, someone would begin normally enough and then go into orbit. My favourite was a chap who remarked in a throw-away line that — of course — the Third Reich was in cahoots with the Extra Terrestrials. Everything from the fruity to the fairly obvious was seamlessly joined by an invisible transatlantic humanoid. No statements were challenged. Apparently the good ETs have issued warnings against bad ETs but have issued no guidelines about appalling documentaries.

If you cannot get lively television out of alien intelligences poised to take over the world, chopping up American cattle and irradiating everyone they come into contact with, what hope has a Television History Workshop production on the politics of education policy over the last 50 years? Answer — every hope. From Butler to Baker: education for living (BBC2, 4 January) was excellent. The first of a

It seems Euro-MPs were too embarrassed to be seen taking s and aliens seriously. Perhaps they had in mind coverage of one cynical newspaper which said aliens perfectly recognizable: had pointy ears and heads make gibbering noises. Like Euro-MPs," said the respectful tabloid. The parliament's startling is to set up a European centre for sightings of UFOs.

Tullio Regge, an Italian professor and Euro-MP, was put in charge of reporting on the phenomena of unexplained encounters of the third (or any other) kind. His 12 pages of findings were due to be debated this week but suddenly were yanked by a hidden hand from the week's agenda. There is talk of a discussion next month but Euro-MPs are doing what they are famed for: not holding their breath.

Parliament has already noted that: For 50 years there have been constant sightings of UFO and in most cases there are rational explanations which are not usually given. Educated people increasingly believe in UFOs although they are "outside the scope of conventional science".

Sepra (the Service for Assessment of Atmospheric Entry Phenomena), a branch of CNES (National Centre for Space Research in Toulouse), has existed for 10 years and researched UFO sightings in co-operation with the gendarmerie and the French air force.

Sepra should be a "responsible partner" of the EU on the UFO question and should be given funds from EU member states for increased work in investigating UFOs. (No sums are mentioned.)

Among the findings in the professor's report: US Stealth bombers are not responsible for the spate of UFO sightings in Belgium. The theory that aliens have established a base in the asteroid belt cannot be ruled out but no sightings to support the notion have been made.

No-one has ever picked up radio signals indicating the presence of intelligent extraterrestrial aliens.

A considerable percentage of people, including the educated in industrialised countries, believe in the ET theory.

Many sightings are hoaxes or "figments of journalists' fertile imagination".

Professor Regge, being a spoilsport, dismisses the story of a banana-shaped flying saucer landing in Russia on October 9, 1989, when it was reported that 10ft aliens disembarked and exchanged views with locals by telepathy. The professor concludes this is "judicious and unbelievable".

But, he says, the EP should not pass judgment on UFOs. The real danger is not from votes in aliens.

aliens, he says, but from poorly-informed humans.

Some explanations for claimed UFO sightings include sounding balloons and abnormally reflected sunlight on high ice clouds. Sightings so far number about 38,000 but the number considered by Sepra in the past 15 years is only 2300.

If the report is debated next month and the professor's thoughts do not disappear into a black hole, Euro-MPs will be asked to set up a European UFO observation centre to examine sightings.

More likely is that the Regge report will suffer the fate of its subject matter and be taken seriously only by a few cranks. Besides, the Euro-elections are coming up and even in the brave new Europe there are no votes in aliens.

Sergeant Scott Davis, of RAF Alconbury press office, when asked about the possibility of base operations on the night in question said: "There was absolutely no take-offs or landings that night from here. If someone was using the air space we certainly don't know anything about it."

A spokesperson from RAF Wyton confirmed that there was no flying operations from that base that night either.

View of a galaxy 50m years ago

The repaired Hubble telescope looks back to a time when our ancestors were barely monkeys, reports Adrian Berry

A NEW, fascinating vision of the universe was provided yesterday. A cosmic panorama barely glimpsed before was revealed as Nasa released pictures to show that last month's repair of the Hubble Space Telescope had gone perfectly.

The agency showed a picture from the newly repaired telescope of a galaxy, called M100, 50 million light years away, consisting of information that started on its journey to Earth when our ancestors had barely started to resemble monkeys.

It showed tens of billions of stars in amazing clarity, amid huge lanes of gas and dust shining with the luminescence of stars within them. A brilliant blob of light at its centre showed an uncountable number of densely packed stars.

The difference between this picture and an older one of the same galaxy, taken by the telescope before its repair, was striking even to laymen with untrained eyes. The earlier picture had none of the new picture's sharpness and most of the stars appeared to be hidden in fog.

"The trouble with Hubble is over," said Senator Barbara Mikulski, who supervises Nasa's budget.

Astronomers at the annual

meeting of the American Astronomical Society in Washington said the telescope would soon be able to undertake a search for black holes by measuring the speed of stars being sucked into the centres of galaxies.

"The search for black holes is a top priority," said Dr Gary Bower, of the Space Telescope Institute. A black hole is the relic of a collapsed giant star, so heavy that light cannot escape from it and it vanishes from the universe.

Prof Alec Boksenberg, director of Britain's Royal Observatories, who worked for 20 years on the telescope's design, said: "These are stunning pictures.


"What is remarkable is their faint, fine detail, which reveals far more information than can ever be taken from ground-based telescopes.

"The repaired telescope should enable us to measure the distances to other galaxies much more accurately and thus estimate the size of the universe. We will be able to do this by photographing stars called Cepheids, which are always of the same brightness if seen from the same distance. Thus, from their apparent brightness, we can tell exactly how far away they are.

"If they are in a particular

galaxy, we can tell the exact distance of that galaxy by working out the distance of the Cepheid. It should also be possible to tell if nearby stars have planetary systems and perhaps if they have Earth-size planets."

● The American search for space aliens, which appeared doomed when Congress cut off funding, has won a reprieve thanks to private investors. The SETI Institute said it had raised \$4.4 million towards keeping the search going for another year. — AFP

Stardate set as MEPs face the final frontier

THE EUROPEAN Parliament stands on the verge of a new era, seeking new life, new civilisations and boldly going where no Eurocrats have gone before.

After the Common Fisheries Policy, the Social Chapter and the Euro-sausage, MEPs are set to debate the formation of a European UFO agency and, once again, it's a case of jobs for the French.

The Euro-Parliament meets in Strasbourg for a four-day session beginning on January 17 and included on the agenda is a debate on UFOs.

The motion comes from Italian Tullio Regge, an independent MEP and university professor.

Mr Regge, who comes from Turin, boasts an impressive string of qualifications including a PhD in physics, membership of the Accademia dei Lincei and the Einstein Medal for Physics.

He hit a wall of silence in his research into UFOs with the Air Forces of some European Union states, refusing to reveal

Italian, air force confirmed 32 sightings in 1982.

Mr Regge believes UFOs are worth investigating with 38,000 sightings since 1947 including 1500 reported by the Belgians while SEPRA, the French Government space research centre says 40% of incidents have no adequate explanation.

He has listed a range of incidents, including interviews with people who have been approached by "green spheres of light" or "a very large, slow-moving body with greenish flames spewing out the back."

Now Mr Regge has tabled a resolution for debate proposing that SEPRA be given the responsibility of co-ordinating research and collating information on sightings.

However, he says, no extra costs should be added on to the Euro-Budget if the move goes ahead and he also wants to see SEPRA given responsibility for tackling hoaxers by investigating claims quickly in an attempt to find an explanation.

Commenting on the prospect of Euro-UFOs yesterday, Dr Peter Andrews of the Royal Greenwich


way that the road was running and the fact that I was trying to pull over to the hard shoulder. But was unable to do so before we lost sight of the object just before the bridge at Herndon.


still have no idea."

Japanese space for UFOs

UNIDENTIFIED flying objects may not appear in Japan's official trade statistics, but they are big business in the town of Hakui, population 28,000, on the west coast some 200 miles (320km) from Tokyo. The town council has somehow persuaded the central government to pay for the establishment of the world's largest UFO institute in Hakui, on the grounds that it will help local economic development.

The UFO centre is to be built in the shape of a flying saucer and will contain a library in Japanese and English on UFOs and other related phenomena from outer space. It is the brainchild of Josen Takano, who has been obsessed with extra-terrestrials since his student days. Mr Takano has already established the UFO Lovers political party, and ran — unsuccessfully — in a national election in 1992 on a platform of building a UFO landing strip outside Hakui.

At the time people laughed at him. But in Hakui, Mr Takano is treated as something of a visionary, and his enthusiasm for UFOs is widely shared by the townspeople. Models of spaceships adorn roofs in the town, the shops sell UFO souvenirs, and restaurants even offer UFO noodles, with the contents of the bowl arranged to resemble a flying saucer.

"I have never seen a UFO myself," says Mr Takano, who works in the town hall's planning section. "But my real dream is to get on board a UFO." For the past 10 years Mr Takano has been collecting books and other documents from all over the world on UFOs. He is most proud of a report by the US Federal Bureau of Investigation on the recovery in 1950 of three bodies of suspected aliens, 3ft tall, along with parts of their spacecraft, from a crash site close to the Mexican border.

"We plan to deal with people who have encountered UFOs, but who are just ignored or treated as crazy by others. We should not leave the whole matter unsolved any longer," says Mr Takano, who claims to have found local chronicles going back 500 years which refer to "flying objects".

In 1990, Mr Takano organised the "International Symposium on UFOs and the Universe", for which he obtained funding from Japan's otherwise austere Ministry of International Trade and Industry. He also drew several as-

Plans to register UFO sightings

ANOTHER UFO has been spotted in the area - and the team who saw the craft are appealing for people with other sightings to come forward and share their experiences with them.

Mr Peter Gregory from Mablethorpe, whom we recently featured speaking about a sighting, was about 1000 yards from the microdishes down at Mablethorpe on Tuesday, January 4, which was a clear starry night.

He reports that at 11.08pm he spotted a light on the horizon, travelling from the north and arriving overhead within two minutes. He saw the rapidly moving Delta shaped form through binoculars and noted that it had 8 to 12 small lights on its undercarriage. "We nicknamed it the Starship. It was just as if it were stars that were moving," he told our reporter. "It was an enormous thing but made no noise. It had a red light at the back but it was not flashing like the light does on Star-Trek."

After much thought he positioned himself near the microdishes in order to spot these unidentified flying objects. "The dishes give out an electro magnetic field, so I feel it is of interest to what might be visitors from afar," he added.

The following morning he checked with all local air bases to see what planes they might have had in the area but was told all flying had ceased in this area by that time of the night.

Peter has every intention of setting up a team to tackle the aerial phenomenon presently filling our skies and he hopes readers will join him in his researches. "So much is going on along the east coast I think it should be documented," he continued. "People have been seeing delta winged aircraft along here for at least 12 years now and I think the time has come for something to be done about it. We should get together a register to enable us to have an idea of how many people have had these sightings."

Spookily it was last Tuesday night that people in Louth and district once more reported their televisions changing channel unexpectedly again.

Alien approaches

DID Admiral Bobby Ray Inman withdraw his nomination last week as the new US Defence Secretary on the instructions of alien life-forms?

This exotic possibility has reached me from Washington — in an extraordinary analysis of the conspiracy theories blossoming around the Clinton tenure of the White House, now a year old.

The imp-faced Admiral Inman, the former deputy director of the CIA, indignantly claimed in a rambling press conference last week that he was the victim of a Capitol Hill media plot.

His allegation featured Mr William Safire, the *New York Times* columnist, and Senator Bob Dole, the Senate Republican leader. The senator, he said, had stitched up a deal with Mr Safire to hammer him in his confirmation hearings over alleged tax problems while the Right-wing columnist would continue to lambast President Clinton in print on the Whitewater scandal. Mr Safire called the Inman accusations "weird".

But, weirder still were allegations in the *Washington Post* on the day of the 62-year-old admiral's bizarre outburst — that he was the US Government's ambassador-at-large to little green men.

Admiral Inman was well known to flying-saucer conspiracy theorists, said the *Post*. He was an intimate of "MJ12", spoken of in UFO-lore as a secret Pentagon group that liaises with beings from outer space. Furthermore, Nasa scientists had been offered access by the admiral to alien spacecraft.

"I did not want this job," said the admiral from his home town of Austin, Texas. "I'm at peace with myself."
